# Falcon to attack consoles

FALCON will almost certainly have its price cut to £399 and arrive on the High Street in a new case and a console-beating bundle next spring.

Atari are keeping tight-lipped on the plan, but Commodore's recent launch of a £399 Amiga with much improved graphics has made a price drop for Falcon inevitable.

Atari bosses, however, stress that the current £499 for the one megabyte version is a "launch price".

Industry pundits say Atari will target the Falcon at games players, using one or two 16-bit console beating games to tempt them to the machine.

And the firm's strategy of highlighting the advantages computers have over games consoles will continue, with a selection of home productivity packages also being included.

Head of Atari UK Bob Gleadow expects leading software houses to have released several hundred Falcon titles by the end

of 1993, at least 50 of them games.

Some developers already have machines, while other firms will be supplied with computers when the first shipment arrives in the next few weeks.

And Gleadow has said that an Atari-

badged CD-ROM drive compatible with the dominant CD format will appear towards the end of next year.

He expects the CD standard to emerge with the introduction of full motion video.

## Waiting for MultiTOS

THE first 10,000 Falcons due for sale to British ST enthusiasts in the next few months will not be supplied with MultiTOS, the disk-based multi-tasking operating system.

An Atari spokesman says the firm have not finished working on MultiTOS, although it is believed that it will be offered to people who have bought the computer as soon as it is ready.

Atari boss Bob Gleadow has said he expected 10 non-game titles to be released for Falcon before Christmas.

## Pulse increases at Ladbroke

**MiNT mistakes**

There was a major invasion of gremlins on November's CoverDisk and as a result two problems crept in. Those of you trying to extract MiNT will have noticed the "Write error" message during the extraction process. The problem is that the two folders comprising the MiNT package were to have been archived separately but somehow managed to be archived together. This meant that the resulting file was too large to allow the file to be extracted on to one floppy disk. If you have a hard disk or 2Mb of memory and a RAM disk utility, it should have been possible to bypass the error, but those of you with a floppy drive system will not have all the files required after the extraction. However, all is not lost. Although some files are missing due to the error, they can be found on this month's CoverDisk in the X\_MINTFL.TOS file. Just extract them as normal to a blank disk (mark the disk "Missing MiNT Files" or something similar) then go through the normal procedure for extracting the files on November's issue using a separate blank disk. Mark

this one "Original MiNT" or similar). When you receive the Write error message, the Original MiNT disk will have files missing, so just copy the files in the folders on the Missing MiNT Files disk into the respective folders on the Original MiNT disk and all will be well. The other error involved the multi-computer game Cold Revenge. Unfortunately the coverdisk pages described it as working on all STs. This was an error and we're afraid the game is for 1Mb or more machines only. Interestingly though, the error did provide insight into the kind of STs people own out there. It seems most of you have 1Mb or more machines as very few people phoned the CoverDisk hotline about the problem. However, sincere apologies to all you ST'rs with only 512k and we promise it will never happen again. Honest! (Too true, you can't afford to lose any more fingernails can you? -Ed). ● If you missed last month's issue and would like to have a look at the multi-tasking system behind Multi Tos, you can order it through our back issues department. see page 121.





# The mechanics of Quantum

**H**ave you successfully extracted all the files from the X\_QPAINT.TOS file? You have, then we'll begin.

The first thing you should know is that the more memory you have, the better. All graphics packages today can only be used to their best with 1Mb or more. Quantum Paint does run in 512k but to get the utmost out of such features as the animation facility, a memory upgrade is strongly recommended.

Also, due to the sophistication of Quantum Paint, this guide serves only to describe a few of the features contained within it. The manual is highly recommended if you wish to take advantage of some of Quantum Paint's advanced features and at a mere £5 you get a quality printed 50-page booklet with detailed explanations of all functions available. See the order form on page 18 for details on obtaining the manual.

When you run Quantum Paint (double click on QPAINT2.PRG), you will be placed in the 128-colour mode if you are in lo-res, or the 32-colour mode if you are in med-res. This guide assumes you are in lo-res.

## Access

The first thing you will be presented with is the main menu. Here you can access features such as the drawing and video modes, the drawing tools, the palette selector and animation facility, among others.

Selections are made simply by using the mouse to click on your choice. Some selections will have an immediate effect while others will bring up secondary screens.

Drawing in the default 128-colour mode is just like using any other art package such as Deluxe Paint – with one exception. It is possible to split the work screen into

as many as eight different "palette areas".

Each specific area can have its own particular palette of 16 colours which gives 8 x 16, or 128 colours maximum on-screen at once.

Consider for example a common picture such as a landscape scene. You

could split it into three areas. The top portion of the screen would contain a palette of whites and blues for the sky, the bottom portion of the screen would have a

mixture of greens and browns for the grass and terrain, while the centre portion would contain a mixture of the colours from the other palettes in order to blend the two together.

It is therefore necessary to first decide the colour distribution needed, then plan the colour palettes to achieve the required effects. This may seem overly cumbersome, but the results can be stunning.

These new and powerful graphics modes are made possible by some clever programming techniques, collectively

referred to as Wideband Colour. With these powerful new graphics modes being implemented in software, there are some penalties imposed.

They are paid by the ST's 68000 processor which is constantly being called upon to maintain the extended graphics. In 32 and 128-colour mode, there is

not much demand made on the 68000 (about 5 per cent extra processor time is taken up).

However, in the Super-Palette Modes of 512 and 4,096 colours, there is a massive consumption of 90 per cent of the 68000's time devoured in keep-

ing those colours on-screen.

This isn't a problem for the general user who just wishes to produce and display his graphical efforts but programmers who wish to use such extended graphics in their programs will have limited processor time for other routines.

All is not doom and gloom though. For example, it is possible for a programmer to have a 4,096-colour title screen being displayed on-screen with computer-generated music being played independently in the background.

When it comes to actually drawing on the screen, there are 18 tools and 12 brushes, which can be re-defined by you, to help create your masterpiece. Each tool can be selected simply by clicking on its icon from the main screen.

Each tool specifies the method of drawing that occurs when using the chosen brush to draw on the screen. The easiest and most effective way to learn how to use these tools is to experiment. Just pick a brush, select a tool and see what effects are produced when you use that brush to draw.

Some of the tools provide such facilities as Circle, Box and Frame for some of

the more basic shapes, while others provide functions for more exotic shapes such as Polygons, Rays and Poly-Lines.

There is also an Airbrush function which works much like a traditional spray-can. It takes the current brush and sprays it around a specified, circular area at a defined rate.

The size of the circle and the rate at which the flow of "paint" emerges can be changed using the AIR778896 option from the secondary menu.

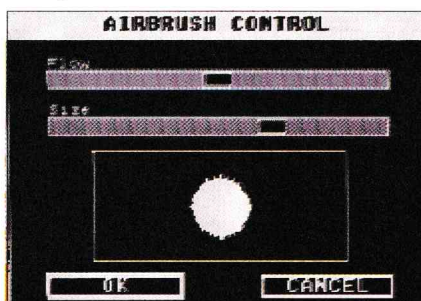
When drawing, if you wish to view your picture in the current, extended colour mode, leave the mouse stationary for approximately six seconds, at which point the built-in display routines will display your picture in the current extended mode. Moving the mouse will revert to the normal ST display.

## Text

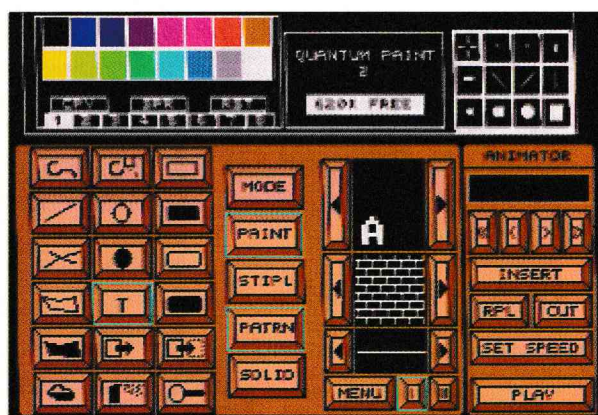
Quantum Paint also has a very good Text function which allows for any text to be incorporated into your picture. You can use the built-in fonts or use any GDOS-compatible font which can be loaded into Quantum Paint without the need to have GDOS installed.

Simply click on the Text tool and when you go into the drawing mode, the mouse cursor will be a vertical bar. If you now type anything on the keyboard, the letters will appear at the cursor position.

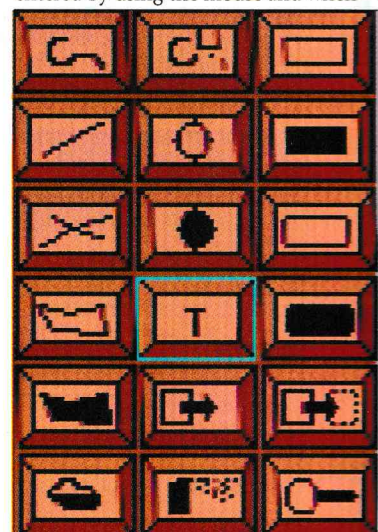

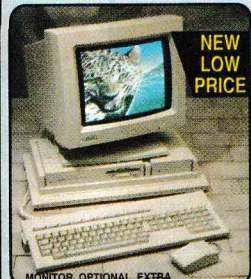

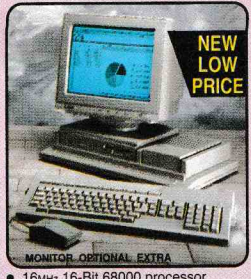

**SILICA SYSTEMS**

It's quite easy to get enthusiastic about painting. Most of us have felt the urge at one time or another, whether we're walking around an art gallery or just looking at a particularly beautiful view.

Unfortunately, it takes years at art school to master the traditional techniques of oil painting and watercolour, but – in theory at least – it's a lot easier with an ST.

The problem is that most ST paint packages give you a mind-boggling array of tools to work with, from simple brushes to spray cans and multiple radiating lines, all of which can leave the amateur utterly confused.

To get the most out of a paint package requires a little more than just splashing colour on the screen. Each of the tools is there for a reason, and knowing how to use them will dramatically improve the results of your labours as well as providing a touch of creativity and inspiration.

### Stunning

The number of special effects is almost unlimited once the basics are under your belt. With a really top quality package like Quantum Paint – given away free on this month's CoverDisk – you can produce some quite stunning pictures and effects.

Don't worry if you're the art world's equivalent of a lobotomised zombie – you're not alone, as you'll appreciate from my own efforts. Paint packages are designed for people like you and me. Use them properly and you'll soon be up there on the Gallery pages.

Instead of a piece of canvas and an easel, computer paint packages provide you with a blank screen onto which you can splash, pour, sprinkle or spray

almost any colours you like. It helps if you have a monitor screen, but a TV will do nicely. The temptation, of course, is to start off with a pure white screen although some packages such as Neochrome provide a black background by default. However, plain black or white can be totally unsuitable for the picture, so plenty of thought has to go into choosing the right background colour before you start.

Black or a similarly dark colour such

as blue or green is a good choice for a fantasy or space picture, but for landscapes the best choice is actually a base colour such as grass green or sky blue, while faces are easier with a flesh coloured background.

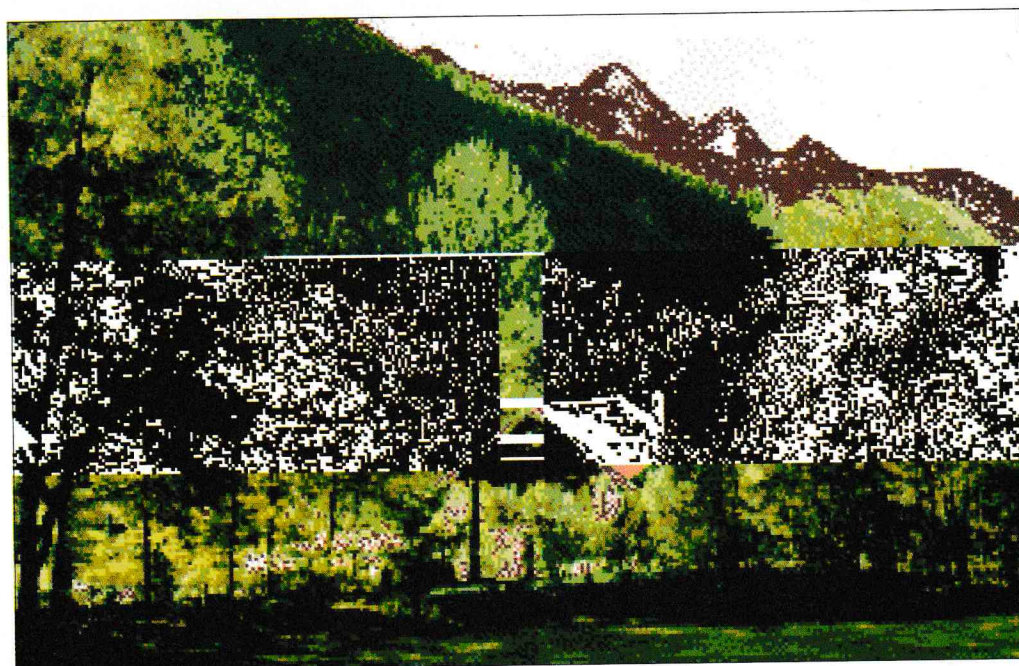
### Fill the gaps

In this way, the background always shows through unintentional gaps in your painting. Don't forget that you can always use the airbrush, flood fill and

even pattern tools to change it once the foreground is complete, zooming in close-up mode if required.

Colour also presents a second hurdle – the ST's palette can only display 16 colours in low resolution from a total of 512 on the ST or 4096 on the STE (though not all programs will make use of the extra colours).

Some paint packages like Spectra 512 and Quantum Paint get round the 16 colour restriction by clever prog-

ming methods known as palette switching, but such pictures aren't normally usable outside these specific applications.

The number of colours you can use also affects the size of the "canvas" you can paint on. Painting in high resolution, with only two colours, you can have a screen 640 by 400 (256,000) pixels in size.

In medium resolution (with only four colours to choose from) you get 640 by 200 (128,000) while in low resolution, with the widest colour palette, you get only 320 by 200 (64,000) pixels. Another factor against using medium resolution is the fact that the pixels are rectangular, rather than square, which can cause odd looking drawings.

### Techniques

As paint packages work in bitmap mode - they fill individual screen pixels with the chosen colour - the resolution is relatively low.

This is one reason why few DTP programs will make use of colour picture created on the ST, but there are a number of techniques for improving the overall feel of low resolution images which we will look at later.

If you are working with a limited palette, you'll have to start off by optimising it for the picture you intend to produce.

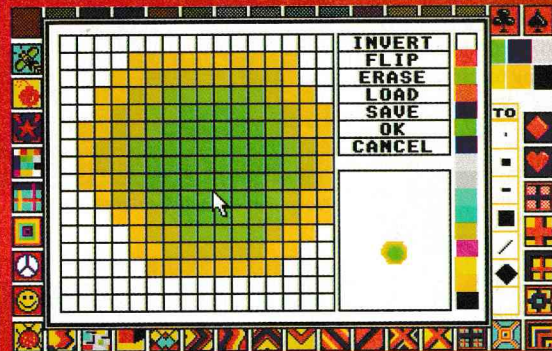
Default palettes are no use for serious graphics - if you are doing a landscape for example, you will need several different greens and browns plus a sky blue, a yellow and, of course, black and white. The more green shades you have, at the expense of reds and purples, the better the landscape will look.

This is the reason why fantasy and

# Tools of the trade

The most important part of a paint package is the toolbox. Learn to handle the many different tools and you'll be amazed at the effects possible.

Oddly enough, the main tool is the paintbrush and just as traditional artists have a wide variety of brushes available, the computer artist has

phenomenal control over size and shape. Most paint programs offer round and square brushes of varying sizes as well as oblique lines. They also offer user definable brushes, a feature which can give you some real power.

If any part of a paint package is worth spending time experimenting with, it's the brush editing dialogue. With

a little practice you can create (and usually save) brush shapes that look similar to a real artist's strokes. Try several dots or small crosses, for example.

When brushed on the screen, it looks far more aesthetically pleasing than a uniform line of colour and resembles a true paintbrush more closely.

Brushes can also be used to "stamp" patterns over an area, especially if multi-coloured brushes can be used.

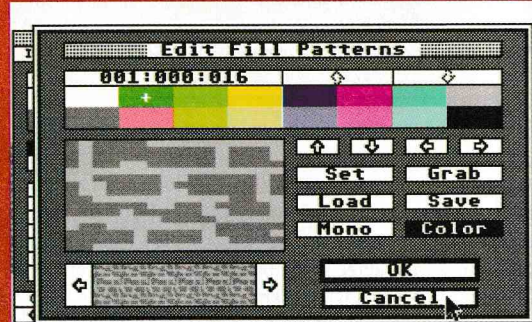


This isn't what a spray can is for...

When filling in a landscape, for example, a brush can be made of several shades of green or brown.

The airbrush or spray can is another important tool. Many packages do not offer enough flexibility - a true airbrush is an extremely delicate instrument capable of spraying very fine particles over a tiny area. Some airbrushes are about as subtle as an aerosol paint can - no use for anything except spraying the name of your favourite football team on a brickwork background.

The real value of an airbrush type tool is to shade 2D objects to create a 3D effect or to smudge existing objects

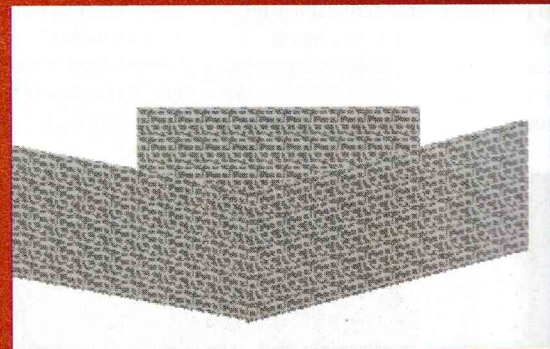


Creating a stone wall fill

to blend them in with the background. Some package even have a special smudge tool - this is similar to an airbrush but it tends to reverse solid colours and make a more gradual blend between two hues.

The airbrush/spray tool can often be combined with a different brush shape, as in Degas Elite, which is handy for special effects.

Most paint programs also have a number of pre-defined shapes. While certainly useful, the K-line function seems to be a lot more useful - this is a series of

interconnecting lines which can be used to draw quite complex shapes such as buildings and other solid objects. Alternatively it can be used to quickly draw a base model for the picture which can be gradually fine tuned.

Flood fill and pattern techniques can also help you paint better pictures. Flood fill is used for backgrounds and enclosed areas but patterns seem to of limited use until you start to create your own. If you can tailor a pattern to match, say brick, stonework or grass, it will save a lot of time spent airbrushing and filling.

Don't forget that many paint packages will let you shear and stretch filled shapes so you can add perspective to a stone or brick wall in this way.



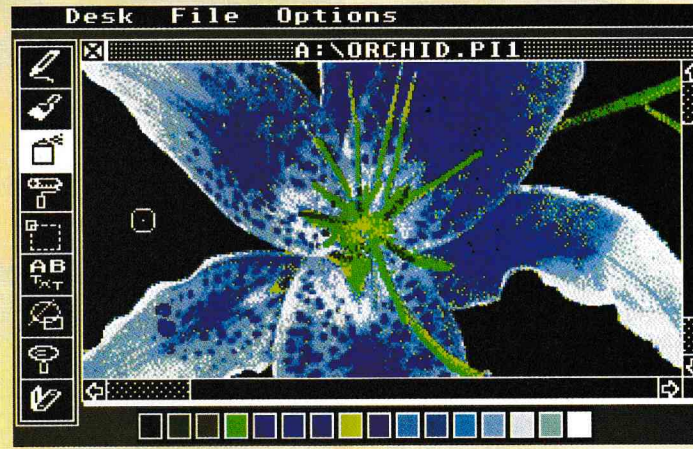
# Smoothing it over

The low resolution mode used by most paint packages requires taking careful steps to ensure smooth pictures, especially where straight lines are being used.

Unless lines are exactly horizontal or vertical, a phenomenon known as aliasing will occur. Draw a few quick lines on your screen and then zoom in – each line has a stepped effect that looks distinctly ragged. If you draw a line at 45 degrees to the horizontal or vertical, however, you will notice much less distortion.

Now clearly any artistic creation that tries to restrict lines to 45 degrees is bound to look odd, but you should bear it in mind if you have a long line running through your work – for example a road or a building running into the distance.

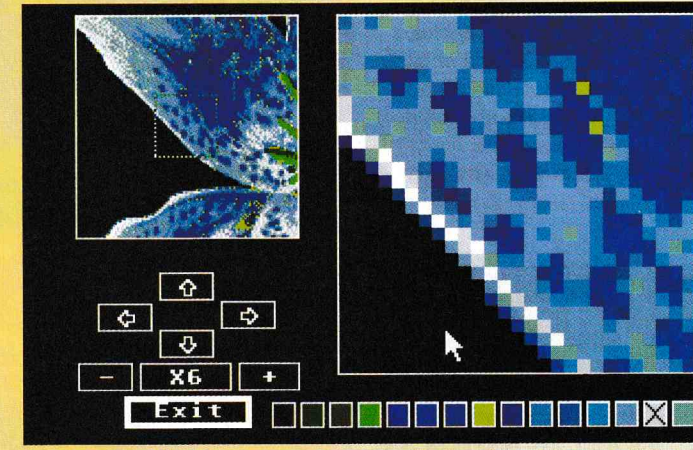
Another method of minimising the distortion is to use anti-aliasing techniques. Packages such as Deluxe Paint feature automatic anti-aliasing, but for the most part it has to be done manually. So what is it? Anti-aliasing attempts to smooth the jagged edges of lines and solid shapes by adding intermediate colours to soften the contrast between the jagged edge and the background.

space are popular subjects for ST artists, whereas landscapes and real-life images are notoriously difficult to recreate.

Most professionals agree that a palette of 16.7 million colours is what is known as "true colour" – the eye can't really determine any more than that. The absolute minimum is 256 colours, which still looks fairly presentable but 16 colours just won't work unless the range of colours is reduced and the palette is carefully chosen. Roll on the Falcon – or a graphics card like Crazy Dots.

## Sketch first

Van Gogh had more talent in his little toe than I'll ever have, but it hasn't stopped me enjoying paint packages and even producing some acceptable work.

It's no use starting with a blank screen – no real artist would do this, so why should you? If you can draw, make a rough sketch first so that you have

something to go on. If you can't draw, look at an alternative method.

Don't be afraid to look at other people's work for inspiration. There's no harm in it at all. If you're only painting for pleasure there's no harm in copying someone else's picture, provided you don't then pass it off as your own or use it in any way.

Have you seen the Volvo advert where the car turns smoothly into a horse? The inspiration for that quite clearly came from the film Terminator 2. Everyone copies everyone else to some extent – just make sure it's different enough to be original!

The obvious way of getting some base artwork into the ST is to scan it in. Many people can draw passably well using a pencil but find drawing with a mouse quite difficult. Scanning hand-drawn artwork makes it easy to get started.

Another method is to use an overlay grid and carefully reconstruct a picture a

## Useful tips

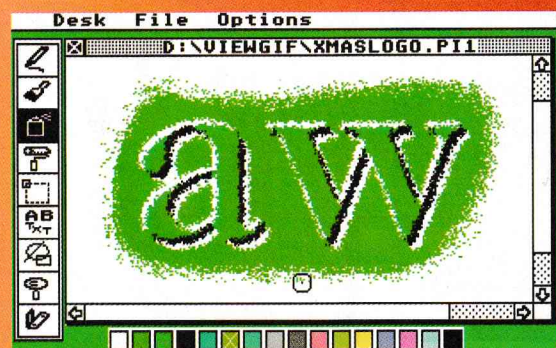
**Look around** – observation is the key to success in art. More importantly, be realistic. For example, don't paint a yellow circle for the sun. If the sun was a big yellow blob in a clear blue sky you wouldn't be able to see anything at all, let alone paint it!

**Take precautions** – it is vital to save your work regularly. Get into the habit of saving when you're happy with what you see but make use of the undo buffers too. Most programs let you operate on several work screens at once, so use them to cut and paste objects and keep backups of your work. Remember to save your customised fills, palettes and brushes.

**Read the manual** – whichever package you use, I guarantee there are half a dozen useful features hidden away somewhere. If you don't read the manual you'll probably never find them.

**Use a ruler** – especially useful for drawing figures. The human body can be divided into five equal sized parts – head, chest, middle, thighs and calves. Use grid or guide lines if necessary – you can always rub them out later.

**Text effects** – experiment with text effects for your DTP work.

square at a time. It works particularly well with complicated pictures and photographs but some forethought is required.

At low and high resolution the ST's screen is 1.6 times as wide as it is tall so if you can divide your original up into small squares in this precise ratio so much the better.

Draw a grid on some clear plastic or acetate - lines about 1cm apart are about right, but it will depend entirely on the level of detail.

### Accuracy

Now draw a similar grid on your screen. Some packages have built-in grid features. Others such as Hyperpaint require you to draw the grid in, erasing it afterwards. You can now reconstruct the

original on screen using the matching grid lines - you'll be surprised how accurately you can reproduce the original.

If you don't have an original or you simply want to be creative, try the method frequently taught in art classes. Quite effective objects can be created from simple shapes such as triangles and circles. Everyone will remember the cat - a small circle on top of a bigger one, then add ears, eyes, whiskers and tail. The same principle can be applied to almost anything.

If you prefer freehand construction, don't worry too much about the composition lines - these are the lines you draw to put the main elements of the picture in place. They can always be erased at the end or even flood-filled with an appropriate colour.

## Know the buzzwords

**Aliasing** - jagged edges caused by lines having to be represented by a series of pixels.

**Animation** - a series of images or screens displayed in sequence to provide the illusion of movement.

**B-Splines** - curves defined by two anchor points at each end and two control points representing the shape of the curve itself.

**Dither** - a process to create the illusion of being a continuous tone image by placing dots very close together in various patterns each representing particular colours or shades. You carry out a process similar to dithering when you attempt to blend two or more colours with an airbrush or smudge tool.

**Frame** - a single image or screen in an animation sequence.

**Gradient fill** - a gradual fade in colour intensity or a gradual change from one colour to another. Gradients are typically linear or radial but can be user defined or even logarithmic.

**Frame** - a single image or screen in an animation sequence.

**Highlight** - the brightest area of an object, a metal sword, for example, will usually have one highlighted edge.

**K-Line** - a tool for drawing a set of continuous, interconnected lines.

**Mask** - a facility for protecting a particular area from the current drawing or painting function - not present on all packages but useful.

**Mode** - The normal drawing mode is replace - everything underneath is completely hidden by a new object placed over it. The opposite, transparent mode, lets you see what is behind the new object provided it is darker in tone. Reverse transparent mode reverses the tones of the new object and areas which are not fully black are made transparent. XOR, or inverse, the tones of the two objects are subtracted from each other so that similar tones become white and different ones are averaged.

**Palette** - a discrete set of colours.

**Rays** - a set of radiating lines with a common starting point.

**Shading** - the process of using variations in colour to create the illusion of light and shadows. to break up boundaries.

**Smudge or smear** - blends together two or more colours or greyscales. Often used when one image, say a face, has been superimposed on another such as a landscape. The edges can be softened using the smudge facility. It has similar uses in line art drawing.

**Snap** - objects can be made to snap to guidelines or a pre-defined grid which is very useful for accurate positioning.

You will come across several different file formats on the ST, virtually all of which will support up to 16 colours.

### DEGAS

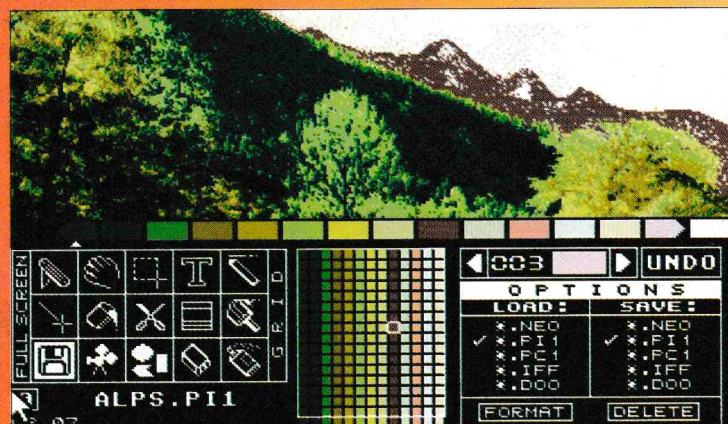

# Ahead with Atari

*Falcon's success will be crucial for Atari, the industry says, as key figures talk to Andy Baker about their plans for 1993*



Falcon : Crucial for Atari's success

As 1992 draws to a close and our thoughts drift to the year ahead, I took a little time out from Crimbo shopping to talk to the head honchos of the ST industry and to ask them for their views on how the last year went for Atari, and what they think lies ahead.

What I uncovered was a mass of support for Atari from their developers, with numerous new products about to be unveiled (you'll read about them here next issue), a lot of confidence in the future – and more than a little derision from Commodore.

For the computer industry in general, 1992 must rank as one of the most breathtaking years yet. Prices of hardware have fallen through the floor, games consoles have become the UK's biggest selling toys and computers have overtaken pop music as the nation's favourite pastime for male teenagers.

## First

Among this mayhem our favourite manufacturer has had a very mixed year. On the one hand it now has the cheapest 16-bit computer in the market and has unveiled the first 32-bit home computer.

On the other it's losing money faster than it can make it and its primary target, the ST, is being hammered on all fronts. Perhaps one company that above all has had a lot to do with Atari's troubles is Commodore. Not surprisingly Kelly Sumner, MD of Commodore,

was fairly critical of Atari, turning even positive issues into negatives – is anyone surprised?

When, for instance, I asked what he thought Atari's greatest achievements of '92 were he replied: "Greatest achievements – to lose more money in the second quarter than they actually turned over."

He wasn't impressed with their performance throughout the year either. As he put it: "If I were a school teacher, I'd say 'could have done better'."

While discussing the future of Atari with other figureheads in the industry it became obvious that everybody is pinning their hopes on the Falcon.

In summing up what he feels will be Commodore's most interesting products (to ST users at least) Sumner astutely chose two areas where, even with the new Falcon, Atari are at

their weakest – graphics and CD-ROM.

Commodore are obviously hoping to attract a lot of potential Atari buyers next year with their much-hyped AGA chipset in the Amiga and further developments of CDTV and their CD-ROM drive for the A500.

Atari themselves were strangely

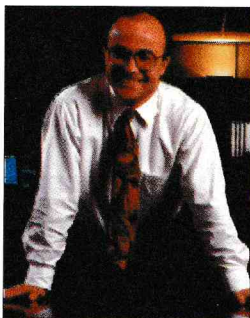
unwilling to give any real details of their achievements, successes or failures of 1992.

All that could be prised from a company spokesperson was: "In 1992 the Atari Lynx has dramatically increased its market share in the hand-held sector.

"The ST has held its own in the first

## A year in the history of Atari

For Atari, 1992 was one of the most active years ever. However, even though they announced numerous new products they had, at the time of writing, still failed to ship many of these.

This ability to develop, announce, show and then not sell product after product is almost a trademark of Atari and is one reason why many loyal developers are now moving to other formats.

Products and announcements made by Atari in 1992 include:

**February:** New monitors introduced. The SM144 is a 14in mono model to replace the now ageing

SM124. A new colour, stereo monitor called the SC1435 was also launched. Both of these are now available.

**March:** First ST Books were shown at the 5th International Computer Show. (It had at the time of writing, still to become available. Atari's latest comment was that it was never planned for the UK anyway!)

**April:** Mega STs and TTs are slashed in price.

**May:** MultiTOS details are announced. Again, at the time of writing MultiTOS has still not seen the light of day.

**June:** Atari announces intention to develop a range of games specially supporting the STE. FSM GDOS was also unveiled. Neither of these developments got any further, although FSM GDOS is frequently seen at various shows!

**September:** Falcon030 shown for the first time at the ECTS trade shown. In the middle of October the Falcon 030 was not available, and there are already rumours that in its initial form it will be missing several key features.

**October:** Price cuts on the 520 and 1040, bringing the ST down to just £249, the UK's lowest ever price for a 16-bit computer.

half of the year and latterly, with A600 incompatibility problems and the Discovery Xtra II and Family Curriculum II packs introduced at the great price of £249 and £299 respectively, sales have risen dramatically.

"This together with the introduction of the Atari Falcon030, which has been received very enthusiastically by trade, developers and enthusiasts alike, points to a very good 1993 for Atari".

What this spokesperson didn't comment on, but a reliable source did, was that the much rumoured Jaguar is at last set to make an appearance in 1993.

Without giving too many details away, the source revealed that the Jaguar is to be a "virtual reality" console for release early in the year.

## Technology

It is thought Atari will develop computers based on the technology later on, but probably not for a year or two.

While some would argue with some of the Atari spokesperson's points, there are many UK and US developers prepared to back him up, particularly with regard to the Falcon.

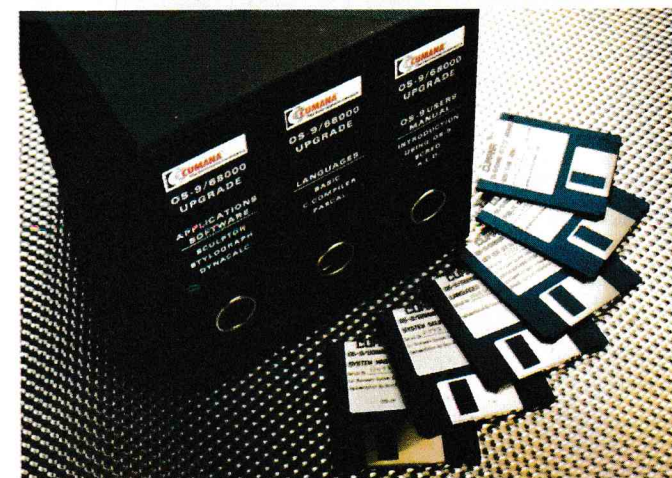

Before I started this article I expected most, if not all the developers, to be highly critical of Atari. Having spoken to many of not just the UK's but the world's leading Atari developers it is obvious that they are in fact more than willing to back Atari, but Atari are not there for them.

Atari's unwillingness to go on the record and talk to me for this article is surely an example of why these developers and the market in general is currently so negative towards them!

In a year which has seen many developers abandon the ST, Migraph instead went on the offensive, unveiling not one but two major new products.

"We're very positive about the ST. We believe that in 1992 Atari started a new period in their history, one that will see them regain their position as a market leading manufacturer.

"This is the reason we chose '92 to launch two new products." said Kevin.

Talking about Atari's greatest success of the year, Kevin, like most, identified the Falcon.

"Atari have always been very strong in the DTP markets. The Falcon will strengthen this role and is without doubt the best thing they did in '92."

For the future, Kevin is convinced that Atari are on the way up. He's so convinced of this that in early 1993 Migraph are set to launch their most ambitious product yet.

He finished with "as far as Migraph

and the ST are concerned things are really beginning to take off again."

Another major US developer pleased with Atari are ICD. The Atari market in 1992 was a good one for ICD, particularly in Europe. Given this ICD promised me that they will continue their support for the Atari market.

With several new products planned and their recently launched SCSI host adaptor LINK already doing well, they seem to have made the right decision.

## Diplomatic

Deron Kazmaier, the developer of PageStream, was diplomatic about Atari. I've known Deron from many years now, starting way back in time when he wrote the predecessor to PageStream called Publishing Partner.

Since those days he has been a fan of Atari hardware but, like many bigger developers, has always had a problem in dealing with Atari Corporation themselves. Atari have always managed to alienate such people and Deron is no different.

According to Deron, while PageStream sales have held up, Atari's disinterest has forced him and other developers to concentrate on other formats first and Atari second.

This sentiment was echoed by most of the Stateside developers I spoke with.

In a comment revealing just how severe the economic recession in the US is, he said he believed Atari's best achievement in 92 was "surviving to 1993!" Development by Deron and his colleges at SoftLogik for the ST in 1993 will primarily be a series of updates rather than new releases. "We'll still be

supporting the ST, but for the time being, given the support we receive from Atari, we can't justify new research, only maintenance updates."

On this side of the pond, Martin Welsh from Marpet Developments was perhaps more enthusiastic than any of the US companies.

For those of you who may not know Marpet have taken over the range of RAM boards from the now dead Frontier. Since setting up in early 1992 they have seen sales literally shoot through the roof.

Breaking all their sales forecasts, exports have increased by almost 100 per cent in the past six months with more than 5,000 memory boards sold to ST and STE owners!

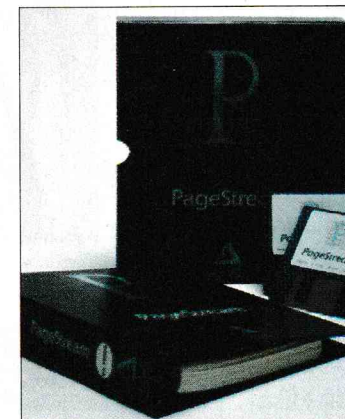
It's obvious that many of you want much power for your STs as you can and Marpet are one of the leaders in meeting this demand.

Martin expects it to get better still '93. While many people have predicted that the ST is a dying computer, which Atari by announcing the Falcon - a new generation of computer not completely compatible with the ST - has only confirmed, Martin sees the opposite happening.

For him the Falcon announcement will see a resurgence in the ST as existing ST users sell their STs to buy Falcon.

This will create a whole new generation of first time ST users. It will also bolster Falcon sales, which are already expected to be high, to even greater levels.

To substantiate these comments, Martin has already invested much of

Marpet's future on the ST. Future announcements, and you won't read about these anywhere else for a while, are a new professional Falcon RAM board and a 16Mb RAM board for the STFM and STE systems.

There are also three other products which Martin was unwilling to describe also in development.

Similar thoughts to Martin's were those of long-time ST hero Neal O'n

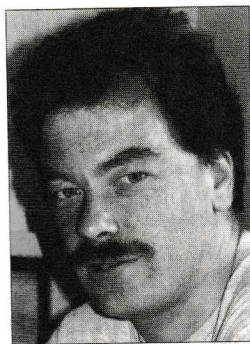
at Compo Software. Neal has been happy with Atari's recent activity, even with the apparent lack of any heavy-weight marketing campaigns.

As he put it: "Demand for Atari hardware is huge, Atari have a name for producing powerful, value-for-money computers which people will buy.

"Why spend valuable money on promoting systems that will sell anyway? It's far better that they concentrate their money on developing and building future systems that will keep them in business."

For the future he wants nothing but "Falcon, Falcon, Falcon. It's where the future is."

Indeed, Compo Software's products are already fully Falcon-compatible. The next generation of their software will

actually use the specific features of the Falcon.

To give an idea of how significant this is, and thus how much the Falcon means to the ST community, consider that software developers are only just starting to support the STE – two years after its original release!

Rounding up the serious developer community I asked John Simnett MD of Cumana, the market leading manufacturer of disk drives, for his thoughts.

### Impressed

Like the others he was impressed with Atari in '92. "We can only tell from our own sales into the Atari market. We were quite surprised to find that our sales of our floppy drive systems were 15 per cent up."

Like his software developer counterparts, John supported the belief that the Falcon was Atari's most important move "Atari's greatest achievement this year must be their new Falcon machines, continuing to push forward their technical prowess."

Interestingly, he also noted "their



continued pressure at the games console end of the market, maintaining this despite bringing out new products at the top."

He sees Atari taking the battle back to Commodore, competing with the Amiga's dominance in multimedia and CD-ROM arenas.

### Intense pressure

"Atari will be under intense pressure in 1993, mainly because of marketing issues and presence.

"We see them likely to adopt CD-I and because of this, the OS-9 operating system, upon which CD-I is based.

"I hope that the convergence of multimedia technology across home entertainment, education and business will enable Atari to position itself as a natural contender across the different markets.

"I think that they will either achieve this or require a serious rethink by the end of next year."

For the future Cumana will continue selling their best selling external floppy disk drive, the CDA354. They will also be selling a full version of OS-9.

If John's belief that Atari are to adopt CD-I (in a bid to compete with CDTV) comes true, then Cumana have made a

very astute move!

Another hardware developer prominent in the Atari market are Vortex. Best known for their PC emulators, this German firm have, according to their marketing director Ute Forestner, yet to make a decision about the future and are not impressed with Atari in 1992.

Atari's constant announcement of new products and then failure to deliver places Vortex in a very difficult position.

"How can we invest money in development for systems that will probably not actually be sold?" she commented.

Vortex may well release a Falcon PC emulator but only if the Falcon is a real success. If it isn't, the lack of a Vortex emulator will be the last thing on the minds of Atari's bosses

"Without Falcon being a success I can't see how Atari can survive." said Ute.

### Games

On the games front, Atari has taken a real pounding from Sonic and Mario, while the Amiga battered it on the serious side. To get an insider's view of Atari in the games market I made a few calls, let my fingers do the walking and talked to some of the power brokers in the games market. It didn't start well, with

Paul Rason Project Development Manager at CodeMasters pretty much condemning Atari.

"The only thing one can really say about Atari is their mistake to releasing a super-powered machine like the Falcon in a five-year old ST design keyboard case."

Comments from Nick Wild at Psygnosis, traditionally a major Atari developer, weren't enthusiastic either.

"For Atari 1992 wasn't a great year. He continued, "In our eyes Atari did not make any great mistakes but they did not particularly do anything brilliant either. If they are to continue in 1993, the Falcon must be a big success."

Nick Clarkson at Gremlin was somewhat more positive.

"Atari's greatest success story of the year has to be the Lynx. One of the hand-held game systems around, the Lynx has some real potential."

Following just about everyone else, Gremlin see '93 as a vital year with Atari's future lying with the Falcon.

"1993 looks like it could make or break Atari. The 32-bit Falcon probably to be an exciting product. However, if Atari are to regain any standing in the home computer market they must have some serious software support for the machine."

As for Gremlin's support for Atari's future, he said that they will continue

support the machine but with the proviso "where technically feasible"

Things rapidly improved when I spoke to Domark. Early in the year Domark grabbed the headlines with an announcement that it would not develop for the ST.

Now, and you read here first, Atari could reverse their decision of no development for Atari systems. As Godard, their public persona, said Domark "hope the Falcon succeeds if it does they will start development again."

This would be great news for Atari and a great start to 1993 if it comes

So that's it. Although Atari are in a tough time of it at the moment, the future looks good with most developers looking forward to the Falcon.

1993 looks set to see Atari regain much of the ground they have lost this year and regain their status in the market. If they don't, these shelves will be pretty empty this time next year!

the course of using the program some airports are deleted, so in some instances the flight plan will reject a valid input.

Other times it has been disconcerting to make a blind approach and find that the airport has disappeared. It's no great hassle to remake a copy from the original, and in no way detracts from the general excellence of the program. It can, however, badly affect one's ratings.

## Fighting against the PCs

I have noticed a spate of letters of late, bemoaning the fact that Atari is in danger of being superseded by the PC.

I would like to add my own comments to the debate. I am a middle manager in an international computer reseller and own an STE.

First off, let's take a look at the technology/price ratios. Many readers have commented that the prices of the STE are too high when compared to PC386s.

This may, on the face of it be true. For a long time Atari had the best home computers on the market – stereo sound, wonderful graphics, blitter chips and so on – at a price most people could afford.

It is now possible to pick up a decent 386SX 25MHz PC-compatible, with 4Mb RAM, 52Mb hard disk, 1.44Mb floppy drive and an SVGA monitor for around £1,000 – much of the cost belonging to the monitor.

A similar STE package would cost about £1,000 without the monitor. So the obvious thing to do would be to cut the price of the STE, right? Wrong.

Sure, you could argue chicken and egg that low prices would bring more sales and thus not only would Atari regain the lost margin but also have higher revenues and hence bigger profits, but we are firmly in a depression.

What if the vast increase in sales doesn't happen? Would you take such a gamble? No, of course not. So the price of the units will not decrease by any great amounts – certainly not like the fall in PC prices.

However, then take a look at the software, for that is where the great savings are. How many decent wordprocessors, DTP packages, spreadsheets or databases

## Superb shareware service

In a previous issue of your magazine you included an address book database on the CoverDisk called Namenet. I liked it and decided to use it to store all my addresses on. As it was shareware I registered.

In return I received a greatly improved version, a full printed manual and the promise of further free upgrades.

I recently received v2.5, which is so versatile and has so many excellent features that it puts many commercial packages to shame.

Added to that is the facility to inform the author directly not only of bugs in the program, but also suggestions for improvements or extra features, which the author does his best to implement.

What more can you want for £15? This proves to me that shareware can offer a better service and better value for money than many commercial products, but it needs the support of us users, or else software like this will not be upgraded or even written in the first place. For those people who are already

using Namenet v1.5, or need the best address book on the market, why not send £15 to Roger Derry, 38 Leopold Road, Bristol BS6 5BS?

Think of it not only as a worthwhile investment but as a small contribution to the continuation of shareware as an industry.

are there sub-£150 for the PC? Not many.

Then look at the vast selection of PD and shareware for the STE, much of it better than many PC off-the-shelf products.

The sound and graphics capabilities of the PC has overtaken the STE – well, they do have 256-colour, flicker free screens.

But wait, what's this? A new Atari product with new screen resolutions, better than CD quality sound, DSP chip and the good old Motorola chip – which, incidentally, is specifically designed to handle complex graphics.

So given that we've effectively argued the pricing and technology issues away, what should Atari be worried about?

Quite simply, the superior marketing forces of the PC companies. They've got it sussed, and Atari has its head in the sand if it thinks that the odd TV advert at Christmas is going to win it a significant share in the market.

When it comes to customer relations too, well, let's be polite and say that Atari is lacking, and how about a decent upgrade policy for those who aren't afraid of new technology and make the initial investments?

Atari needs to work more closely with the developers too, especially with hardware manufacturers and see about bringing lower prices in those areas.

At the end of the day, the future of the STE lies with its parents, Atari. Instead of looking enviously at the PC market, end users should tell Atari to get its fingers out, develop new, stable products, offer better and more generous support to users, including a good upgrade policy, and market it effectively.

Basically, Atari need to employ some real marketing people who understand the industry, and not as I suspect rely on agencies who might have the Arthur's Cat food account.

Well, I've had my say. There will be people who disagree with a lot of it, but I hope at least I have stimulated some thought and discussion.

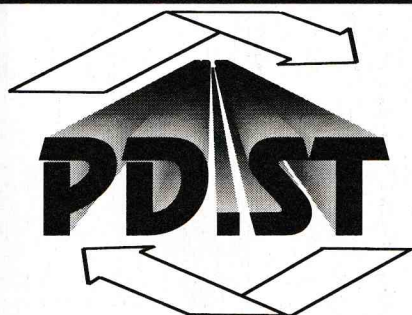

The Turbo is in fact a replacement 68000 CPU that uses wafer technology to run at a clock speed of 25MHz instead of the standard 8MHz.

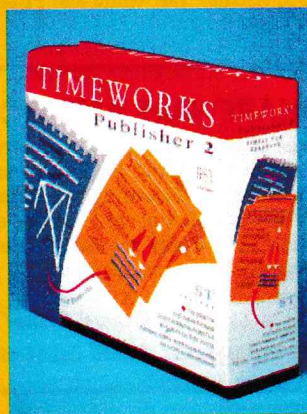
It is provided with a hardware switch at the back so that you can manually switch back to 8MHz for some games (if you think the latest shoot-'em-up is no challenge, try it at 25MHz!). It can also be switched on or off via software.

The only compatibility problem is with some hand scanner software which can't work at 25MHz. If you use DTP, image processing, file archiving, the Turbo board will be the best thing you ever buy.

Timeworks is probably the world's most popular DTP package and it sets the standard which the others have to beat. Version 1.12 dominated the ST publishing scene for years and won plenty of friends for its remarkable ease of use and excellent range of features.

Timeworks 2 is now faster and more efficient than previous versions and comes with a range of extra fonts, answering one of the major criticisms of its predecessor.

Added features include automatic text flow between columns, up to 999 pages in a document, text wrap around graphics and custom page sizes.

It can also import an amazing range of text and graphics files, particularly those of PC origin.

Timeworks 2 can save documents automatically, has more keyboard shortcuts and better printer support, including 9 and 24-pin dot matrix, Deskjet, Laserjet, Bubblejet and Atari laser drivers.

The manual is well-written – an excellent buy for beginners and experienced users alike.

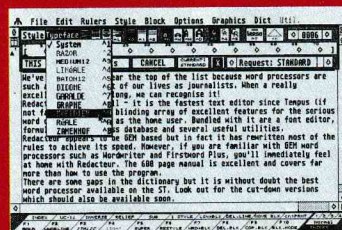
We've put Redacteur near the top of the list because wordprocessors are such an important part of our lives as journalists. When a really excellent one comes along, we can recognise it!

Redacteur fits the bill. It is the fastest text editor since Tempus – if not faster – and has a blinding array of excellent features for the serious word cruncher as well as the home user. Bundled with it are a font editor, formula editor, address database and several useful utilities.

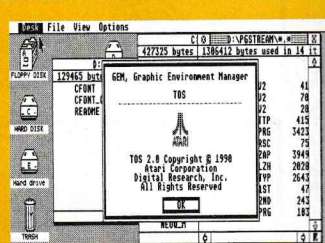
Redacteur appears to be GEM-based but in fact it has rewritten most of the rules to achieve its speed. However, if you are familiar with GEM wordprocessors such as Wordwriter and Firstword Plus, you'll immediately feel at home with Redacteur.

The 600-page manual is excellent and covers far more than how to use the program.

There are some gaps in the dictionary but it is without doubt the best wordprocessor available on the ST. Look out for the cut-down versions which should also be available soon.

TOS 2.06 is the first operating system upgrade to have official approval from Atari. The T-Board, as the Compo product is called, comes in two models for either the ST/STFM or STE.

It needs some soldering expertise but can be done cheaply through dealers and it fits over the existing CPU to add a second, much improved operating system to your machine.

You can switch back to TOS 1.0x from a desk accessory if needed but the new TOS is so powerful, it's unlikely you want to.

TOS 2.06 lets you open up to several windows at once, which is great for hard drive owners. Program or file icons can be dragged from windows onto the desktop and there are keyboard shortcuts and menu options.

If you enjoy using NeoDesk or alternatives but find loading it a pain, TOS 2 is for you.

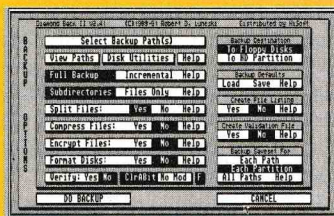
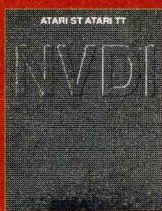
NVDI is a software screen accelerator which can be installed on any ST/STE or TT system to speed up the drawing of text, graphics, dialogue boxes and windows.

It is supplied on one single sided disk with a 16-page manual and is installed directly from the disk within minutes. It replaces GDOS, removing the need for it to be in your AUTO folder, and can also replace the ST's system font with a Mac or IBM-style font.

Once NVDI is installed it runs automatically from the AUTO folder. A special configuration accessory is provided to turn GDOS on and off – some programs won't run with GDOS installed – and it has other built-in features such as the mouse accelerator.

NVDI's main claim to fame is its compatibility with virtually all ST software, unlike other accelerators which tend to conflict with some programs.

It is also very fast indeed – use it once and you'll wonder how you ever managed before.

Diamond Back 2 is a utility that no hard disk owner should be without. It makes backing up a hard disk amazingly easy and offers a wide range of options from file and image backup/restore to support for Spectre partitions and high density disks.

Full or incremental backups are also supported so you can do a full hard disk backup once a month, for example, and an incremental backup by archive bit or date once a week or so. Backup sets can be saved and called up whenever necessary.

Files can be compressed or not as required, and disks formatted by the program or simply erased and written over.

Diamond Back doesn't care how many tracks and sectors are present on the disk you insert – it just backs up the data.

If a problem occurs on a disk, the program stops and lets you insert a new disk without you having to start again.

Diamond Back is very user friendly and quite fast, although there are PD/shareware alternatives which are quicker.

Where Diamond Back wins is in its "usability" – with this little utility by your side, backing up a hard disk will never be the chore it once was.

## Naksha hand scanner and Touchup v1.8

Naksha are one of the most respected mouse and peripherals manufacturers which makes their late entry into the hand-held scanner market a little surprising.

They needn't worry too much, however, as this package beats the opposition hands down (pardon the pun).

The scanner head has a similar shape to its competitors but it is much lighter and more comfortable in action. The additional long roller wheels at the back end of the head make scanning far more accurate with less sideways movement.

There are four dithering methods, including one for line art, and three scanning resolutions of 200, 300 or 400dpi as well as a wheel controlling brightness.

The superb software, Touchup v1.8 from Migraph, is an additional bonus. Although very similar to earlier versions, it can now convert mono dithered images scanned with the Naksha scanner into 256-greyscale TIFF format files or IFF format files with 16 greys.

This improves the final output quality considerably, especially when resizing or importing into DTP packages. It is also accompanied by an excellent manual.

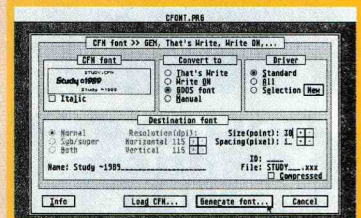

Emulating a PC is harder than a Mac because you have to add a completely different processor, an Initial 80x86 series chip.

Earlier this year Vortex brought out a PC emulator based on the 80386SX chip, a cut-down version of the full 80386 known as the DX.

When it was launched it was pretty well state of the art – unfortunately the 486 chip has now taken over, offering far more power.

All of this doesn't prevent the 386SX emulator from running DOS or even Microsoft Windows programs with ease. The chip runs at 16MHz so it is easily fast enough to run sophisticated industry standard applications such as Lotus 1-2-3.

If you don't need a fully-fledged GDOS font editor but you do want a method of converting Calamus outline fonts into instantly usable GDOS ones, look no further than C-Font.

It is a small utility that will act as a program or as an accessory and will load a Calamus CFN font file and produce a GDOS printer font in any resolution required.

It works particularly well with That's Write, as fonts can be converted via the desk accessory menu and then used without rebooting.

GDOS applications such as Timeworks will require rebooting after the font has been converted but it is still a quick and easy way to expand your range of typefaces.

The Ricoh LP1200 is a top quality laser printer with a budget price tag. It offers 300 and 400dpi resolution with built-in resolution enhancement and claims to be up to 60 per cent faster than the Laserjet IIIP it sets out to emulate.

It also has Proprinter XL24E and Epson FX-850 emulation – useful for ST owners as many packages still don't support Laserjet printing – and six page per minute throughput.

The Ricoh LP1200 is easy to set up although not particularly compact. All the leads are supplied and there is an adequate manual. The LP1200 also has a unique flash ROM facility which allows the controlling software to be updated quickly and easily.

The LP1200 is supplied with 2Mb of RAM as standard and has 14 resident bitmap fonts, including Courier, Prestige, Gothic and Line Printer, which can be selected from the control panel.

Print quality is superb – combined with its low price, this one will be hard to beat.



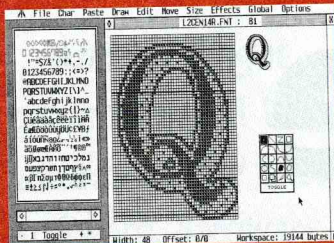

Although 4Mb is the best option, you can go for a 2Mb upgrade first and add another 2Mb later by purchasing industry-standard SIMMs and plugging them straight in. The Xtra-RAM board is simple to fit and the instructions are excellent, covering all possible MMU and video shifter chip arrangements.

Most machines require no soldering and a two-year warranty is offered, along with telephone hotline support. A RAM checking program is also supplied. Forget the 0.5Mb upgrade – go for this one!

If you use packages such as Easy Text Plus/Professional, Timeworks 2, EasyDraw or Silhouette, it will make using fonts considerably easier.

The package is supplied on three disks and includes a good selection of GDOS, screen and downloadable printer fonts. The heart of Fontkit, however, is the font editor and converter which will import fonts in Calamus, HP Laserjet, Apple Macintosh screen, Signum and Degas formats and convert them into GDOS or even That's Write format.

Special effects fonts can be created quickly and easily by loading existing GDOS fonts and applying effects such as shade, shadow or contour.

The next version, Fontkit Plus 4.0, will allow several windows to be open at once and can handle much larger fonts. An essential utility for all GDOS users.

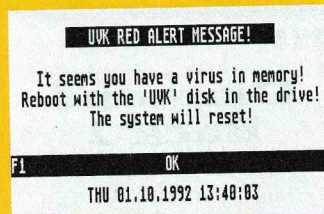
The Ghost Virus is particularly common these days – if your mouse moves in the wrong direction from time to time, the chances are that you're infected.

One of the best virus killers around is the Ultimate Virus Killer, or UVK, written by Richard Karsmakers. It recognises 71 strains of virus and 36 anti-virus boot sectors as well as 89 specialised applications, and is currently at v5.5.

It can scan hard and floppy disks for link viruses and recognises so many boot sectors that it's unlikely to be caught out even by the newest games.

If one of your game disks does get infected, UVK will probably be able to repair the disk's boot sector by checking its built-in database of over 1,200 boot sectors.

UVK is being updated all the time – you can gauge how much work is put into it by the fact that two new releases have appeared since it appeared on our CoverDisk this summer and v5.6 is due out any day now. Not much to pay for peace of mind.

Although the Game with No Name is now playable, there are a few bits and pieces to be added before it is complete. The first to be added is a scoring system. At present each target remains on screen until it is hit. A bit easy-peasy I think you'll agree! OK, so let's make the on screen limited, and get that machine pumping!

There are a few ways we could implement a timer:

1. Simply have a counter which is set when the target is first displayed, and is decremented each time the program loops. When the counter reaches zero, we would remove the target, and set up another.

2. Subtract the current time from the ST, and divide how many seconds to display the target. Keep getting the time until the new time is reached, when the target will be erased and re-displayed at a new location.

3. Set up an interrupt to decrement a counter regularly. The counter would be checked within the loop of the program, and the target erased and moved only when the counter reached zero.

It may seem at first sight that there is much to choose between the methods. The second is probably least desirable, as it means accessing the ST's clock every time round the main program loop. This will slow the program, so we'll discount it.

## Difference

The first and last methods are essentially the same, with one important difference. With the first method, the rate at which the counter is decremented depends solely upon the speed of the program – speed up the program and the counter will decrement more quickly, leading to a far harder game. Therefore, we'll discount that option too.

We're left with the third option (mere coincidence – I think not!) which leads me to teach you a bit about interrupts on the ST.

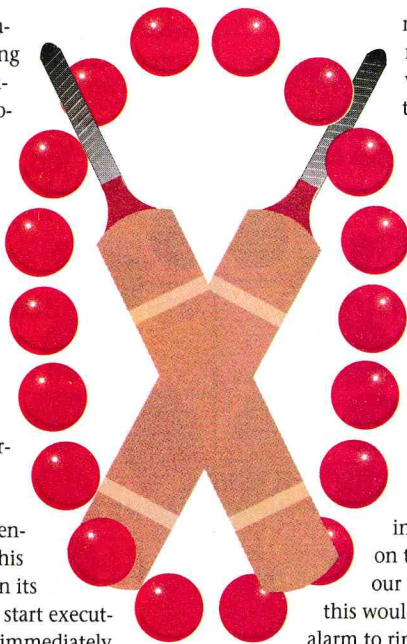
Interrupts are aptly named, because they do exactly what they do! The ST is

essentially only capable of doing one thing at a time (more accurately, the 68000 processor is only capable of doing one thing at a time – the ST has other processors which work in parallel, but let's not confuse the matter).

If the processor is in the middle of performing a task, and we want to interrupt it to do something more important, we can generate an interrupt. This stops the processor in its tracks, and tells it to start executing our instructions immediately. I feel an example coming on...

Let's say I am the processor. I'm sitting here, writing this article. I can only do one thing at a time. The telephone



rings. This interrupts me, I stop writing, and answer the phone. As soon as I hang up the phone, I continue with the article.

So the telephone has generated an interrupt, which I have acknowledged, dealt with, and continued processing.

To complicate matters, there are different levels of interrupt available on the 68000. To carry our analogy further, this would allow the fire alarm to ring. If I was in the middle of my document, the fire alarm would interrupt me, and I would run like hell!

If, while running, the phone rang, I

would ignore it, as it has a lower priority. On the other hand, if I was already interrupted from my writing by the phone, and the fire alarm rang, I would drop the phone and run. The fire alarm has a higher priority than the telephone.

The simplest interrupt on the ST is known as the Vertical Blank Interrupt. To understand what goes on, I'd better explain about the way a TV or monitor displays its picture.

An electron gun fires electrons at your monitor screen. When the electron hits the screen it will produce a small dot. To build up a picture, the gun scans horizontally across the screen from left to right.

On reaching the right-hand side, the gun switches off, and aims back at the left, but a little further down the screen. It now scans again, from left to right, slowly building up the picture.

## Civilised

When it scans across the last line at the bottom of the screen, the gun resets to point back at the top left corner. In the UK (and most other civilised countries) it does this whole operation 50 times every second.

When the gun is flying back to the top, the time taken to do so is known as the vertical blank.

On the ST, when the gun reaches the bottom and flies back to the top, an interrupt is generated. The ST tells the processor to execute some code, as a part of the operating system, which performs a few functions every fiftieth of a second.

Luckily, those clever chaps at Atari have allowed us easy access to this interrupt, so we can add our own routines to be run every fiftieth of a second.

In order to add our own interrupt

## On the disk...

In the CoverDisk this month, take a look at PROG0017.S. This is not part of our game, but a standalone program which shows how to implement a Vertical Blank Interrupt routine on the ST.

The routine actually executed simply draws a vertical bar at the left of the screen repeatedly, one line of pixels being drawn every fiftieth of a second.

The program adds the routine to the table every time the + key is pressed. Run the program and press the Plus key once. You'll see the bar rising up the left of your screen. Now, see if you can guess what will happen when you press the key again. Try it. Were you right?

Effectively, the speed of the bar doubles, because the routine is now being executed twice every fiftieth of a second. Press the key again, and the speed increases as the

routine is run three, then four times every fiftieth of a second.

Pressing the - key removes one of the entries in the table every time it is pressed. So now this has the effect of slowing our moving bar down.

Press it enough times, and the bar will stop. Press any other key, and the program will terminate without clearing down the interrupt table first. So make sure you stop the bar before pressing another key, unless you want a bar scrolling up your Desktop!

Seriously, though, it is very possible to crash your ST if you leave interrupts running, then load and run other programs, so if you have exited the program with the interrupts still running, it's a good idea to reboot before doing any serious work!

routine, we need to let the ST know where the routine is in memory. We do this by putting the address in a table of addresses used by the operating system.

The operating system looks through this table every vertical blank interrupt, and executes all the routines at the addresses specified.

The alternative to this method, which is used on some other systems – and sometimes on the ST for other interrupts – is for our routine to find the address of the routine normally executed during the interrupt, change the address to the address of our routine, and jump to the original routine after executing our own. As you can see, the Atari's method is far cleaner.

## Modes

Unfortunately, there is a problem in accessing the table of addresses. The 68000 has two processing modes – User and Supervisor. Supervisor mode allows us access to certain areas of memory which would give an error if accessed in User mode.

The table we need to update is in this protected memory, so we need a method of switching into Supervisor mode.

There are two ways of getting into Supervisor mode. In one instance, using GEMDOS 32, the processor is put straight into Supervisor mode, and we must remember to return to user mode before exiting.

The second method uses XBIOS 38, which executes a single subroutine in Supervisor mode. This second, less complex, option is the one I have used, as we only need to be in Supervisor mode to set up the interrupt.

The addresses we are interested in on the ST, as far as adding our interrupt routine go, are as follows:

*\$452 – If the word at this address is zero, the Vertical Blank routines will be disabled. As the default is for them to be enabled, our program will not use this word.*

*\$454 – This word holds the number of Long words allowed in the table. This is useful, as it is possible that other programs could have added their own routines to the table, and we will have to search through to find an empty slot – knowing the size of the table allows us to limit our search.*

*\$456 – This Long Word holds the address of the table currently in use.*

So, the sequence of events, to add our routine to the vertical Blank Interrupt Queue are as follows:

- Get the address of the table from \$456.
- Get the Length of the table from \$454.
- Look through the table from beginning to end, looking for a zero Long Word
- If we find one, move the address of our routine to the Long Word.

And that's it! Our routine will now run every 50th of a second.

There are, however, a number of important points to bear in mind when using interrupts of any

description. Firstly, remember that, unless you prevent it in some way, your routine is likely to interrupt itself if it executes for any length of time!

With our example, if the routine takes longer than one fiftieth of a second to execute, another Vertical Blank will interrupt it before it has finished. If this happens you're certainly going to crash your ST.

## Too long

Also, it can be dangerous to execute built-in routines (eg GEMDOS, XBIOS etc) Some of these may use interrupts themselves, or simply take too long. An obvious example would be executing the routine to wait for a vertical blank, from within a vertical blank interrupt!

Error trapping can be even more difficult than ever when using interrupts.

Depending on your assembler package, you may or may not have a debugger. If you have then



## Getting better all the time

The Game with No Name has been improved further this month by the inclusion of the vertical blank interrupt routine, which both animates the target colours, and counts down a timer which is used to move the target regularly.

The new routines are fairly obvious. Load up PROG0018.S and take a look toward the end of the code. New subroutines `inter`, which is the interrupt routine itself, `vert_on` and `vert_off`, which turn the interrupt routine on and off.

## Target

Changes have also been made to the target routines, simply to make life easier when drawing a new target, when the old one has not actually been hit. The new routine, `move_target`, deals with this.

You will see from this that, whenever a target is drawn, the counter is set to a random value between 1 and 255. This has the effect of allowing the target to appear on-screen for between one fiftieth and five seconds. Obviously this figure could be modified to suit.

using it for debugging programs can save a great deal of time. The problem comes when trying to debug programs using interrupts, is that the debugger itself is likely to be interrupted!

So that's it folks. Over the last few months we've gone right through assembler programming, and today should be able to understand how a simple bat and ball game was put together.

## A little flash

While we are playing around with interrupts, I thought we could spice up the graphics a little by doing some colour cycling to animate the target in The Game with No Name..

The ST can display 16 colours on-screen at once as standard. Each of the 16 can be any one of 512 (or 4,096 for the STE) in the ST's colour palette.

I have designed the target used by our game to use only colours 10 through to 14, and the colours I have selected are in increasing brightness from very dark 10, to bright 14.

If we were to change the palette, so that colour 11 became the colour which was allocated to colour 10,

2 became 11 and so on, and repeated this, the effect would be one of movement as the colours changed. In the target sprite, each colour is used for a ring, so the effect is one of a contracting circle.

## Memory location

The ST holds the colour palette information at a specific memory location. Each of the 16 colours on-screen has a word of memory assigned to it, starting at address \$FF8240.

So to achieve our effect, we simply need to move these words around, on a regular basis. The ideal place to do this is in our vertical blank interrupt

routine. The animation would actually appear quite fast if the palette is updated 50 times a second so I have halved this by checking the counter odd before updating the palette.

To do this I have used a new instruction, `BTEST`. This merely tests a single bit of an operand. I used it to test bit zero – the least significant bit of the counter.

As the counter is being updated once every fiftieth of a second, this will be set once every twenty-fifth of a second. You may like to try different values (eg test bit one) to see the results.

ari invited us to get hands-on experience of their new Falcon. Darren Evans came back bubbling with enthusiasm

The Falcon 030 is, without a doubt, a powerful and technically sophisticated machine. Look at its standard features and you'll see that Atari have here a machine that should bring back those who may have been shying away from the current console market.

The Falcon includes the big entertainment software companies who have been reluctant to develop new titles for consoles, as well as those being drawn to the PC console market.

The Falcon, Atari's new generation of console, provides performance, speed, and graphics capability rivalling the best found on PCs. Based on the powerful 68030 32-bit processor, it is powered by a 32MHz Digital Signal Processor (DSP).

The DSP is extremely versatile and powerful. It is already standard in some applications such as the powerful NeXT computer. Its inclusion into the Falcon is a very good move by Atari.

The DSP is not, as is sometimes thought, just restricted to processing audio signals – it is much more versatile than that. For example, the digital signal processing into the DSP could be from a video digitiser so making the DSP capable of image processing.

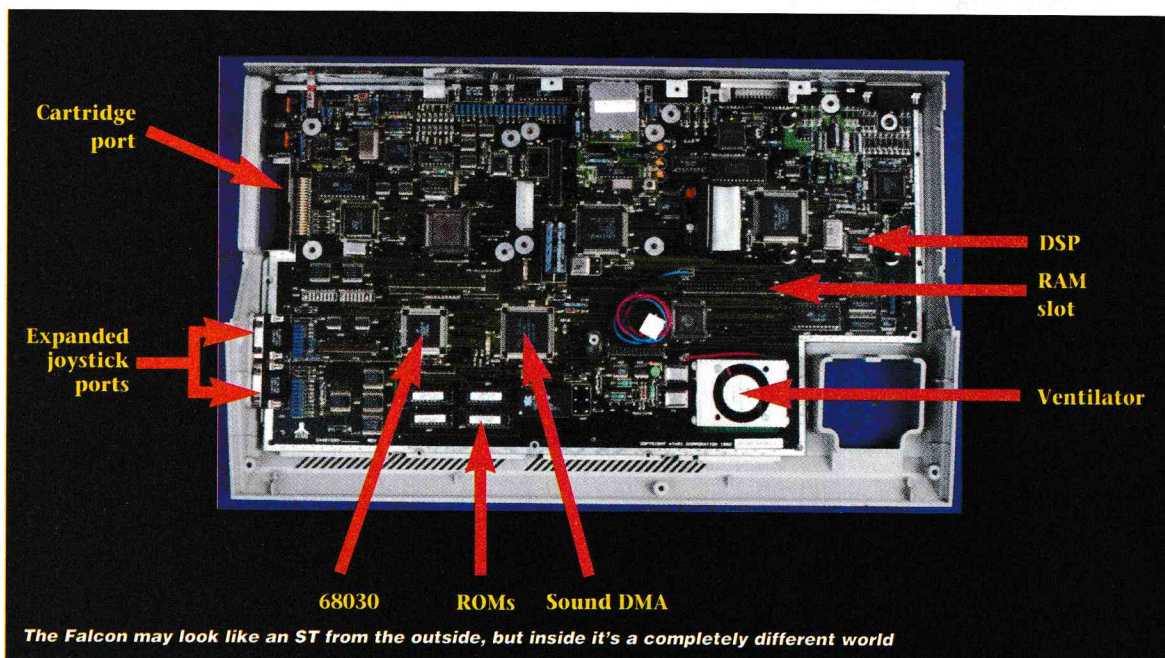
The DSP also provides some very useful arithmetic abilities, being capable of calculating scalar, vector and matrix calculations – all handy in 3D graphics processing.

The DSP is capable of modulating and demodulating an incoming phone signal in realtime, hence the possibility of the DSP replacing the modem in high speed software.

The abilities of the DSP, in addition to the already powerful processing speed of the 68030, make for a level of power that is many times greater than that provided by other popular home computers.

With such capabilities as electronic mail, fax and telecommunications, the Falcon can provide users with a viable alternative to the higher priced PCs.

As a games machine, the Falcon is technically superior to today's home consoles as well as the current consoles offered by Sega and Nintendo.



# High flying Falcon

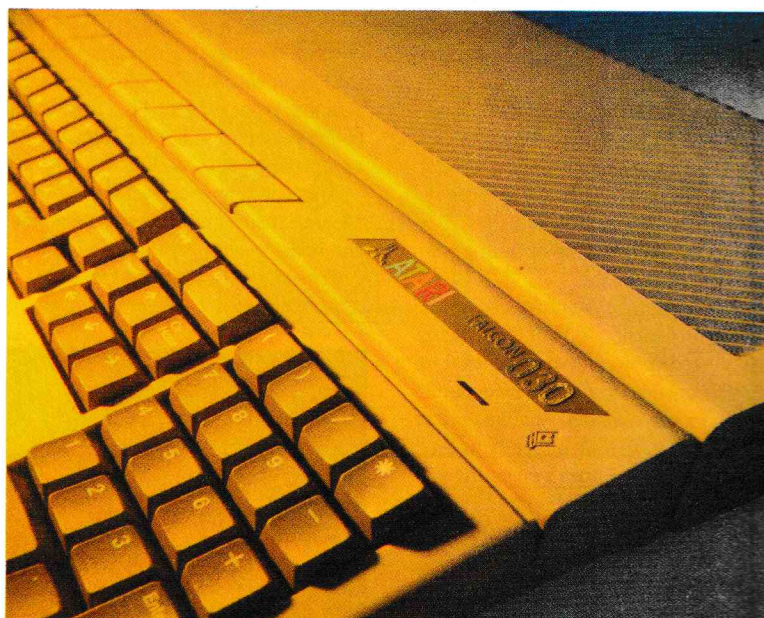
It is up to Atari to somehow wow the console-owning community into realising the limited abilities of consoles compared to the versatility of the Falcon.

It is common knowledge that the trend from one console to another tends to be based on the 'It plays better games' philosophy, which generally means it has better graphics, better sound and has additionally been accompanied by slick, hi-tech TV adverts to enforce the fact.

The Falcon scores over the consoles in both graphics and sound quality. With direct memory access (DMA) enabling communication with external peripherals such as CD-ROMs and hard disks, Falcon's audio system allows the recording of eight channel 16-bit data and then playing back four channels of 16-bit stereo data.

Also, with sample rates of up to 50kHz, Falcon has better sound quality than compact discs, which have a 41kHz sample rate, and digital audio tape at 48kHz.

Realtime audio special effects are also possible through the use of a standard microphone plugged directly into the Falcon. Using a program that lets users adjust certain parameters of the DSP, voice signals entering the chip via the microphone are processed resulting in effects such as flange, echo and reverb.



Graphics are equally impressive, with a maximum screen resolution of 768 x 480 (with overscan) and a staggering 65,536 colours from a 262,144 colour palette. Other modes include 256 colour and the ST-compatible modes of low, medium and high resolution.

Such high resolution colour modes will produce some stunning games, usually only found on PCs, with the true colour mode ideal for producing near-

photo quality images and stunning ray traced pictures. Just take a look at the picture produced by the Falcon on the next page. It uses a mere 256 colours and the quality is still superb. Imagine it in 65,536 colours!

Manipulating such huge amounts of graphics data is where the DSP will excel, taking the strain off the 68030 and thereby enabling programmers to create extremely fast graphic applica-

tions and games.

There is already one well known and respected company working on a true colour art package. TruePaint from Hisoft will be one of the first software titles to appear on the Falcon.

It is the first art package to take advantage of its true colour mode. It works in all resolutions including the 768 x 480, multi-window environment and animation facilities. Graphic formats include IFF, TIFF JPEG and more.

Mirage are currently working on Space Junk, an RPG type space game featuring specially designed digitised latex puppets with which you can converse.

The operating system shown to us did not have multi-tasking ability. However, it is believed that when the machine becomes generally available, the MultiTOS multi-tasking operating system will be standard.

The operating system we saw was apparently version 4.0 but is still being completed. Essentially it is identical to 2.06 with additional features to handle the extra video modes. Anyone used to the ST will have little difficulty in getting used to the Falcon's operating system.

When it comes to communicating with the outside world, the Falcon has some pretty impressive output ports. Three of the most important are the DSP, SCSI 2 and LAN. The SCSI 2 port, the most interesting of the three, enables you to connect standard SCSI devices such as CD-ROMs (even those designed for other machines), hard drives and Floptical drives.

The DSP port is also interesting as hardware manufacturers will be able to design hardware to be controlled by the Falcon's DSP – such specialist equipment spectral analysers and robotic systems. The LAN port (Local Area

Network) allows easy construction of a network of Falcons. Other ports include headphone and microphone sockets, 9-pin modem port, RF port for connecting a normal TV, printer port and a video port for connecting VGA monitors.

There are also the standard Midi ports, cartridge slot and also the expanded joystick ports as found on the STE. Annoyingly, the infamous mouse ports are still in that frustrating position found on standard STs

And while on the subject of bad points, I consider the decision to place the Falcon within a ST-type case rather a bad one. What is needed is a new casing to enforce the fact that the Falcon is a new platform of computers.

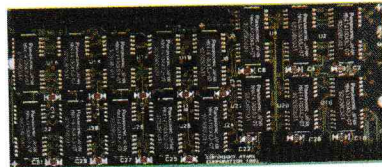
Atari could have at least put it in a Mega ST casing and given it a separate and better quality keyboard.

The standard 1Mb Falcon is easily upgraded to either 4Mb or the maxi-

mum 14Mb via slot in RAM boards. With the large amounts of memory required when using the high resolutions even 4Mb would have been restrictive for the graphic applications which the Falcon can use.

Besides the ability to attach external hard drives via the SCSI 2 port, there is also the IDE interface into which the extremely compact, internal IDE drives – which the 4Mb, £899 Falcon has as standard – can be installed.

The Falcon deserves to be successful if not for the new technology alone, but I can't help feeling that Atari have not got things entirely together with their marketing image and there may be problems in delivering the machine.

Such problems will damage Falcon's impact on the market and lessen its effect on the competition, Commodore's Amiga 1200 and the console arena.

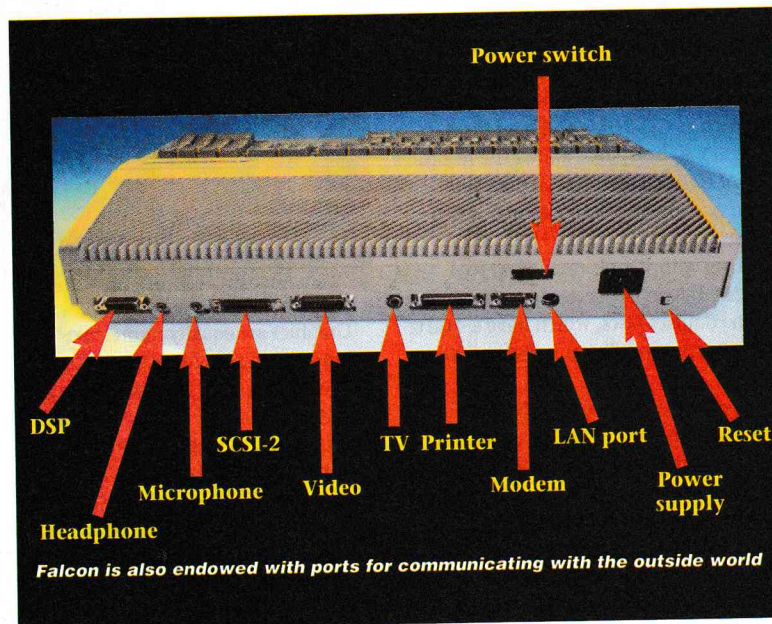

Slow driving

Please help me. I have a ST with a Megafile20 hard drive attached. With the drive now nearly packed with data, I am experiencing extremely annoying delays when transferring files to and from the hard disk and from partition to partition. When the hard drive is reading or writing, the busy light seems to pulsate quite a number of times before actually writing the data.

This is extremely annoying when

copying large numbers of files and is getting on my nerves. What is wrong? Is it my Megafile or is it my ST that is causing the problems?

Does your ST have TOS v1.2 by any chance? If so, this may be the cause of the problem.

You see, the disk access routines are not exactly efficient when it comes to reading from and writing to the hard disk.

Upgrading to TOS v1.4 or higher will greatly improve the performance of any disk I/O.

Also, does your hard drive data have deeply embedded directories? If so, accessing these can be very time consuming when using TOS v1.0.

Heavy disk fragmentation may also be the cause too. Fragmentation means that a single file is split up into numerous parts over the hard disk instead of being continuous.

There are a number of PD de-fragmenters which clean up this fragmentation and it may be worthwhile obtaining one of these.

Dirty driving

Please find enclosed one of a number of disks that are being damaged every time I try to use them with my ST's internal drive.

This is a fairly recent occurrence and it has got to the stage where I just cannot use my internal drive any more.

Luckily, I have a hard disk but I am unable to play any games at the moment because I am not prepared to risk my expensive games collection to my obviously damaged drive.

Should I just get another completely new drive or is it possible to repair the drive?

I tried the disk that you included and I too could not read it. I couldn't even re-format it, so that suggests that there is some dirt on your disk drives head or the heads have been scratched by dirt and are now scratching the surface of any disks you put in it.

Before rushing out to buy another replacement disk drive, try cleaning the heads using any of the commercially available disk cleaning kits. This may clear up the problem.

Colourful art

Last month I bought a Citizen Swift 24e from a friend of mine and having a great interest in art packages, I was eager to print out some of the artwork that I have done using Neochrome Master and Hyperpaint.

Unfortunately, I cannot seem to get the printer to reproduce the colours on-screen. Instead, it prints only in one colour every time.

Is there something wrong with the printer or is it a problem with the art packages?

## Crossed wires

I have a Hitachi TV/monitor and would like to use this on my Atari STE.

I have a monitor lead from the ST and a 7-pin plug for the monitor. I would be grateful if you could provide me with the pin connections that need to be made.

The manual for the monitor lists the pins as: 1 Red input, 2 Green input, 3 Blue input, 4 Sync input (negative), 5 Earth, 6 Audio input and 7 Not connected.

Your ST's manual should contain details of the (13-pin) assignments for the ST's monitor outputs. The Green, Red, Blue and Earth pin numbers are 6, 7, 10 and 13 respectively.

You must connect the ST's audio out (pin 1) to your Hitachi monitor's audio input. The next tricky bit is in joining the ST's two sync pins (pins 9 and 12) to form a composite signal.

This requires that you add a 4,700 Ohm in-line resistor to each of the ST's sync output pins and then join them together. You should then connect this to your monitor's sync input pin.

## In and out

I have built an input/output port for my ST which currently uses the joystick port for the input side.

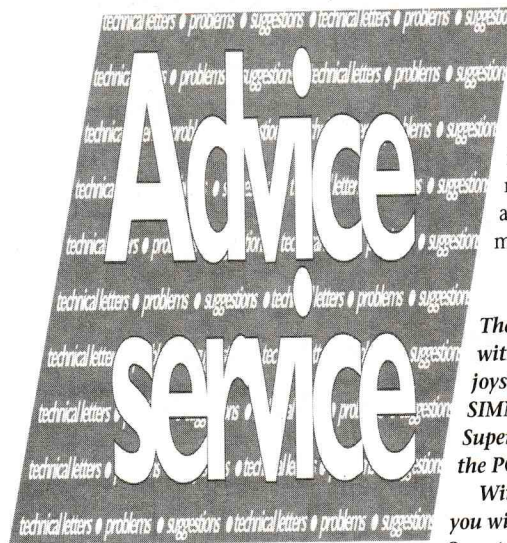
I would prefer to use the printer port for both input and output but I need to know which register is used to change the data direction.

I have a Mega ST2 upgraded to 4Mb with an internal 1Mb drive and a Megafile 30 hard drive.

Bit 7 of register 7 of the programmable sound generator (PSG) is responsible for the data direction of the parallel port.

If set, the port is output. If cleared, it is input. To set this bit, the value of 7 - for the register number - should be written to \$ff8800 as a byte.



Then 128 should be written to \$ff8802 as a byte. To reset the bit, simply write zero instead of 128. You should then be able to read data from register 15 by writing 15 to \$ff8800, then reading a byte from \$ff8802.

## Virus attack

Strange things are afoot with my Atari STE. During use, the mouse pointer suddenly decides that it's getting bored with moving up when the mouse moves up and decides to move in the opposite direction instead.

The same thing happens when I try to move the mouse down, it goes up instead. Is my STE taking the mickey or is my mouse faulty?

Oh deary dear. You seem to have contracted the most common virus on the ST - the Ghost virus. This annoying and potentially software damaging virus suddenly rears its ugly head in the form of reversed joystick controls in the vertical axis.

I suggest you obtain a good virus killer, such as Ultimate Virus Killer from Douglas Communications on 061-456 9587 and then sit down to a good virus killing session with all your disks.

To prevent viruses from spreading, get into the habit of write-protecting all of your disks.

## Hard bargains

At a recent computer hardware auction, I managed to obtain quite a few items that I would hopefully be able to use with my STE. The items in question are an analogue joystick, a Soundblaster sound card, a Quantum hard drive

mechanism, a Super VGA graphics card and 6 SIMM cards (with 9 chips on each).

I realise the STE uses SIMMS for it's memory, but I am reluctant to just plug them in as I'm worried about damaging my computer.

The only items that you can use with your STE are possibly the joystick, the hard drive and the SIMMS. The Soundblaster and Super VGA cards are specific to the PC only.

With regards to the hard drive, you will have to remove the Quantum mechanism and purchase a interface and a power supply in order to connect it to your STE. The interface you should look at is The Link by ICD. This is available from Power Computing and also comes with excellent ICD hard drive software.

Those joystick ports on the side of the STE should be able to accomodate an analogue joystick but I can't think of any software for the STE with which you could test it. As for the SIMMS, they should be compatible with your STE. Just plug 'em in and go.

## Accessory knowledge

Being very new to the ST scene (I've had one about two months now) I am still coming to grips with all the lingo and various aspects of the ST operating system.

Some of the things that confuse me are the various types of files that can be run from the Desktop.

What are the differences between files ending with TTP, ACC, TOS, PRG? Also, why is it only possible for non-GEM programs to be launched from the AUTO folder?

Although the differing types of files may seem somewhat confusing to the newcomer, they give the ST great versatility. I will attempt to explain each file type in the order you listed them.

TTP files (TTP is short for TOS Takes Parameters) are files that request information, sometimes referred to as "arguments", from the user before the actual program is run.

When you double click on a TTP file, you will get a parameters box on-screen which allows you to enter the information. This information you enter is dependent upon what commands the TTP file you are running accepts.

For example, a file called LHARC.TTP is used in the process to

compress files to save space on our CoverDisk (files compressed with LHARC.TTP are recognised by the fix .LZH). LHARC.TTP can accept a number of commands in the parameters box such as -x for extracting files.

So if you have a compressed file on disk called FONTS.LZH and you want to extract the files within it using LHARC.TTP, you would double click on LHARC.TTP and would then be presented with the parameters box.

You would then type -x FONTS into the parameters box and when LHARC.TTP executes, it looks at the parameters you typed in and acts on them. In this case the -x FONTS.L means extract.

ACC stands for accessory and indicates a program that can be activated from the Desk menu item from the Desktop.

These files are constantly in memory and are also immediately available from within other programs. While in a wordprocessor program for example, you might find that there is no function for formatting a disk.

However, you have a file called FORMAT.ACC which you put in the root directory of your wordprocessor disk (all ACC files need to be in the root directory for them to automatically load into memory).

When you execute the wordprocessor, the FORMAT.ACC also loads and can be found in the Desk menu selection. When you activate this accessory from the Desk selection, it will execute and allows you to format a disk.

When you have formatted a disk and quit from the accessory, you are then returned to the wordprocessor.

TOS files are programs that do not use menus or windows at all. They are purely text-based programs. When a TOS program is run, you will notice that the screen is cleared and the program title that usually appears at the top centre of the screen is not present.

PRG is the most common file type on the ST and generally denotes a GEM program. However, a TOS program that doesn't use menus can be renamed to have a .PRG suffix and it will still operate OK, although the screen is not cleared and it will look messy.

In answer to your last question, you cannot place GEM programs in the AUTO folder because such programs are executed before the GEM routines in the ST's operating system are initialised.

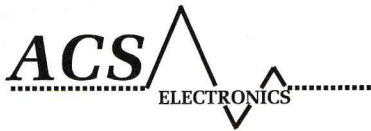
This means that these routines are not available to AUTO programs. Any program which tries to use these routines will crash the ST. All AUTO programs, even though they do not use GEM, must be of type .PRG.

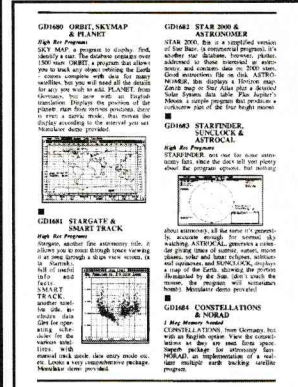

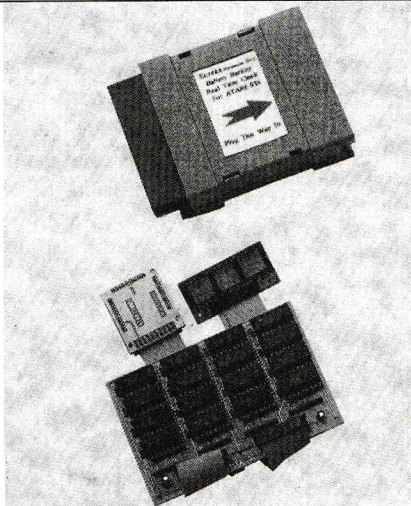

I was never any good at general knowledge. Even at school they used to decide which quiz team I'd end up joining by going through a random process involving straws of varying length.

So it's not very surprising that while playing this extremely playable and entertaining quiz game I managed to attain the rank of office dumb.

Trying to write a PD column wearing a conical hat displaying a large character from the fourth position of the alphabet is not very easy, I can tell you.

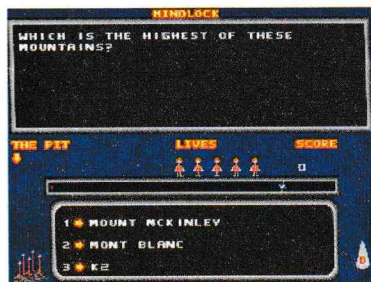
However, I persevered and I can tell you this is one of those games that has you playing again and again. Mindlock is reminiscent of the computer quiz game machines you find in many a pub. You have to answer questions posed to you by the computer within a certain time limit.

In Mindlock, the number of questions you have to answer is determined on the Skillmaster screen. Here you are presented with a grid of numbers with a flashing cursor randomly highlighting various numbers.

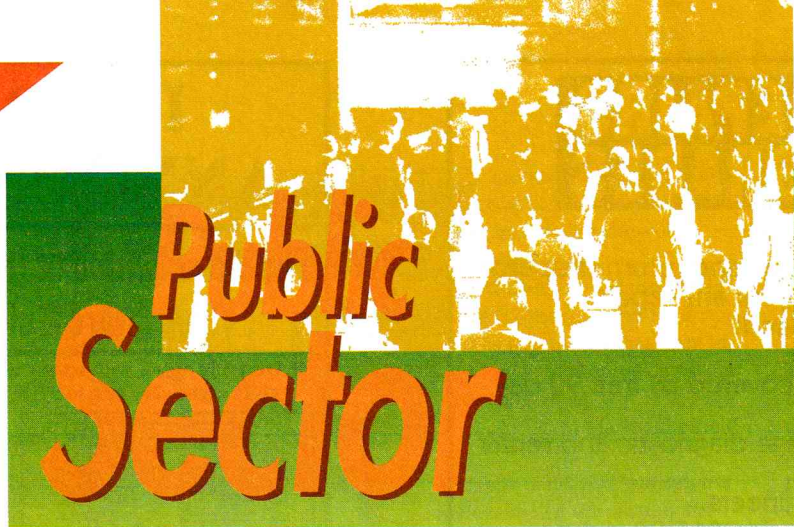
At the press of a key, the flashing cursor stops and the number it highlights is the number of questions you have to answer.

The game consists of "rounds" with each round broken down into three stages. Stage 1 is where you answer general knowledge questions covering a wide and varied range of topics.

When you have completed stage 1,

you are transferred to Stage 2, the "cliffhanger" screen, where your skill in mathematics is tested.

If you manage to complete this stage, the final stage is where you are given questions regarding the English language. You may be asked a question about a particular word or to give the definition of the word.

Every time you successfully complete a round you will be given the chance to bump up your score by up to 5,000 extra points. This Bonus section increases in difficulty with each round.

When a question is posed, you are given three possible answers with only one being correct. You select the answer you think is correct by pressing the appropriate number on the keypad of the ST.

You only have a limited time to answer, indicated by the rotating blue star at the bottom of the screen. You have to answer the question before the star stops rotating.

Once you select the answer, you will be told if it is correct or not and your score will be incremented or decremented. For each game, your lives con-

sist of Clarences, little people who will suffer a horrible fate at your every failure to answer correctly.

Each Clarence has three lives and every wrong answer loses one of them. When a Clarence is on its last life, an incorrect answer will make it suffer a rather spiky demise and it will then ascend to Heaven.

The game ends when all your Clarences have snuffed it, at which point if you have achieved a high score, you may enter your name into the high score table which is saved to disk.

Mindlock has 300 general knowledge questions and 100 questions for stages two and three. Five hundred questions should keep anyone busy for some time. Also, because the answers and questions are contained in files, the author is able to provide alternative files for a fee.

Mindlock is a shareware product and the registration fee is £5. When you register, you will be given first choice of updated questions and answer files for Mindlock, which will cost you £3.50 as opposed to £7 for non-registered users and you will also receive priority information on new programs.

I thoroughly enjoyed playing Mindlock and think it is well worth the £5 registration fee, so if you like the odd quiz challenge, you will find this program hard to beat for the price.

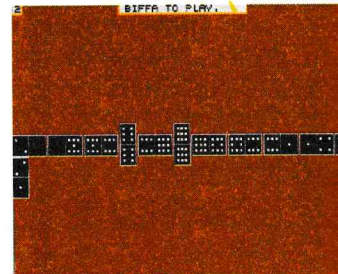
First Dominoes

I never could gain any interest in game at all. The only time I ever touched a domino was when my little brother spent three hours carefully lining up his collection ready for toppling.

He'd just reached the 200 mark when a streak of pure evil overcame me, I picked up a nearby domino and nonchalantly flicked it towards the start domino.

I expected it to miss but with supernatural accuracy, it hit and sent three hours of careful arranging up the spout.

However, although the game bore me to tears, being the comprehensive columnist that I am, I have persevered with it and managed to stay awake long enough to provide those of you who like dominoes with this review. So (yawn) here goes.

According to the author, First Dominoes is said to be the first real computerised version of dominoes on any computer.

The game uses a double nine set of dominoes (whatever that means), plus a nine-domino-per-player game, plus matchplay-type single games and usual standard legal move techniques (which I think, means it doesn't cheat).

The game supports two to five players – one human and one to four computer controlled – so if you can't find anyone else to play, you can test your skills against the computer.

The first thing to do when you run the program is to enter the names of the players who are going to take part.

Once done, clicking on the SAVE button on the screen will save all current names thereby negating the need to re-enter the names every time you load the game again. To make things

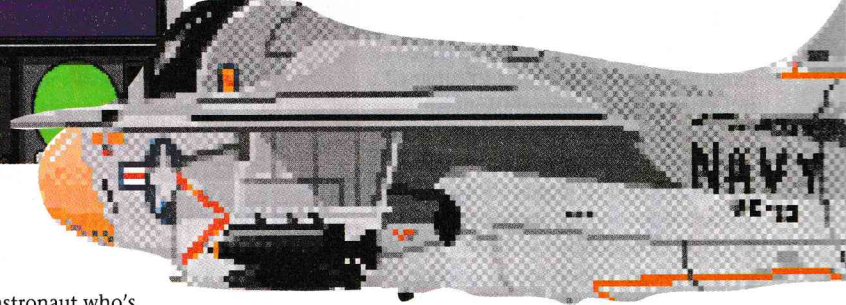

You can then scroll through the memory using the arrow keys, looking for the screen image that was displayed when you pressed reset.

Once found, pressing the spacebar saves the image to disk in standard Degas lo-res format.

Picture Hunter will not work with all programs however. Those programs which change the reset vector themselves will just erase the information that Picture Hunter put there, thereby disabling Picture Hunter.

Also, if you are intending to grab pictures from commercial software such as games, don't. It's illegal and you'll have the FAST boys (and girls) on your tail if you incorporate the image into any of your own programs.

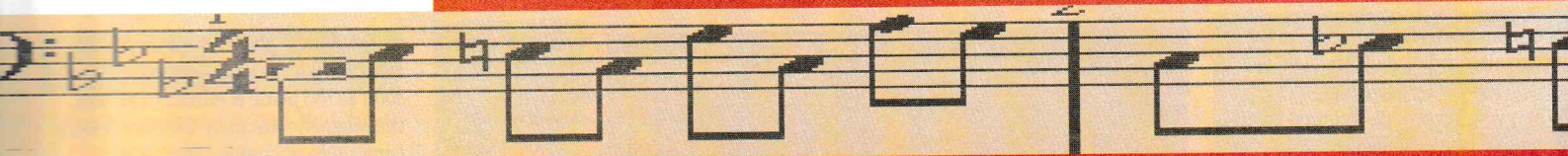
The actual samples are not exactly of brilliant quality, but I guess that fitting as many as possible onto one disk required that they be sampled at a fairly low rate to save memory.

**T**he two best-known sequencers are C-Lab's Notator and Steinberg's Cubase. Although the prices of both these programs have recently dropped to around £300, that's still a hefty price if you only want to dabble.

Both C-Lab and Steinberg have budget versions of their biggies - C-Lab's Notator Alpha and Steinberg's Cubeat. Alpha offers scoring but will only print out four staves. Cubeat has no scoring facilities at all. Cubase Lite would seem to fill the gap.

It's a rather, er, lighter program than Cubase - both in terms of features and price! - but it still retains the familiar look and feel of its big brother.

### One song

Lite (review version 1.0) isn't copy-protected - 11 out of 10 for this, Steinberg. On booting you are presented with an Arrange screen very like Cubase, although with a few less buttons. Lite only has 16 tracks although that will be enough for most users at this level. It can also only store one song or arrangement in memory.

But the main features are still there - the Cubase arrange facilities. Each music Part is shown as a small rectangle which you can drag around the screen to any

Track and apply copy, cut and paste operations to it.

For example, if you have recorded a two-bar bass line which you want to use throughout a piece, you can simply copy it, drag it to the end of itself and transpose it. It's a great way of working and is one of the major reasons why Cubase is so popular.

You can move quickly to any part of a song using Cue Points. Movement through the music is controlled in now-standard fashion with typical tape recorder transport controls. Two columns to the left of the track List show Midi activity on the Tracks and let you mute individual tracks.

A large Solo button at the bottom left of the screen will solo the currently-highlighted track. You can record in Cycle mode in which the program cycles continuously through a part while you add new lines to it each time through.

Some people find this useful for creat-

ing drum tracks although I much prefer to record each drum on a separate track and merge them later.

### Useful

When you move or copy a part to another track, it will play on that track's Midi channel but by setting the track's Chn column to "No", it will play back using the Midi channel with which it was recorded. It's useful, but it's not as flexible as being able to change a part's transmission channel.

When creating arrangements you can put a part on top of other parts. This is useful for creating upbeats or adding small ornaments to a drum track, for

example. You can physically merge parts, too.

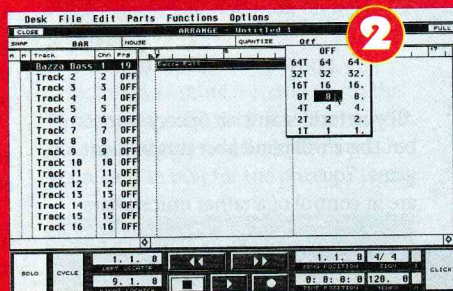
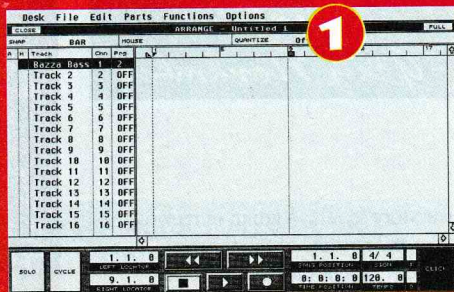
You can also create Ghost Parts which contain the same Midi data as the original part but which can be played on different channels. Any alteration made to the original automatically affects any Ghosts. These are useful to create Midi delays, layered sounds and so on.

Quantisation is used to correct sloppy timing and pulls notes onto certain divisions of the beat. Quantisation is fairly basic in Lite in that notes are fully quantised.

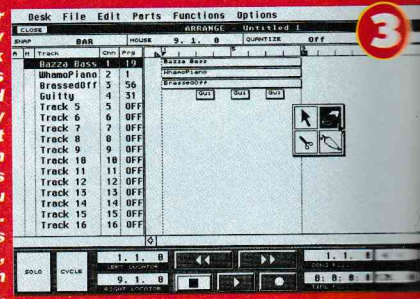
There are no half quantisation or "feel" settings which are found in more

# Creating and printing out a song

**1** First, the setting up. Double click in the Track Name column to name it. Select the required Midi channel and a voice number in the Prg column. Adjust the tempo. Set the Left and Right Locators to mark out the number of bars you want to record. Ensure Click is on if you want a Metronome click and switch Cycle on or off depending on whether you want the recording to loop. Click on the Record button and after a one-beat count in, off you go.

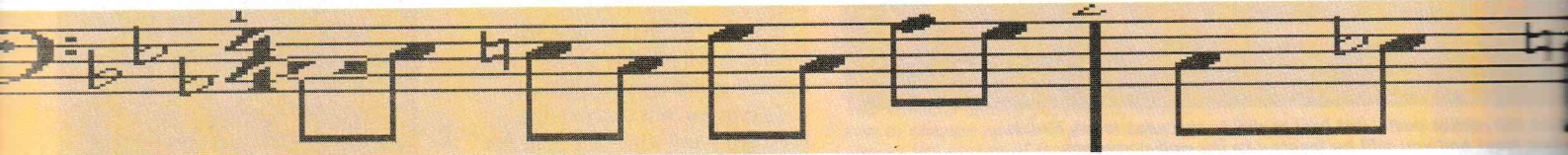


**2** Carry on in a similar manner recording different Tracks. Copy these and place them on any Track and in any position. Short phrases can easily and quickly be scattered around the score as in the Guilty Part. Pressing and holding the right mouse button produces a four-item Toolbox - Pointer, Eraser, Scissors and Paste. Point to the tool you require and release the button. These are used to move parts around the window, delete them, cut them into bits and stick them together again.



**3** Recording will cease when you reach the Right Locator although Playback will continue (there's nothing to play back at the moment).

Click on the Stop button to stop recording and your recording, known as a Part, will appear as a black bar. It will take the same name as the Track but you can double click on it and change it. You want to quantise it, choose a quantise value and select Over Quantise from the Functions menu.



## Bottom line

**FEATURES:** Cubase Lite is the cheapest sequencer with built-in scorewriting and printing – and it does a good job. However, the score is the only way to edit the music – you'll find editing difficult if you're not an ace with "the dots".

**EASE OF USE:** The visual Arrange window is the best method of creating and organising a song yet. It's ideal for use in education and for beginners and seasoned musos who don't want to spend a fortune on a sequencer.

market sequencers such as Cubase and Notator. The hidden column to the right of the Arrange and Prg columns in the Track list (you can drag the Arrange window to the right to reveal it) lets you set a volume level for each track. This is useful for balancing sounds relative to each other, although it works on a track basis and not a Midi channel basis so you have to bear this in mind. You can alter a Part's Velocity from the Arranger menu which can help with volume balance, too.

## Notation

If you're familiar with music notation one of Lite's main attractions will be the ability to see and edit the score in notation form and print it out. You can select as many parts as you like for editing in the Score page. The page can only show around three parts at once although you can scroll through the window to show the others. There are lots of facilities to help you get the best out of this page. There's a Snap function plus a Snap function which restricts note editing with the mouse to certain note values. The Score Display lets you decide how the score will look on the staff. You can choose single or double (grand) staves and

select the split point. There's an Auto Clef function too, which lets the program decide if the bass or treble clef is best for showing a part.

Auto Quantise has several options in a sub menu which help display the score correctly. Syncopes shows syncopated notes in a more legible way. You can set the key signature, here, too.

Notes and rests can be inserted by clicking them into place with Note and Rest tools, and you can insert notes in step time from a Midi keyboard. You can select notes and change their pitch and note on and note off velocities from a Midi keyboard, too. Setting up a Loop

independent of the Cycle function on the main page lets you hear a section of music while editing it.

However, as notation is the only form of editing available, you can't edit any other type of Midi messages such as controller messages or even program changes.

## Printing

And so to the printout. You load a printer driver in the Printer Setup window. Epson, Atari, NEC and Seikoshia printer drivers are supplied along with IBM nine-pin and a HP LaserJet driver. The only other options here let you alter the margins.

The Print option lets you select the range of pages you wish to print and select Fast or Best print quality.

There is no text or lyrics option or facility for adding music symbols. Many bells and whistles which appear on more upmarket score printing programs are missing. The program does a good job of arranging the score – certainly for a program in this price range – but you must be aware of its limitations.

Lite can handle Midi files – essential in modern-day sequencers – but unlike Cubase it can't handle Pro-24 files or individual arrangements, parts, drum

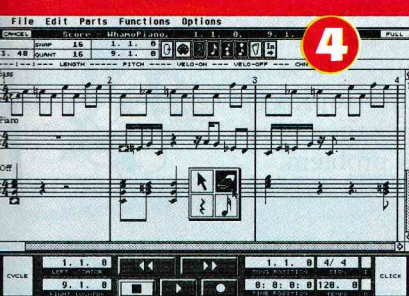
maps and so on. Most functions and operations have keyboard short-cuts. The manual is clear and informative but an index would be even more useful than five pages of contents.

Cubase Lite is an excellent budget-priced sequencer for anyone who likes working with the dots or who wants to print out basic music scores. You just have to make sure that you won't need any of the editing facilities which are missing.

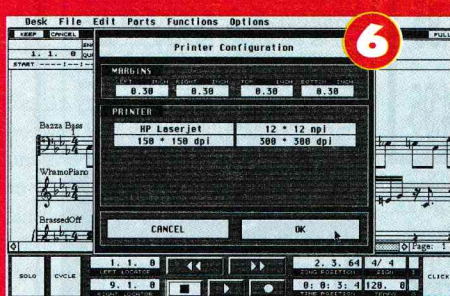
When a manufacturer decides to produce a budget version of their best-selling sequencer, it's always difficult to know what to leave out.

Steinberg have targeted a particular aspect of the sequencer market and what Lite sets out to do, it does very well. For the notation-oriented musician on a budget it's worth serious consideration.

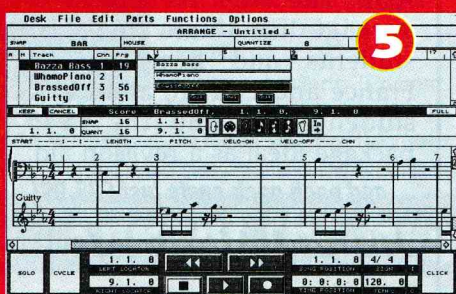


Select a part or number of parts (shift and click) and choose **Edit** from the **Edit** menu to enter the Score page. You can edit notes here by clicking on them and dragging them to a new position. The Score page has its own Toolbox, too, with a Pointer, Eraser, Rest and Note tools. Use the scroll bars to scroll to different parts. Keep or Cancel any changes you make by clicking on the relevant box in the upper left of the window.

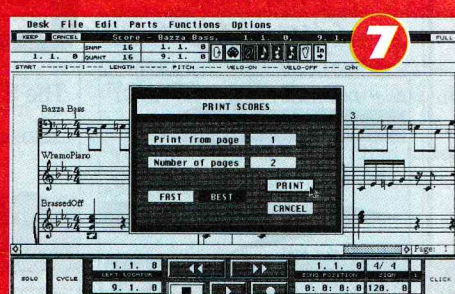


Edit the score using the numerous facilities mentioned in the main text. When it looks the way you want it, load a printer driver. Adjust the paper margins if necessary.

You can resize the Arrange and Score windows so both are on-screen at the same time. Click on the Full box in the upper right of the windows to toggle them between full size and the last size you made them. It's sometimes useful to be able to see both windows at once. There's an Undo function but don't forget to save often while editing!



The final stage is to print out the score – and very good it looks, too!

Over the past three issues we've looked at all the program's functions and you should be able to record and edit your own music. In this final part we have a collection of hints and tips.

## Keeping it human

The criticism often levelled at sequenced music is that it's robotic and mechanical. This can be caused by too much quantisation.

In many cases you'll find that quantisation works fine with no ill side-effects. If your music is starting to sound mechanical, take it easy with the quantisation function.

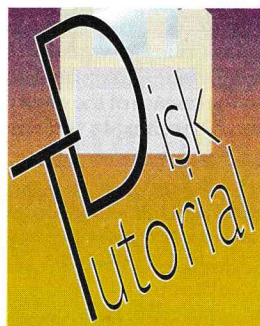
Drums generally always sound OK when quantised as their job is to provide a steady beat.

Another humanisation ploy is to vary the velocity of notes and here the random velocity function can be very useful. Again, drums can benefit most from this, particularly to remove the machine gun effect which is often apparent when you program 1/16th notes on the hi-hat.

Add accents to bass and snare drums by increasing their velocity manually in the Event editor.

## Tempo track

Many pieces of music contain tempo changes, often near the end where they slow down or rall. The way to create these is to record the piece all at one tempo and then program tempo changes later. It's a good idea to use a dedicated tempo track rather than insert tempo data in several different Phrases. Midistudio uses Controller 120 to

control tempo. You can insert a tempo change instruction at any point in a track and create changes using the Insert Scaled Control option in the Editor.

You'll probably find that a change every half bar – 12 clicks – is sufficient although it will depend on how quickly and smoothly you want the change to take place.

## Fade ins and outs

You can create fade ins and outs in two ways – using the Insert Scaled Control function and Scale Velocity. We covered these last month. However, it's important to understand the difference between velocity and volume

Although velocity is almost always linked to volume levels – the harder you play, the greater

the velocity values of the notes and the greater the resulting volume – it can also affect tone, the pan position of a sound and many other parameters.

If it is linked to tone you will find that a sound becomes less bright as you reduce the velocity. This can be useful although for most fades it's probably better to use volume control.

An added advantage is that volume messages move the faders on the Desk.

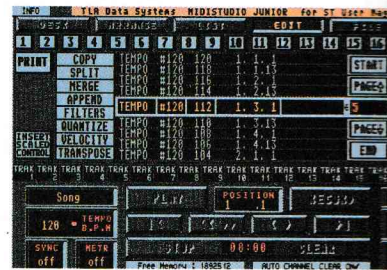
## Creating harmonies

You can create instant harmonies using the transpose function. You can apply this to a track on the Desk or transpose a copy of a Phrase in the Editor.

Useful transpositions are thirds, fourths and fifths. However, any transposition you make will be a chromatic one and not take into account the scale so you will probably have to make some adjustments after transposing. For example, the first few notes of a scale of C in thirds is:

C(A)	D(B)	E(C)	F(D)	G(E)	A(F)
-3	-3	-4	-3	-3	-4

The thirds are in brackets with the semitone transposition below them. So if you applied a global -3 transposition

to music part you would have to adjust some of the notes to produce a correct harmony.

## Drum tracks

Many beginners have problems creating good drum tracks. The first step is to work out a good drum pattern.

Dedicated music magazines often have articles on drum pattern programming and there are music books containing drum patterns.

Use two or more hi-hat sounds to add tonal variation. Also, try applying pitch bend to a drum – this can be very effective, especially with toms, and you can create Indian tabla drum effects by bending the pitch.

The object is to simulate the natural changes of tone which occur live because a drummer doesn't hit a drum in exactly the same place every time.

## Exotic

You can also add extra drum hits throughout a song, rather than simply repeating a couple of patterns. Try throwing in a few exotic percussion instruments, too, such as agogos and bongos. These can fit well into rock and pop songs if used tastefully.

If you record each drum into a separate Phrase while constructing your drum track you retain flexibility when it comes to putting them together.

We used this method to create the 12-bar blues demo song in the first tutorial. You can merge the tracks later if you wish although it won't hurt to keep them separate unless you need to free-up some tracks.

## Caught the bug?

By now you should be an expert Midistudio Junior user, able to use all its functions to create music in a way which is not possible using a multi-track tape recorder or any other method.

As you experiment with the program

and your knowledge of sequencing grows, there may be operations you wish to perform which Junior can't manage. That may be the time to consider an upgrade.

Midistudio Master works in the way as Junior but has been updated in every

department – the result of a two-year long rewrite. It has all the features you would expect to find in a top-level program and you can load the files you've created with Junior into it. See the reader offers for a special ST User price.

# These are the

# FAX

*André Willey examines some major contenders for the fledgling Atari ST fax market*

**M**ost businesses, and now a growing number of homes, possess fax technology. It has quickly replaced telex as the de facto standard for sending urgent messages around the world, with the added bonus of being able to send any printed document – even photographs.

In its simplest form, a fax machine consists of just three elements – a scanner to digitise your documents before sending them, a modem to translate that information into a form which may be passed along a telephone wire, and finally some sort of printer to create the hard copy at the other end.

Since many documents are now created using computers – either via a wordprocessor or a DTP package – it would make sense to cut out the printing/scanning stages and send the fax directly from the computer's memory.

Even better, it would be possible to read incoming faxes on the computer screen, thus saving yet another forest from being decimated to supply our insatiable desire for paper

## Cheap

Although cheap modems designed for this task have been available for some time as plug-in cards for IBM PCs, the only option for the ST was the ludicrously expensive Fast-FAX unit from Michtron.

For around £600 you could have a dedicated fax modem, which couldn't even be used to contact an ordinary bulletin board

Now, as the prices of modems have plummeted, you can buy a dual operation modem (which will handle 2,400 bps communication using V42bis compression, as well as sending and receiving faxes) for under £150.

The latest state-of-the-art unit, which will also give you high speed V32bis (14,400 bps) modem communication, will only cost another £100 or so.

As far as fax software goes there are two major contenders – one from the USA and the other from Germany. The US offering, STraight FAX!, comes from Joppa Software Development while the German Tele Office program is from TKR.

If you're planning on getting into fax on your ST, it's worth considering that you will need at least 1Mb of RAM, preferably more.

Just to store a single A4 fax page in memory will take around 480k, so it's easy to see where the memory goes!

Equally, it's a good idea to use a hard disk rather than a floppy drive system. Although Huffman compression

techniques are quite efficient, an average A4 page will still use 70 to 100k of disk space.

This would result in a very limited number of faxes per floppy disk, and the loading and saving times could be prohibitive.

While on the subject of hardware, the review sample of Tele Office (which was admittedly pre-release and undocumented) didn't work correctly on a medium colour display.

STraight FAX! was fine though, and both programs preformed well in hi-res, and also in the TT's 640 x 480 16 colour mode.

## STraight FAX!

STraight FAX!, from Joppa Software Development in the US, is the simplest of the two packages to operate with ease to read Help screens available at every stage, but it does tend to lose out on overall flexibility.

After you've copied all the files to your work disk or hard disk, simply run STFAX.PRG and the system will install itself.

If you haven't already set your ST's internal clock, a small program will be called to allow you to rectify this (how could you schedule a fax without know-

ing the current time and date?).

This is a nice feature, which does not appear in the German offering – I guess the Germans all have Mega STEs and TTs with built-in clocks!

From the main screen you can now configure the system to your own liking. Both STraight FAX! and Tele Office offer flexible setup screens to define what sort of modem and printer you will be using, and to set the various control fields that are required within a fax.

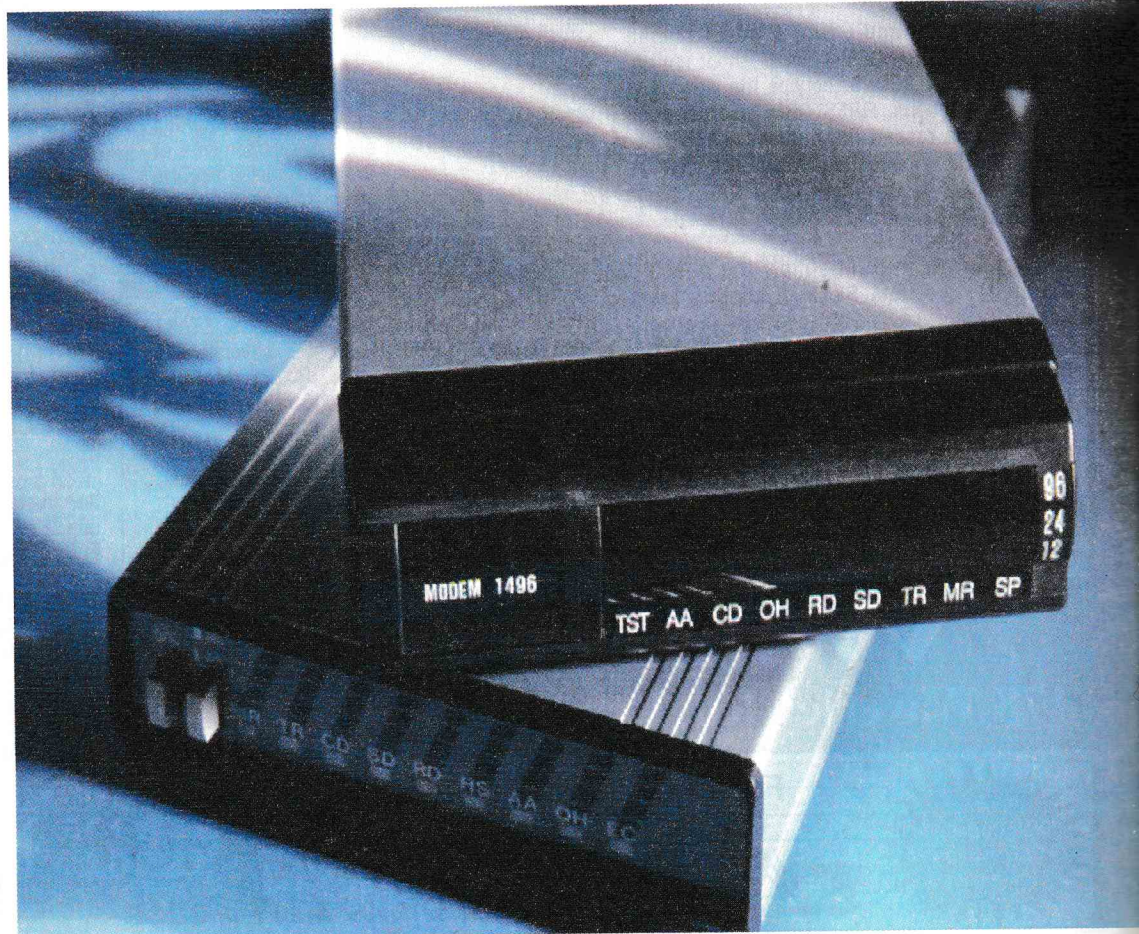
## Identification

These include your own telephone number and a text identification line, automatic page numbering, and so forth.

Your next task is to store your regularly used fax numbers in the Phone Number directory.

This is a fairly basic affair, but one nice feature is the macro facility which is extremely useful for the lengthy identifications strings required to use Mercury for long distance calls.

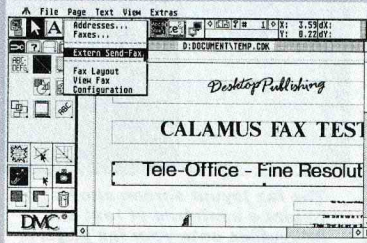
Sending a fax is simplicity itself. STraight FAX! can transmit either ASCII text files, hi-res Degas pictures, Image files or even take its input directly from a scanner driven by the ScanLite desk-



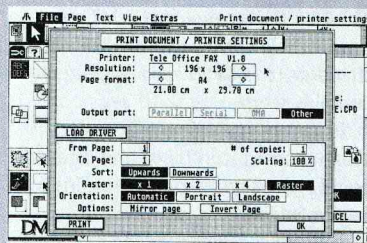

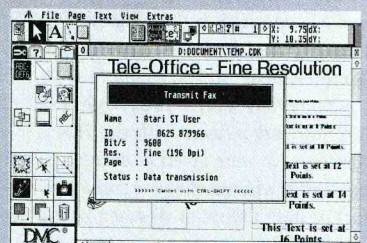
Tele Office and Straight FAX! are supplied with a variety of printer drivers to suit many popular ST applications. From within Calamus, for example, you can use Tele Office as an accessory to send pages directly by fax, without the need to return to the Desktop.



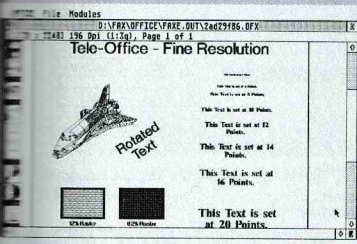
1 Select the Tele Office accessory and then activate the External Send-Fax mode from its sub-menu. You can choose either Fine or Normal resolution for your fax



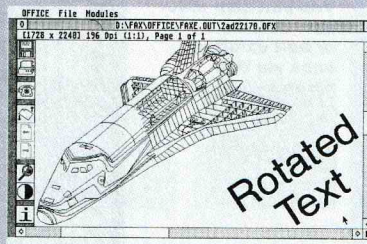
2 Using the supplied Calamus (or Calamus SL) printer driver, output the required pages



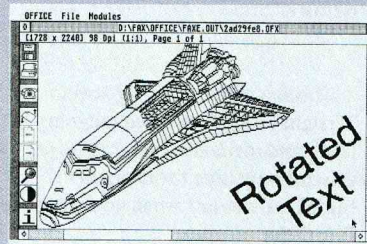

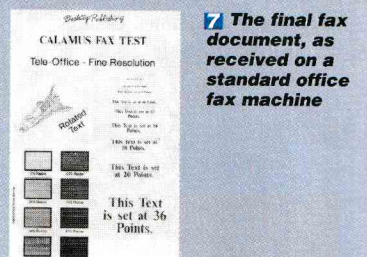
The Calamus page, previewed as a fax document

...ory. It can also re-send an existing file, should you so wish. Once you've selected the file to send, Straight FAX! will convert it to its own internal fax format, using the filename extensions .J01, .J02, .J03, and so on for successive pages.

The printer option, as with Tele Office, uses a standard GDOS printer driver although GDOS is not supplied with the product.

This is not a serious problem as it's

easy enough to get hold of, but it would be nice if it were included, as it is with Tele Office.

The View fax window, which can also display text, Degas and Image files,

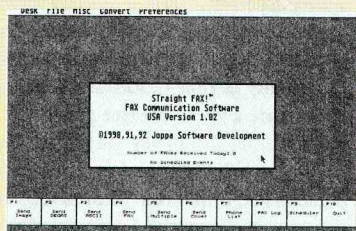
allows you to clip out any section and save it as either a fax page or an Image file. This feature could be very useful if you wish to transmit just a portion of a file, or maybe use a section of a received

# Getting to grips with STRAIGHT FAX!

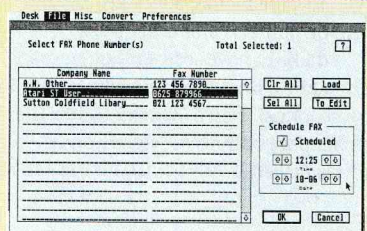
**Text**  
If you wish you may enter some text to be sent as a cover page, optionally including a previously created fax file of your company logo or other design. Text is generated using two GEM fonts, one for Normal resolution, the other for Fine (although GDOS is not required in order to use them). There would seem to be no reason why you couldn't substitute your own and 36 pixel fonts if you don't like the ones supplied.

Finally, choose the phone number or numbers to which you wish to send the fax. Unless you specify a particular time, the fax will be transmitted immediately. In addition to sending a single file to multiple destinations, you can also send several files to one or more phone numbers. This mode allows you to send a mixture of text and images - although each must still be on a separate fax page. Receiving a fax is even easier - simply enable the Auto Receive option and each time an incoming call is detected by the modem the software will automatically answer and save the received fax to disk.

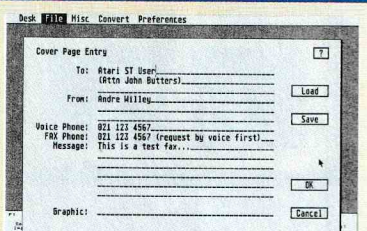
You can then use the View mode to view the fax - at a choice of either full or half size - or print it out. Strangely, normal resolution faxes are displayed vertically, rather than horizontally, and are intended to show their true size and shape.



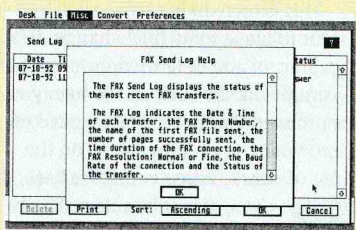
1 The main STRAIGHT FAX! screen, complete with function key shortcuts



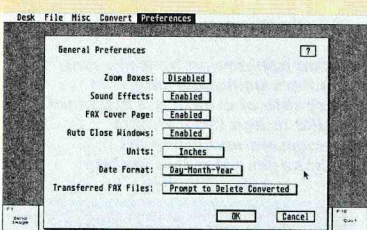
2 The Phone Number editor screen is also used to schedule a fax for transmission



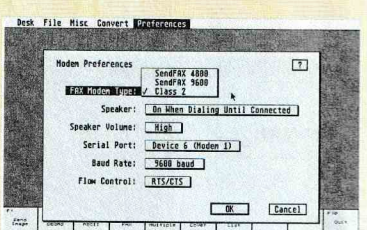
3 Once a destination has been selected, extra information for the cover page can be entered



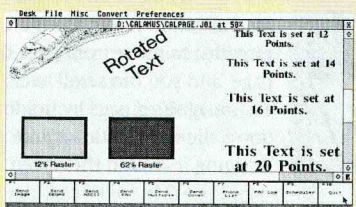
4 STRAIGHT FAX! can supply comprehensive Help information at any stage



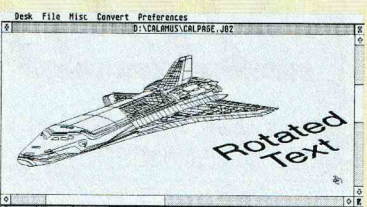
5 The General Preferences screen



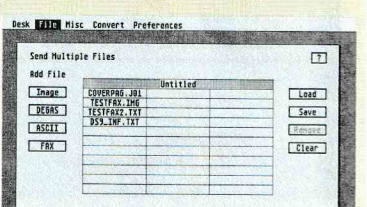
6 From the Modem Preferences screen you can define the standard settings for your fax modem

► fax in an art package.

On the TT, dragging the clip corners was a little tricky as the program kept insisting that the mouse button had been released.

Our review sample of STRaight FAX! did not work reliably with the TKR modems we were given to evaluate, especially when trying to send a fax – in fact, it didn't work at all when trying to send a fax!

The UK suppliers had already reported this problem to Joppa Software, but neither their, nor our own efforts, have gleaned any indication from Joppa as to when these problems are likely to be solved.

For now, we recommend using the Supra fax modems with STRaight FAX!

# Tele Office

The German fax program Tele Office is a significantly more powerful product, but that does tend to lead to a slightly more complex setup.

Its lack of on-screen help, and a reliance on an icon-based user interface, could prove slightly more daunting for beginners.

Tele Office consists of two major components – the Tele Office program itself, which creates your faxes and allows you to view incoming files, plus a small desk accessory which does the actual modem transfers.

## Advantage

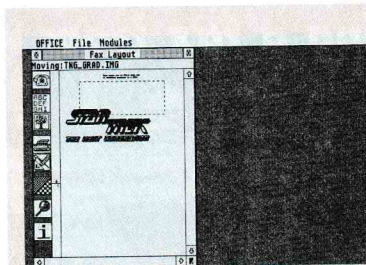
This is a major advantage over STRaight FAX! – scheduled outgoing faxes, and incoming calls, can be processed at any time the computer is turned on, not just when you are in the Tele Office program.

This fact alone makes Tele Office a considerably more useful product.

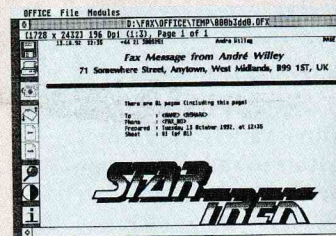
Setting up the system is similar to STRaight FAX!, except for the need to tell each program where the support files are to be found – unless you keep everything on your boot drive.

The Address Book is a lot more comprehensive than the simple phone number list used by STRaight FAX!, allowing you to store names, addresses, fax and phone numbers and other notes.

I'd like to have seen a bit more space for address lines though, and a facility to store long-distance Mercury codes. The cover page options are significantly more powerful, but the layout can't eas-

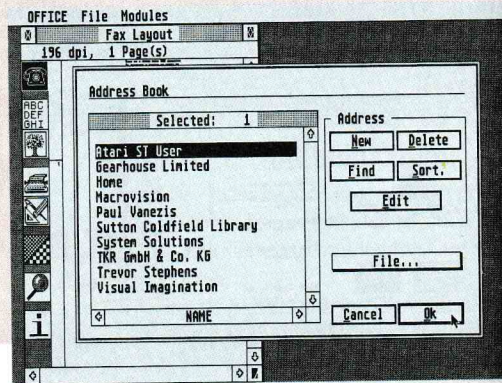


1 The fax layout screen allows you to place a mixture of text and imagefiles onto your fax page, editing or moving them about at will

ily be changed for each new fax – although the contents can be altered automatically, based on information stored in the Address Book.

When it comes to generating fax pages, Tele Office is the clear winner. In some ways it is closer to a DTP program, allowing you to import a number of text and picture blocks, drag them about the page and change the page break points.

The very flexible header and footer options are a joy to use (see panel below).

Although Tele Office does not incorporate a text or picture editor of its own, you can specify external programs for each task.

## Useful

This is incredibly useful when you want to make some final changes to a graphic, or add of few words to the text – simply double click on the item you want to edit and you'll be whisked off into your chosen program to do the work. When you come back, the changes will be automatically incorporated into the fax layout.

Once you've laid out your pages you can preview them before sending, at any of four magnification levels. Icons are provided to move from page to page, and you can scroll over each magnified page by holding down the mouse button and dragging it around the screen.

## Viewing

All of these features are also available when viewing received faxes, although strangely there doesn't seem to be any easy way to re-send a fax to a new destination.

Both programs can send faxes from within other software. Tele Office comes with support for Calamus/SL, First Word, CompoScript, Signum, Tempus That's Write, Didot Lineart, and several others. The beauty of their desk accessory option is that you can send even multi-page fax directly from within appropriate program – even if it does up two desk accessory slots, which I consider excessive.

## Create

With STRaight FAX! you are also able to create fax pages from within Calamus or PageStream, or using GDOS or FS GDOS-compatible programs, but you must then run the STRaight FAX! program in order to schedule those pages for transmission.

Transmission times vary according to the complexity of the material being sent. Simple text is fairly fast – usually much less than a minute once the line has been established – but complex graphics, especially those involving halftones, take rather longer.

Considering the extra layout work involved in undertaking, Tele Office seems slightly faster at generating pages before sending.

Which program best suits your needs will be very much a matter of personal preference. For those who just want to send text and the odd graphic, and receive occasional faxes by request, STRaight FAX! is ideal.

If you feel you need a bit more power and flexibility, plus what I consider to be the invaluable facility to send and receive faxes while running another program, then Tele Office is the one for you.

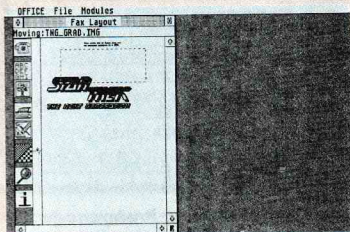

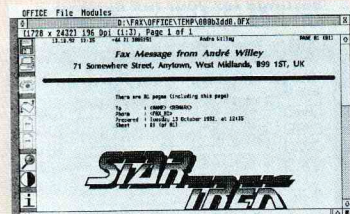

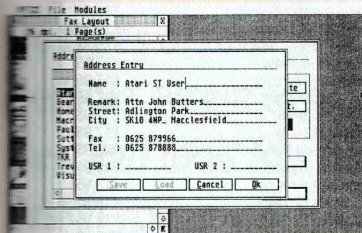

## What is fax?

Facsimile machines – or just fax for short – have been available for several years, and have varying degrees of sophistication.

However they are all based on the simple premise that at either end of a telephone line there should be a device capable of two fundamental tasks – receiving an incoming fax transmission and displaying or printing it, and secondly transmitting a document to another similar machine.

The original fax standard, now referred to as “Group 1”, was a slow analogue system taking up to six minutes to send a poor quality A4 page.

This was quickly superseded by the Group 2 standard which, while still using analogue signals, was considerably faster than its predecessor – coping with that same page in under three minutes.

However due to its analogue nature, there was still no way to compress the signal for even greater speed.

Fax’s true potential was realised with the introduction of the Group 3 standard, the digital transmission system in general use today.

To improve transmission times, a modified Huffman compression technique and white-space skipping are used to reduce the overall size of the data stream.

A Group 3 fax machine should normally be able to send an A4 page in under a minute.

Since the Group 3 fax standard is fully digital, it is possible to implement new features without losing compatibility with older equipment.

The machines always go through a complex preamble – known as handshaking – to determine the fastest common speed and compatible facilities before sending any pages.

The essence of the standard is that any Group 3 machine should be able to send documents to any other Group 3 machine completely automatically – the operator should never need to know which features the two machines eventually decide to use.

Before a page can be sent it must first be digitised into a pattern of binary data bits, in much the same way that a scanner is used to import a picture into a desktop publishing program.

The normal scanning resolution is eight pixels per mm horizontally and 3.85 pixels/mm vertically, equivalent to 203 by 98 dots per inch.

All Group 3 machines must also be able to receive Fine mode transmissions, in which the vertical resolution is doubled to 196 dpi – although not all machines are able to send such a document.

Group 3 machines must support a minimum data speed of 2,400 bits per second, although virtually all run at the V29 standard which allows 9,600 bps in one direction, and a slower data rate in the return direction.

If a reliable link cannot be established at the highest speed, the baud rate is automatically stepped down through 7,200, 4,800 and 2,400 to as low as 1,200 bps if very poor line conditions prevail.

## Choosing the right fax modem and software

There are a wide range of fax modems on the market today, but the two most popular ranges for Atari users are the Supra series (available from First Choice, and a number of other dealers) and the German TKR units from System Solutions and Ladbroke Computing.

Any other Class 2 fax modem should work with either program, although STRAIGHT FAX! seems somewhat fussy on its modem requirements. Tele Office also supports the Sierra fax modem standard.

# Get into

typefaces play a critical role in wordprocessing and DTP. Andrew Wright takes a look at the types of font available, where to get them and tools to design your own

# fonts

You could write a gripping novel or a sizzler of an article but if it was printed in the wrong typeface few people would ever bother to read it.

This is one of the reasons why book and magazine design is left largely to the professionals whose main concern is quality and readability.

However, the arrival of DTP and wordprocessing has put you in the position of typographer, as well as artist and designer. You have to decide on a suitable typeface for every publication you produce - whether it's a newsletter, a brochure or a simple letter - and only you can be blamed if it fails.

To exploit the full power of your DTP text-based applications, you have to understand at least the fundamentals of a typographer's art.

## Technology

Technology has changed dramatically since the days of hot metal printing presses but many of the rules, developed by the pioneering typographers and designers as far back as the fifteenth century, are as applicable today as they were then.

Over the next four pages we'll look at the terminology of type design as well as the tools you need to design your own typefaces or convert existing ones to the appropriate format.

We'll also show you where to get hold of new typefaces for your favourite DTP wordprocessing package and look at some of the rules for using them properly.

But what exactly are typefaces? Let's start with a font and work our way up. A font is a full set of characters, including upper and lower case alphabet, numerals and punctuation marks, in a particular point size and style.

Thus Times Roman 12-point is a font and Times Roman is a typeface. Several typefaces, all variations of the same design, such as Times Italic, Times Bold

and Times Bold Italic, make a complete type family. Most type families are supplied in the four styles discussed but others such as Univers have as many as 36 different variations to make up the complete family, from Univers Extra Light Condensed to Univers Ultra Bold Expanded.

Typefaces can be classified in several different ways - the subject will be dealt with in greater detail in the DTP Aspects column over the next few issues but a quick rundown shouldn't prove too repetitive.

In basic terms, there are five main groups. Purists will throw up their hands in horror here but we are concerned with the look and feel of the typefaces rather than the true classification which takes into account historical origin as well as style.

First comes the most widely used group, the serif typefaces. These include the Dutch and Serif faces of Timeworks and the Garamond and CS Times supplied with PageStream.

They are mainly used for body text - the bulk of the text on a page - but can also be used as headlines and cross-headings.

The second major group is sans serif. Examples include the Swiss face (actually it's a version of Helvetica) supplied with Timeworks 1.12 and the CS Triumvirate face supplied with PageStream. These faces are mainly used

for headlines but they can often be used for small areas of body text, annotating diagrams and captions. The group also includes modified sans serif fonts such as Autumn in Timeworks 2 (a version of Optima).

Thirdly we have the square serif typefaces such as Timeworks' Rockface and Easy Text Professional's Athens. They aren't generally suitable for body text

but make useful headline or display fonts.

The fourth group is the script typefaces, both connected and unconnected. These look similar to handwriting, brush strokes or calligraphy but also include

the so-called Black Letter typefaces used in the very early bibles such as Old English or Textura. One example is Timeworks' Sage.

Finally there is a broad category of rather ill-defined fonts that I will simply call display faces. This group includes all the weird and wonderful typefaces commonly found in the public domain collections as well as some of the proprietary PageStream fonts such as Oriental and Artistic.

Fonts can also be divided into proportional or monospaced, although most fonts used in DTP are proportional. In other words each character takes up an amount of space relative to its actual size. In monospaced fonts such as Courier and Letter Gothic each character takes up the same space. It's

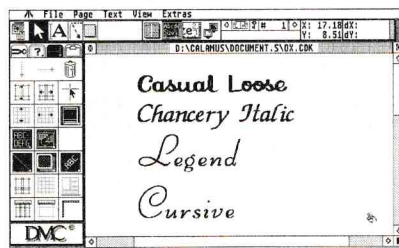
probably fair to say that the average professional designer has two or three typefaces from each group and sticks with them. Looking through my own work, I can see that my own sub-conscious preferences are for Garamond or Times (serif), Franklin Gothic or Gill Sans (sans serif) and Copperplate, Cooper and University Roman for displays.

## Combine

Once you have a basic selection to work from, the next stage is to combine the various styles into a document. One option is to have several weights of a typeface to broaden the choice but still maintain compatibility.

Headlines in Gill Sans Extra Bold, cross-headings in Gill Sans Bold and captions in Gill Sans Italic are a good example.

Body text should be in a serif typeface as they are widely accepted as the most legible of all. Try not to drop below nine

points in size as legibility declines rapidly for those with average eyesight.

The easiest approach is to combine opposites - a standard sans serif face such as Univers or Helvetic will blend in with almost any serif typeface but mixing Univers and Helvetic will never do.

Combining serif typefaces is a little easier but again, opposites are the best approach. A square serif face such as Rockwell/Rockface will go well with Times but two similar serif typefaces should never be used.

To provide contrast between two dif-

ferent areas of body text, try using italic in one and roman in the other or even a serif and a sans serif.

Another important factor in choosing a typeface is to look at what it is meant to convey. This will apply more to the design of leaflets or advertisements than newsletters or reports but sometimes it can make all the difference.

## Precision

For scientific reports, try a sans serif font for the body text to give the impression of discipline and precision. A good alternative would be a precisely structured serif font such as Bodoni.

Documents dealing with engineering might be best with a square serif face such as Clarendon or Aachen Bold – these suggest solidity and strength.

Classical and religious works look best with more traditional typefaces such as Times or Caslon while more artistic work could use italic or script typefaces.

Invitations, menus and poetry look good in Zapf Chancery, for example, which manages to retain some legibility

yet still appears decorative.

Certificates for the local sports club can look very good when typefaces such as Old English are used in conjunction with a more legible script for the main text.

One thing to bear in mind, however, is that many typefaces look subtly different depending on the supplier. Even Helvetica has several variations while others such as Garamond can be so different from supplier to supplier as to look totally different.

There are two font types available on the ST – bitmap, and vector or outline fonts. Bitmap fonts include those in GDOS applications such as Timeworks, and Signum/Script fonts.

## Separate

Bitmap fonts are saved in separate files for each font size, weight and output device and as laser printer versions at 300dpi can take up as much as 300k in larger point sizes, they tend to use up a lot of disk space.

Vector or outline fonts are stored as

font outlines. When an application demands a screen font for display or a printer font for output, the outlines are scaled and a bitmap font in the correct size is generated.

This provides more flexibility but uses up much more processing power. The sluggishness of programs such as Calamus and PageStream is partly a result of this font scaling "on the fly".

Applications handle fonts in different ways. GDOS programs such as Timeworks, Easy Text and EasyDraw have separate fonts for screen and printer. This means they are not truly wisiwyg (what you see is what you get) applications although the close similarity between them provides a good approximation.

GDOS fonts have to be constructed for a particular output device – a dot matrix font at 120 by 144dpi cannot be used in a 300dpi laser.

This leads to the anomaly that a Timeworks document printed on a dot matrix printer will look different to the same document printed on a laser.

There are other types of bitmap font too. HP LaserJet format bitmap fonts can be downloaded into a LaserJet or DeskJet printer's memory and then used instead of or in conjunction with the built-in fonts.

To download fonts to Canon and Star bubblejet printers and some dot matrix printers, special software such as Fontprint, available from the ST Club, can be used.

Print speed isn't affected although they are more useful for wordprocessing than DTP owing to their non-wisiwyg nature

## Taste

A third type of bitmap font on the ST is the system font itself, which is a monospaced font. Programs such as Harlekin and NVDI can change the ST's screen font, as can the ST Club's Fontswitch utility. Personally I prefer the ST's system font the way it is but there's no accounting for taste.

PageStream uses outline fonts in PostScript format while Calamus uses

## Where you can lay your hands on new typefaces

### The ST Club

GDOS fonts are available from most PD libraries but they vary widely in quality and range. For example, you might find a good 18-point version of a font but nothing more.

Your only option, if you want say 10, 12 and 15 point versions is to use an editor like Fontkit Plus to scale the font and tidy it up yourself by hand.

On the other hand the ST Club has several full sets available to live up your collection. The PD fonts Athens, Venice, Futur and Camelot are supplied by an Italian enthusiast and are of very good quality. They are available for 24-pin and laser/inkjet printers.

There are also several assorted disks containing useful GDOS fonts, but be careful when ordering to ensure that you get the right resolution for your printer.

The club's own commercial series are even better. The Fontpac collection includes the serif face Castleton Roman – very good for body text – and the calligraphic Derwent typeface. Again available only for 24 pins, lasers or inkjets, the font packs cost £9.95 each.

The ST Club also has several disks full of Calamus fonts and others in PostScript Type 1 format for PageStream 2.

### Image Art

Image art is a specialist PD library which concentrates on DTP and graphics software. Apart from a large catalogue full of clip art it also has over 200 PD Calamus fonts and nearly 70 PostScript Type 1 fonts, mainly originating from Canada.

### Gate Seven

There's no doubt that you pay for you what you get. PD fonts tend to have less than the full character set and the quality is usually fairly low.

At large point sizes and when used as display type, these PD fonts are fine. If you're after a good body typeface, you'll have to go to somewhere like Gate Seven.

The Gate Seven collection consists of outline fonts in PageStream, Calamus or PostScript format. While prices are somewhat higher than PD fonts, the quality is excellent.

Prices start from £5 for a single typeface to £19.95 for a four typeface family. Gate Seven also specialises in foreign fonts such as Tamil, Urdu, Greek and Gujarati. If you need specialist fonts like these, this is the place to go.

### Other sources

Although Soft-Logik supply good quality, additional PostScript and PageStream format fonts, they are relatively expensive due to the current exchange rate.

Suppliers such as Monotype, Adobe and Letraset also work out expensive – around £35 for a single typeface and £140 to £210 for a family.

However, there are often special deals available such as the Monotype Design Solutions range currently on offer for £99. They are aimed at novices and include a design guide, publishing guide and glossary, type specimen books and between 9 and 12 typefaces.

Separate packs are available for reports and presentations, newsletters, and forms and catalogues. The required \*.AFM files are included.

Other sources are the online worlds of CompuServe and CIX, not to mention various BBSs and PD libraries dedicated to the PC.

Calamus fonts are available on CIX but you'll have to be careful when downloading PostScript fonts or ordering from PC oriented PD libraries.

If a font is labelled as an ATM (Adobe Type Manager) font, it will have a \*.PFB outline file but it will probably have only a \*.PFM file with it – making virtually useless for PageStream users.

► them in its own proprietary format. Didot Professional goes one better and uses either.

The use of outline fonts means that what is on the screen is far closer to what ends up on the page. This makes things like dropped capitals and kerning much easier. Outline fonts can also allow type to be manipulated as if it were a vector graphic and skewed, rotated or stretched.

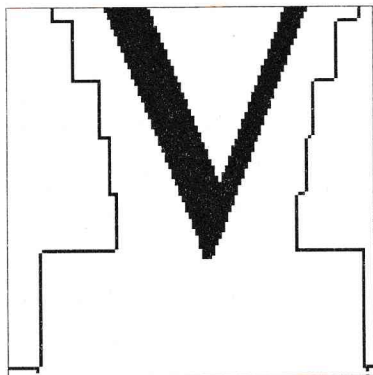
PostScript is the world's most widely used outline font format and there are something like 10,000 typefaces available from suppliers such as Monotype, Letraset, Adobe and Agfa.

## Intelligent

The now standard Type 1 format supports hinting—intelligent routines built in to the font outlines themselves which optimise the font when scaled down to small point sizes.

However, PageStream will not use the hints when printing to a non-PostScript printer.

PostScript fonts can have several associated files. The font outline is stored in the \*PFB file while the detailed spacing information is contained in an \*AFM file. Bitmap files, \*ABF files, are

sometimes supplied and can be used in PageStream. Two other types of file, \*INF and \*PFM, are applicable only to PCs.

The Calamus outline font format, consisting of a single \*.CFN file, isn't hinted either, although its kerning system is technically superior to the PostScript one.

A third format is the PageStream proprietary outline font format. It is lower in quality than the other two and has much poorer kerning information built in.

## Typeface terminology

Typography is both a science and an art – to design or modify your own fonts successfully, you'll need to understand how characters are described.

Although there is disagreement over many of the finer details in typography, the following glossary should help those unfamiliar with the basic terms.

**BOLD** – type with thickened strokes. Most typefaces are supplied with a bold version although there are invariably other weights available, including black, extra bold and ultra bold.

**CAPITALS** – capital letters are also known as upper case while normal letters are referred to as lower case.

**CONDENSED** – a typeface that looks narrow or horizontally compressed. The opposite is expanded.

**ELITE** – a typewriter typeface printing

at 10 characters per inch.

**EM** – a space equal to the size of the type in points. In a 10 point font it will be 10 points wide. The term was originally derived from the width of the letter “M”.

**ITALIC** – italicised text generally slopes to the right but a true italic typeface will often have a totally different style, including exaggerated serifs and a lighter weight, especially in the lower case letters.

**KERNING** – the practice of adjusting of spacing between individual characters to produce a more pleasing appearance. Most outline fonts have kerning information built in. PostScript fonts use a look-up table but Calamus uses a much better dynamic system.

**LEADING** – the space between consecutive lines of text, measured from base

## Font editors – tools of the trade

### Font Designer – £99

Font Designer was the first professional standard font editor for the ST and it is still the most flexible in terms of conversion options and design aids.

It is supplied on a single disk with a brief 24-page manual and runs on a 520ST/STE with a mono monitor. A number of example fonts are supplied, illustrating various features of the program.

The program uses its own unique font format, called editable computer font or ECF, and several utilities are provided for converting PostScript, Calamus and PageStream fonts (including DMF, PSF and FM files) to and from ECF format.

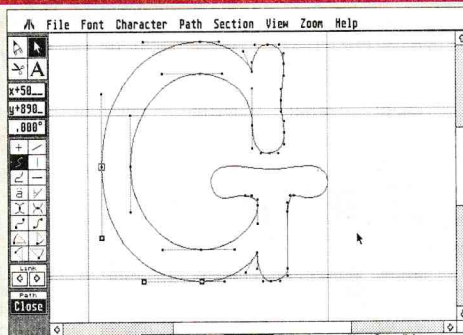
Only PostScript Type 3 fonts can be saved without an extra add-on program but ST users are unlikely to worry about this – the PageStream outlines are exactly the same quality as PostScript fonts when printed to non-PostScript printers.

All the expected vector graphics drawing tools are present including Bezier curves, lines, arcs and various shapes, and there are also facilities for creating both filled and stroked fonts.

The manual contains brief but important information about font design and global operations include compressing and expanding fonts, automatic overlap removal and user-defined stem widths for all characters.

The user interface is over-complex and character selection a might awkward but if you're a PageStream user or you want to design your own fonts and alter or tidy up PD ones, Font Designer is probably the best choice.

**Accessing the character set in Font Designer**

### Genus – £99

Genus is yet another program from the Codehead stable and it is aimed primarily at Calamus users fed up with the inadequate accessory provided by DMC.

It is supplied on a single disk with a brief ring-bound manual running to 24 pages. It can import either Calamus or PageStream outlines, storing two in memory at once, but saving only in Calamus or CVG format.

As a result you'll need at least a 1040 ST/STE and, again, a mono monitor.

The user interface is particularly well-designed – there are very few sub menus or hidden dialogues to worry about and all the tools are in front of you all the time, including the character set. You can't tell imme-

diately from the character set what characters are missing but at least you can switch the view to outline view and get a better idea of how the font is progressing.

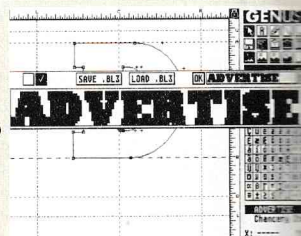
There are four zoom levels and a very comprehensive kerning facility to deal with Calamus' excellent but highly intricate step kerning system.

It also includes a built-in calculator for applying global operations to the whole font, including italicising, centralisation and resizing. The integral bitmap image that Calamus uses to depict the font in the font menu can also be edited and saved with the font.

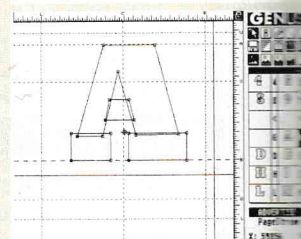
Genus is very easy to get to grips with and the manual is straightforward and helpful. Global overlap removal would be an advantage but it should appeal to any Calamus user who wants to create new fonts or edit existing ones.

The CVG export feature should be useful for creating special characters too.

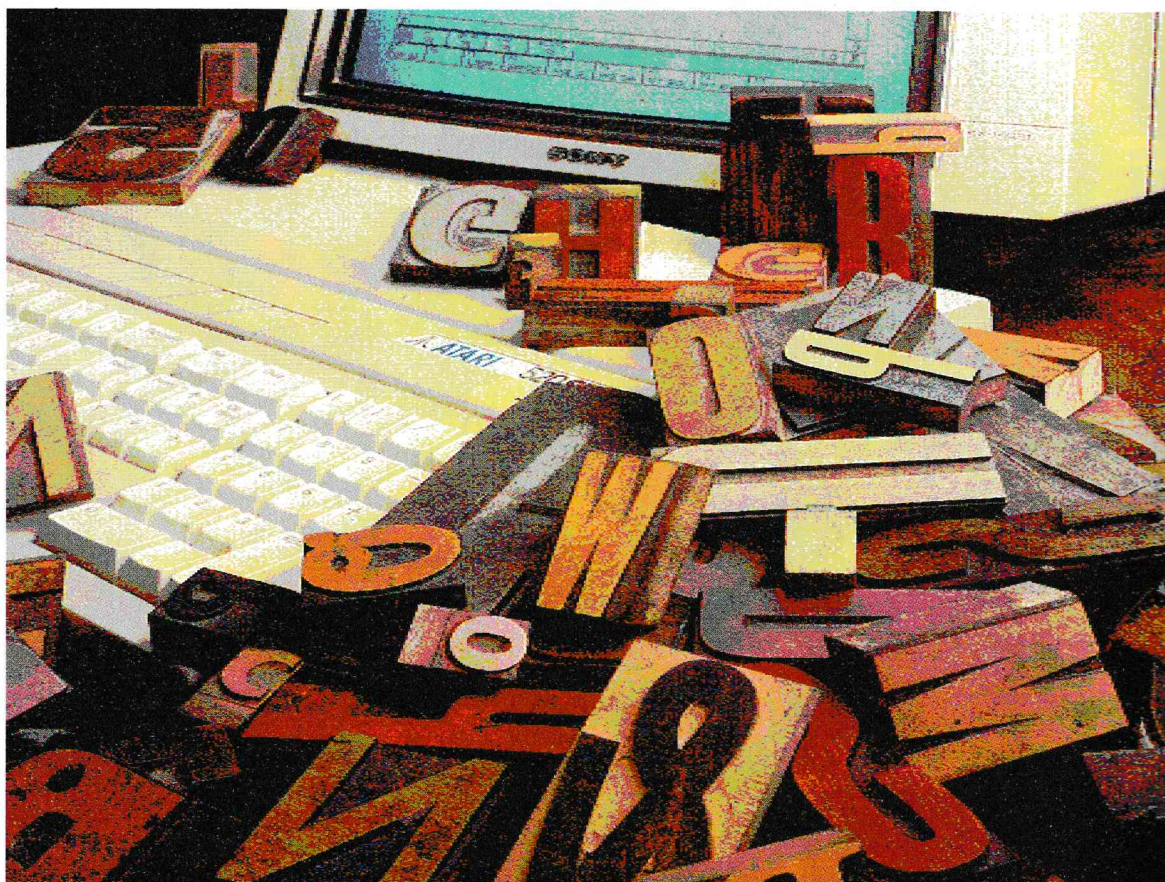
**LIGHT** – a thinner, hence lighter, version of a typeface

**POINT** – a unit of measurement equal to approximately 1/72 inch (three points to a millimetre is a more useful rule of thumb). Note that the continental Didot point is somewhat larger than the UK/US point which is generally accepted as being 0.01384 inch (0.3515 mm).

**PICA** – six points equals one pica. It also refers to a typewriter typeface at 12 cpi.

**ROMAN** – upright characters.

**TRACKING** – adjusting spacing between characters, usually over a whole paragraph or document rather than a pair of characters as in kerning.



## for designing your own fonts

### Fontkit Plus v4.0 – £24.95

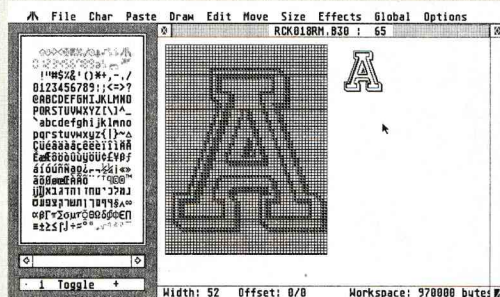
Fontkit Plus v3 was reviewed in December 1991 and a demo was given away on March 1992's CoverDisk. It is a fully-featured bitmap font editor that can import Calamus, HP Laserjet, Signum and downloadable printer fonts and save them as GDOS or That's Write-compatible screen and printer fonts.

As such it is ideal for GDOS users and an extremely worthwhile companion for Timeworks 1 and 2, Wordup, EasyDraw, Hyperpaint and Hyperdraw, to mention but a few of the more popular GDOS programs.

Version 4 adds a number of welcome features such as multi-window editing, a larger grid size, memory-resident modules and a custom file selector to make font selection easier.

It can also export HP Laserjet downloadable fonts and has a much improved interface, including keyboard short-cuts and menu boxes placed under the mouse cursor.

The same flexibility is present in the new version which can create special effects fonts out of standard GDOS offerings, including outlines, inlines, shadow,

shading, 3D effect, contour and pattern as well as standard ones such as slant, thicken and lighten.

It is also the only font editor to be able to display an entire font on-screen. The price has yet to be finalised but upgrades from existing versions should be somewhat less.

Other alternatives are available, of course. PageStream users can get hold of a PageStream outline font editor for the price of a disk.

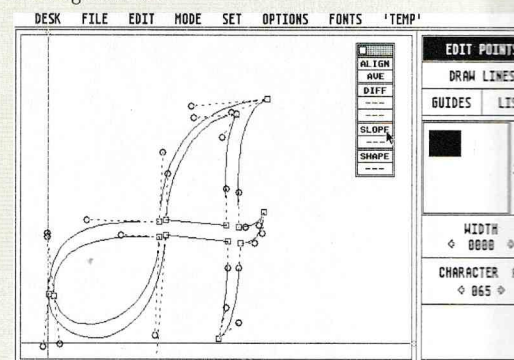
It is a shareware program, supplied by Soft-Logik themselves, and although pretty basic, it's fine for occasional use. Contact the ST Club and ask for disk number FON.41.

If you're after combining a good font editor for

occasional editing and conversion with a top notch vector graphics program, you have a choice between Didot Lineart (see the feature on Best Buys) and Avant Vector (£343 from System Solutions).

Both have surprisingly comprehensive font editing facilities which are capable of importing Type 1 PostScript and Calamus fonts.

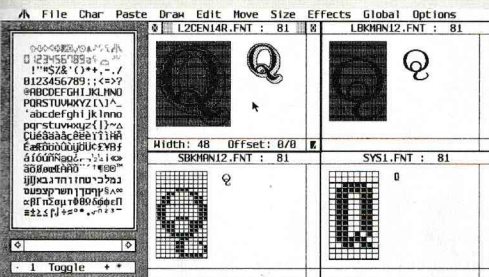
Didot Lineart has the edge here as it has more capable import functions (Avant Vector refused to load some commercial PostScript fonts) and much better kerning facilities.

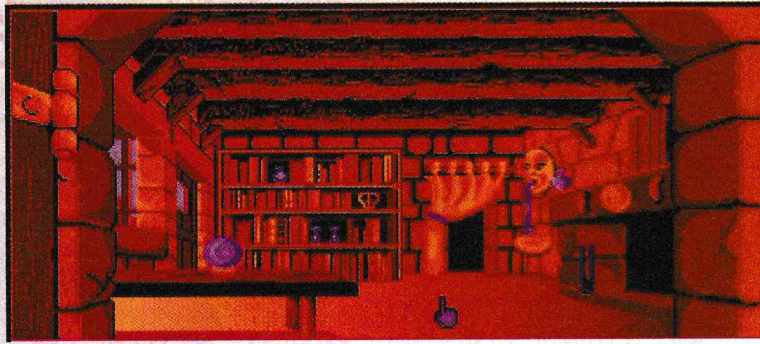
**A**dventure games, my oh my have they changed. Instead of playing the simple but fun Hobbit on the Spectrum you now get into a whole interactive adventure with superb graphics. It's almost like controlling a movie.

I'm not complaining about the fact that we get superb adventure games, but sometimes more emphasis is put on presentation than on gameplay, which is a sad and sorry shame.

This smashing review is all about a game called Ween, which is brought to you by the letters "c", "z" and Coktel Vision. If you don't know who Coktel Vision are, well they're from France and have made games ranging from the supremely crap Fascination to the highly amusing and entertaining Goblins series.

When I had a quick squint at the box I saw what I thought were amazing ST graphics on the back, but I then loaded the game and realised that they were on the PC. The graphics are good though, but not as good as the PC version.

So, beware. Before buying software always check a review of it first, like this one for instance. Right, now for the game itself.



This is where the adventure starts, so what are you waiting fo?

The reason for the storm was that the Great Eclipse was approaching and only three days remained before the moon would veil the astral light. Ween's grandfather, Ohkram, braved the storm and went

to visit Ween with the terrible news that the Kingdom of the Blue Rocks was in danger.

Now Ohkram is a Master Sorcerer and protector of the people and his powers are strong and formidable – until today, that is. For it was written down on the back of a fag packet somewhere in the kingdom that this is was today that Ohkram would lose his powers.

It just so happens that Kraal, a greedy and dangerous sorcerer once banished by Ohkram, is well aware of this fact and is set to rule the kingdom.

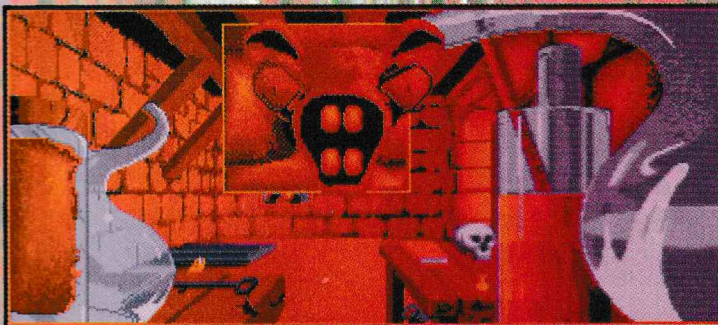

Now obviously Ween has a tough task ahead of him, so he does have a bit of help in the shape of a copper ball, a mad fruit-eating vampire bat, Petroy and a couple of water-brained twins.

The mad bat, which goes by the name of Hugh, has got an unbelievable fruit fetish - in fact it'll just about do anything for it. You can call it at any time by playing on your flute.

Petroy contacts you through telepathy and helps by deciphering ancient texts or messages written in strange languages.

The twins, Ubi and Orbi, are more of a comedy than a couple of adventurers, but they help by carrying Ween's bag. As for the copper ball, I'll leave you to suss that out.

I enjoyed Ween immensely. It's easy to play and won't cause anybody any trouble at all. There are a few bad points though. The playing area is under half of the actual screen, so it could have been a lot better. And you have to be almost pixel perfect to

This is a really, really good adventure game and I recommend it to adventurer and non-adventurer alike. Pity about the name, though.

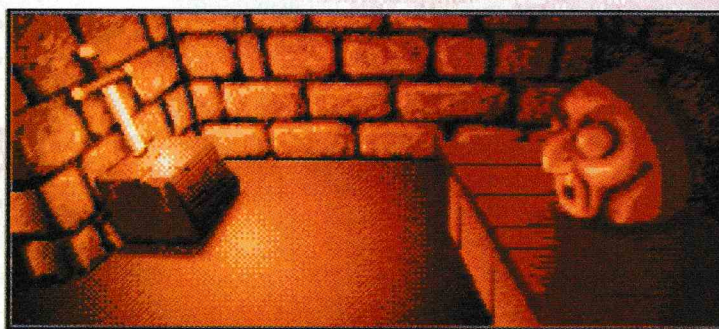

**R**ight, let me just clear one thing up before we get going. You'll gather from above that this game runs on a half meg machine, which is true.

However, this review is written on the strength of my amateurish toolings on a full meg ST, which is only fair to those responsible for it in order to give the fairest view possible. The differences between the two lie only in the detail of the scenery in some sections and in the map editor, which will obviously have less memory.

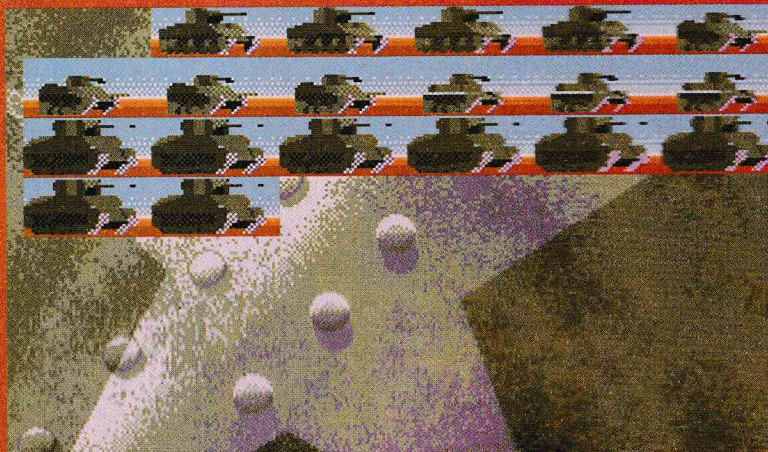
So for those out there who got all excited at the inclusion of a fraction in the top line, don't despair read on, I've looked at Campaign on my little brother's ST - you're getting a full game for your half meg's-worth. Just thought I'd let you know.

Well, after that jolly informative little introduction, let's find out what all the fuss is about, or indeed, if there is any fuss at all.

"Campaign is a war simulation for Everybody" claimed programmer Jonathan Griffiths when I put the question to him, heavily emphasising the capital E.

He elaborated that the game was designed not only for the seasoned strategists who think nothing of reading and digesting a manual in ten minutes flat, but also for those who are perhaps deterred from buying such a product because of the time spent reading and studying before any gameplay can to begin.

Fair enough - so far so good, thought I, who while perhaps not being the most intelligent being on

the planet, certainly felt a quiver of fear creep down my spine when confronted with an instruction manual resembling the Oxford dictionary and the task of writing a review of the game it represents. I just hoped he wasn't fibbing.

The game itself is as accurate a representation as you can get of the whole of World War II, comprising seemingly dozens of campaigns played out on historically accurate maps from the era.

Literally millions of square kilometres are packed into one bulging disk. There are some 3,000 vehicles to command on behalf of either the allies or, uh, other side, and the action takes place virtually wherever you like within the perimeters of the war.

All this is well and good - the question we need to answer, strategic

friends, is whether or not it's done well enough to warrant the effort of playing the thing.

I was fortunate in that I was able to spend a good two hours sitting with the programmer, who was obviously better equipped to guide me around the fundamentals than I would be myself after manfully tackling the manual.

Everything seemed so easy, prompting me to heartily agree with his earlier claim as I merrily whizzed from screen to screen, battle to battle with all the apparent military skill of Stormin' Norman or that other chap, the English one with the long name.

Yes I know that was a different war, but I failed A-level history and struggle to relate to an event that ended quarter of a century before I was born, OK?

Returning to the game on my own nearly a week later however, and being a little bit on the clueless side, I found it took me rather longer than anticipated before I was sitting in my tank ready to kick bottom.

Once in, I found myself at the map screen. It's not actually a map of anywhere in particular, and is a little sparse on detail and squadrons, or battalions or whatever they're called.

This is of course to enable the player to familiarise himself (or herself, for our lady reader Matilda somewhere in the West Midlands) with the icons, scrolling and controls. It is from here that you will control your land and air forces and plan your strategies. The control screen is great

- it offers just about every option you could wish for, with a help window sorts explaining each icon. Your forces are clearly marked, as is the destination towards which they are travelling.

At the beginning of the game, forces are automatically controlled that is, you aren't actually in control of anything at all. Ha! I've just summed up my life in one short sentence. Ahem, let's press on...

It's up to you to decide which part of the individual battles you wish control, and which bits you wish leave to the ever-wise computer.

I found it much more fun to control everything myself, even though major damage was sustained in just about every battle I entered!

You can, for example, decide to plan the strategy of the battles - plan the course of your aircraft, give your tanks/fleets a destination, decide which vehicles to use and then back and bask in glory (or not) as the results filter through.

This is fine, and there's enough variety in the game to keep you happy for days and days using the method alone.

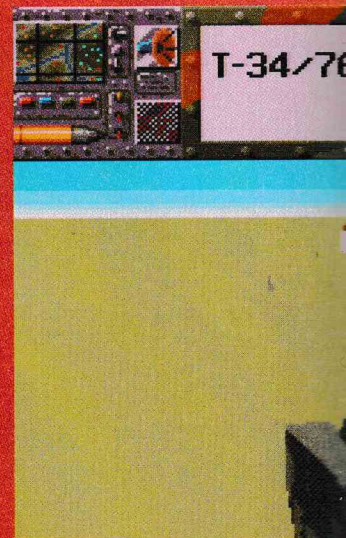
As I've said, I prefer to plan my own, albeit dodgy, strategy then climb in a tank myself and do things my way.

The control method used in the tanks is really good. You can of course use the conventional keyboard method - this is a bit tricky at first

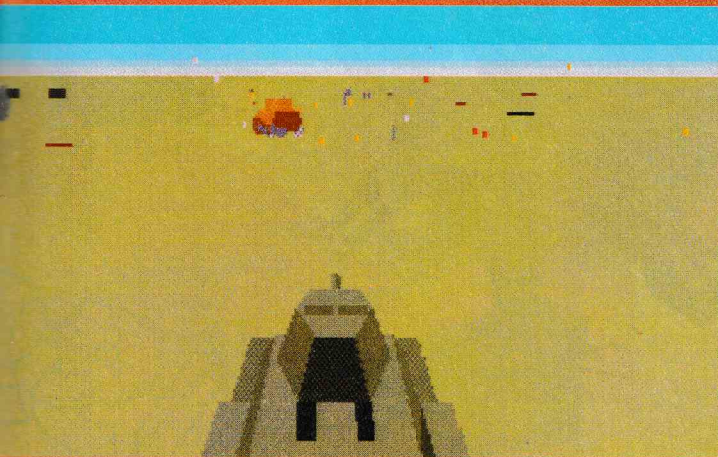

to the realism of steering the tank. I start explaining I'll be here all day, so you will just have to find your way for yourself. The joystick method is a little bizarre. Plonk two joysticks on the table and use them to literally steer the tank tracks - forward and backward is obvious, but if for example you want to turn (which is quite often necessary in the middle of a war, you know), then by pushing up on one joystick and down on the other, the tank will virtually turn on a sixpence. The level of detail on things such as buildings, while not really breaking new ground, is very acceptable - it's more, the speed is good and control relatively easy to master.

Jonathan Griffiths is a bit of a World War 2 aficionado and it shows. All the maps are geographically correct, or at least they were in 1945, if you see what I mean.

A clock runs throughout the game, and events that actually happened in the war happen in Campaign at the right time. Every vehicle within the game is correct in every detail, and come complete with a comprehensive

almanac detailing damn near everything there is to know about it.

Campaign comes with the obligatory map editor which I'm not going to talk about because there's not a lot one can say, except that it's good.

Suffice to say that even if there were no map editor, Campaign would keep you going for months. Yes, I did say months.

A software developer recently said to me that the American gaming public have a credo - they expect one hour of entertainment for every dollar they pay for a game.

Just thank God that Empire didn't apply this to Campaign - it would be about the same price as an average family saloon (and you'd have to go to Thomas Cook's to get some dollars!).

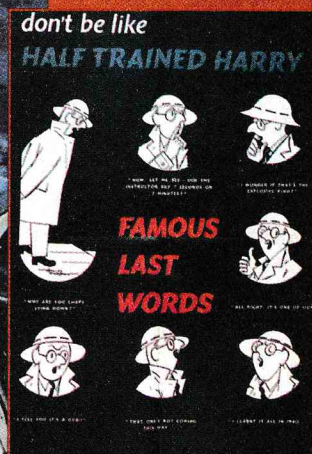
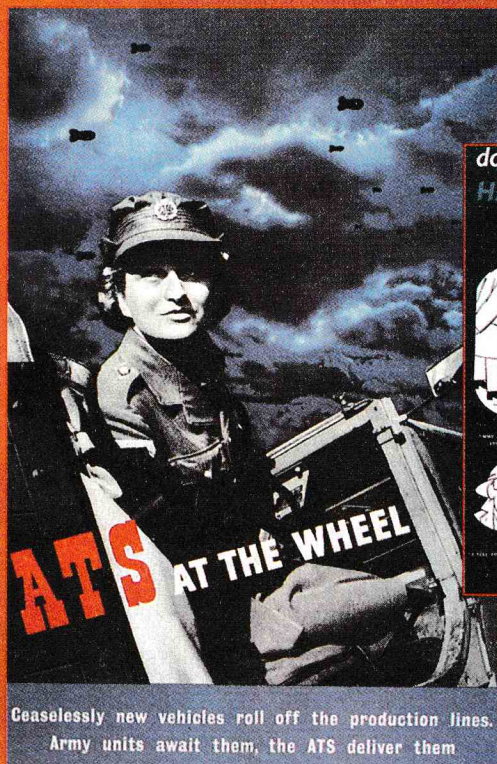
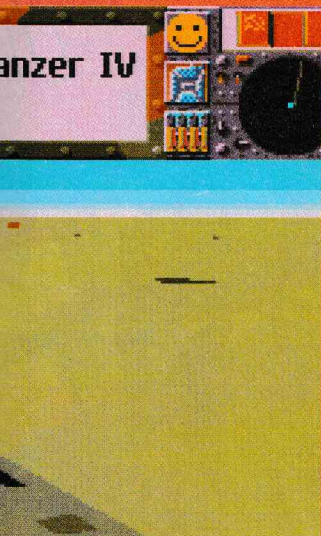

## Cheetah 125+

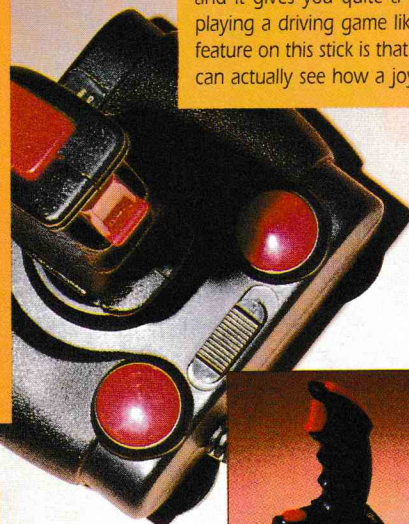
I remember when this joystick came out. At that time I still owned a Spectrum and the Quick Shot II was the best, even if it was as brittle as an icicle. And what a winner it is – everything a classic should be, boring, unadventurous and above all reliable. Yes it won't fall to bits even if I play decathlon on it.

The Cheetah 125+ is nothing spectacular, with bog standard ergonomic grip and the usual fire buttons. Like all today's kit it uses micro switches instead of the old terminal switches, which in all honesty were usually knackered in about three days.

It performs admirably when used on racing games and the like because it is not too sloppy – it was invaluable on Stunt Car Racer when Biff insisted

on beating me. The major down point is its stiffness. It isn't so fast, and you don't get that satisfying click sound when you move it.

The auto fire is suitably placed between the front two fire buttons – unlike a lot of the competitors who try to put them in the most awkward place possible – and there's no danger of you flicking it on by accident



## Cheetah Mach I

Another early Cheetah joystick, this one came out a little later than the 125+, but in my opinion the 125+ had a far superior design.

Its biggest let-down is the ergonomic grip, which is slightly less detailed than usual and the shaft leans forward at a 20 degree angle which feels comfortable at first but gives you wrist ache in the long term.

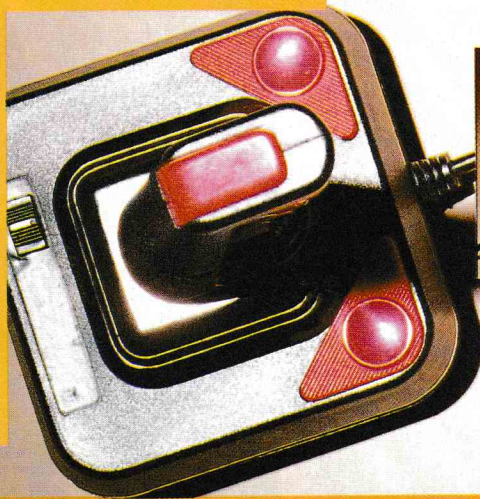
Biff and I gave it a good seeing to on Cybernetix when it proved very responsive, but it was a little too light on car driving games – you couldn't get it to hold nice and steady on the bends.

And they've done it again, they've

put the microswitch at the back of the base in the middle where you are likely to switch it on by accident.

My only real beef is with the fire buttons. They are so heavy you have to exert a good amount of pressure to move them – the last thing you need when playing Project X unless you want your finger to fall off very quickly.

This is not the joystick I would choose personally, but no doubt some people would swear by it.



## Competition Pro – Powerplay

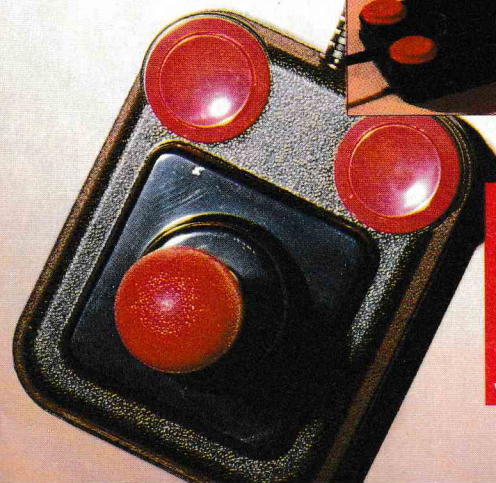
Ahh, it's my old friend the Competition Pro – I remember the days when I used one to play Spectrum games with it, it's that old. In fact my little brother still uses it for playing Kick Off 2. It is a pretty simple device, for instance it hasn't even got an auto-fire, so you can't cheat on shoot-'em ups.

The latest Competition Pros now have microswitches, which make the joystick twice as good as it was. It is very similar to the Zipstick, but tends to fit into your hands rather better.

You won't attract members of the opposite sex with this particular joystick due to its rather boring black and red colours, but you can get luminous green and pink versions.

While I'm on the subject of colour, I personally would like to see some other joysticks brightened up – most of them are either very drab or boringly black.

Verdict? The Competition Pro is a classic joystick and a lot of games players would not swap it for anything.

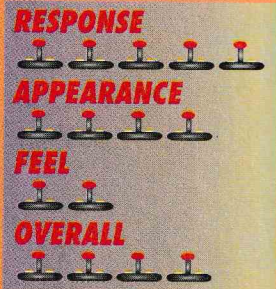
This joystick brings a fair few tears to my eyes because it has only just broken down after four years. Yes, a long and happy relationship cut short by a terrible misunderstanding.

Okay, so I did throw it on the floor and jump on it, but when your little pipsqueak of a brother beats, nay thrashes, you at Sensible Soccer then it's time for a change of joystick. So I ritually destroyed it, just like Nirvana do with their equipment. Oh boy, did I regret it!

Well, enough of my misery, what about the Cruiser? Well it's one of those that you either love to bits (more terrible memories) or hate to death.

There are two models, one like mine, green with a pink shaft and yellow fire buttons, or an all black one. It boasts a unique control - by twisting the pink shaft you can make the joystick's action vary from loose to stiff. This is ideal, because you can adjust it to suit the game you're playing.

The Cruiser does feel very bulky, but you do get used to it after a while. Yep, I'd recommend it to anyone.



## Cheetah Stare Probe

What a monster! This really is a refugee from the arcades of the '70s, chunky beyond chunkiness, just how a joystick should be. Everything about this stick is old, even the plastic feels that way, yet

despite this it's a pleasure to use.

It's fully microswitched and you get all the nice clicks in use. The shaft itself is very heavy, so even on car sims you can still hold the stick steady, yet it's still a corker for shoot-'em ups.

There's your average ergonomic grip again but the fire buttons are massive so you can't miss. The autofire is in the same place as the 125+, in the middle of the two fire buttons on the base.

This is probably the best all-rounder I have used out of the Cheetah range and it certainly looks the most durable. I wouldn't pick a fight with it in the pub.



## Zipstick - Powerplay

Ask almost any games reviewer which joystick they prefer and eight out of ten will say that they go for the Zipstick. The reason is probably because of its simple design. There's nothing fancy to get in the way of those furious joystick thrashing moments. It has a nice black and yellow design and is fully microswitched.

The only major gripe is the positioning of the auto-fire switch, which tends to turn itself on without you knowing - until it's too late. For



instance, imagine you're playing Kick Off 2 and 2 - 2 with 30 seconds to go and you accidentally switch the auto-fire on.

Quick as a flash your man slides in the area and crops one of the opposition, so it's a penalty against your smiling opponent slams the ball into the back of the net. All of a sudden you get an uncontrollable urge to chuck the joystick across the room and watch it explode into tiny bits.

However, apart from that minor gripe the Zipstick is indeed one of the best joysticks available.

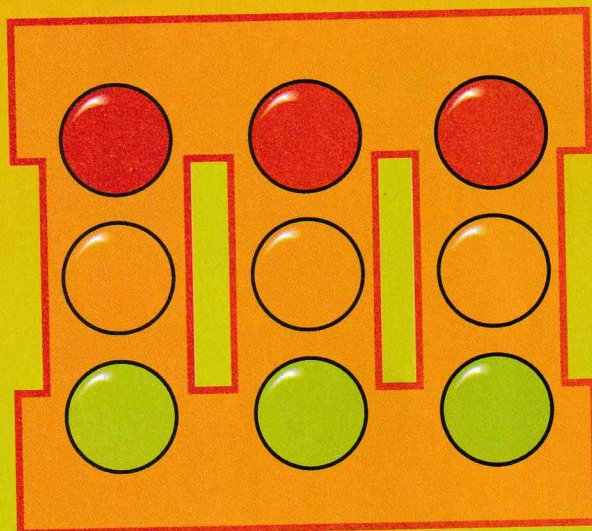

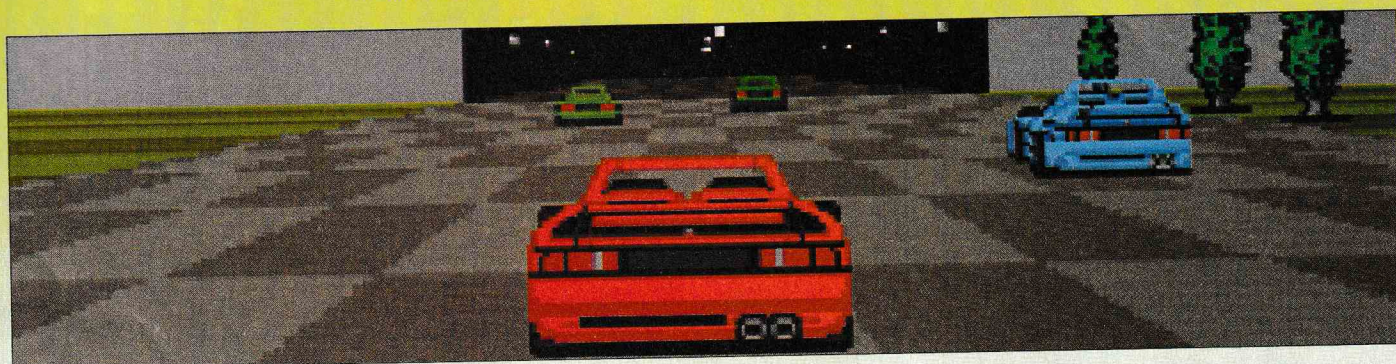

In the beginning there was Outrun, and it was feeble. And Magnetic Fields did look at the ST and think, "This computer needs a decent driving game," and so they set about creating one.

First they created Lotus Esprit Turbo Challenge. It was a 3D behind-the-car-viewpoint game, which featured a simultaneous split-screen two-player mode which was great fun to play.

It also had lots of options, even down to selecting your in-car music from a CD player screen. Magnetic Fields looked down at Lotus, and saw that it was good.

Then they created the sequel, and lol it featured a full-screen one-player mode, a checkpoint race system instead of the previous circuits, a second type of Lotus car to drive, and even more in-car CD music.

They created it in the image of the first game, and Magnetic Fields looked down at Lotus 2, and saw that it was quite good too.

Finally (we hope), in the year of our lord 1992, Magnetic Fields looked down on the world and thought, "Hang on, we could make a packet doing yet another sequel." Thus was born Lotus III: The Ultimate Challenge. And it was OK too.

So what does this have that the previous two didn't? Well, it combines the best aspects of both the prequels to produce what is actually quite a playable driving game. You can decide whether you want to

hurtle around either checkpoint-type or circuits with a varying number and also whether you want to race the clock or against the other computer-controlled cars.

There's also the addition of a track designer. You can set the perimeter track in the form of percentages, things you can twiddle around with the amount of hills and curves, and distance. You can design loads of courses, and they can be either controlled cars.

The game is very well presented with some stylish graphics and absolute top-notch music. The in-car CD now offers you a choice of others, a dancey, ravey, hardcore-y, the-score, midnight beatbox ecstasically heavy rock affair, and music (?), the last of which is utterly

You'll find everyone around you humming the tune when this comes on (at least they did here in the office).

You can choose the control system you want for your car, although I found the default Fire-button acceleration setting a bit to cope with.

Select whether you want to drive a Lotus Esprit, an Elan SE, or an M200, which are shown on a trendy rotary menu screen, which also shows weird little bits of acceleration and so on.

You'll eventually get to the game

Starting light goes on, and you accelerate away. Then you've got to successfully negotiate your way through several tracks, which are different depending whether you choose easy, medium or hard difficulty settings.

These stages vary between checkpoint races and circuit races, and can take place in a variety of conditions, including the old favourites, wind, fog and rain.

The graphics are pretty much the same as in the two previous games, and they move at a fairly zippy rate, although one amusing

thing we noticed is that for some reason, on some tracks it can look like you're reversing the car along.

Apart from that slightly strange quirk, the game looks fairly good, with colourful backdrops and sprites.

The car is quite responsive and easy to handle, and with a bit of practice you'll soon find yourself managing to stay on the road on those tough icy corners.

One thing that Lotus games have never been is realistic. When you hit an obstacle or

another car, you simply slow down by about 15 km/h. Still, if anything, this adds to the playability, as you don't find yourself out of the game just because of one slip-up.

This also produces some excellent two-player frolics as you fiercely battle to be the first to the finishing line.

While Lotus 3 isn't original, and certainly isn't the best game in recent months, it's nevertheless a playable product with a fair bit of depth. There are lots of levels to go through, and the facility to design your own

adds a great deal to the game. I think it's the best game in its field, because it manages to combine the best elements of previous games and adds a few new ones too. Shell out for this and you won't be disappointed.

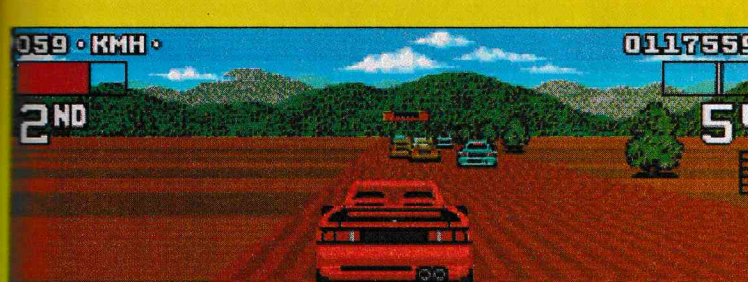

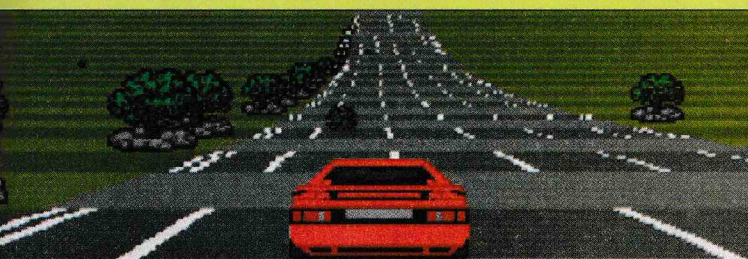

Get your wallets out mums and dads - this one's for the kids. Virgin tell me the game is aimed at pre-high school kids aged between about five and ten (the ones who are old enough to know what they want but still young and shameless enough to damn well cry their heads off until they get it).

It's a platformer as you'd expect, with the intrepid gamester taking the part of Mick or Mack, two of Ronald's young chummies.

The Hamburglar - he's the fat one with the stripy sweater on the adverts - has run off with Ronald's magic bag. Ronald has really only got himself to blame however, since he was showing off with said bag at one of the many picnics such an ambassador as he must attend.

Although not mentioned in the story, we in the Gamer office believe the importance of the bag lies in it's power to transform a dead dog's tongue into a "100 per cent ham-

burger in a sesame seed bun". But don't quote us on that.

Ronald's got a heavy schedule, so he enlists the help of daring duo Mick and Mack in his quest to recapture his pilfered satchel, insisting for no obvious reason that they gather all the puzzle cards he so carelessly scattered around the various levels as they go.

The levels then - there are seven in all, each watched over by a different one of Ronald's bizarre friends, and each containing about half a dozen sub-levels, making around 40 in total, plus the odd bonus level here and there.

The idea is to avoid the cute little nasties and generally bounce and jump your way to the end of the level, your pockets bulging with the all-important puzzle cards.

There's a theme to each one too - for example "Birdies Treehouse" is, as one might imagine, set up in the trees, with clouds and other sky-like objects providing added obstacles.

Other goodies that need collecting are the (in)famous golden arches, McDonalds' trademark - these suspend in mid-air and if memory serves me correctly provide bonus points at the end of the level.

A nice touch is the way in which Mick - or is it Mack? - can run upside down on certain platforms as long

he's going fast enough, and another is the slow motion effect the gravity-less moon level provides.

The puzzles are quite simple and the colours bright and childish in order to appeal to the younger market, but the platform action suffers a little from the much of a muchness stigma. Where McDonald's Land should really win the hearts of kids -

and the pockets of their dads - its versatility.

For starters there is a two-p option, whereby Mick and Mack ate not in a competitive way, but forces to foil the evil Hamburglar together (aaahh).

At the beginning of the first a simplified map shows the various levels within Ronald's Clubhouse. Using the joystick you can guide the geezer to whichever level you want to tackle first.

Once the first main level has completed, you are given the choice again with level two.

But that's not all - oh no. When you are on a subsequent level you are only given the choice of attempting any sub-level therein (read this carefully because it gets a bit muddled) but can travel between levels using the map, through any other levels you have already completed.

So for example when on the first level, you can choose between 40 places as to where you want to go. Well I think it's good, anyway.

Now be warned - don't buy this game if you're looking for an intense challenge, it's just not for you.

But for those of you whose parents run around the house all day long, it's a bit of a Christmas mas upsetting aunty Beryl by knocking over everyone's Christmas tree. So get your hands on this and keep the buggers quiet for a few days.

Other pencils will turn into balloons (to take you to higher places), potion bottles (for temporary invincibility) and stopwatches (freezes the enemies for a few seconds).

Don't despair if you find yourself in a tricky situation - Doodle Bug carries a rubber at all times which rather handily doubles as a kind of smart bomb for instant disposal of hostile creatures.

Other levels are in a similar vein - bright

colours and cute creatures asunder relating to the theme - Forbidden Forest and Fortress of Doom to name but, erm... two.

What else then? Well, Doodle Bug has quite a nifty spin attack with which he can do away with his adversaries, and there's loads of stuff to collect such as money, fruit and power-ups, all of which add a little to your paltry armoury.

The sound throughout is really good - Liz the art girlie is driving me mad humming the tune as I write. ST owners will be chuffed with the number of effects, and the graphics are great.

Although they don't come right out and say it, I guess this game is aimed at the younger market, just in time for Christmas.

As well as the characters on-screen you have the four heads of the team at the bottom, I will explain what this is for later. In the middle of the panel at the bottom of the screen is a blueprint of the suit which all of the characters are wearing.

With this icon you can make the characters do certain things – for instance, click on the head to turn on the lamp, click on the left arm to use the object which you are holding.

The view you have of the playing area is a diagonal view in an elevated position so you are looking across and down on the characters, very similar to Space Crusade.

You have to move the characters around on-screen and make them do all the work for you. In games similar to this it used to be a real bind moving all the characters about one by one, but it is possible to move the

group as a collective, which is a nice touch.

When you get on to the space station you have to fend for yourself. You eat via an intravenous tube, and will find packets of liquid nutrition scattered around the space station.

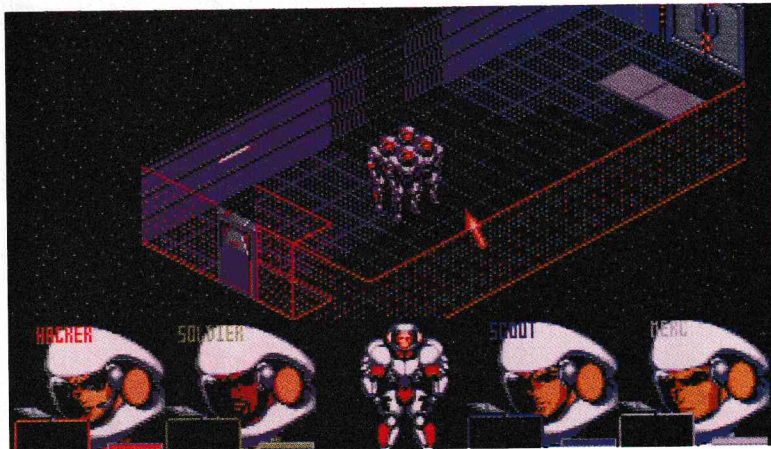

To start with you won't have any batter-

The light really is handy when ex-

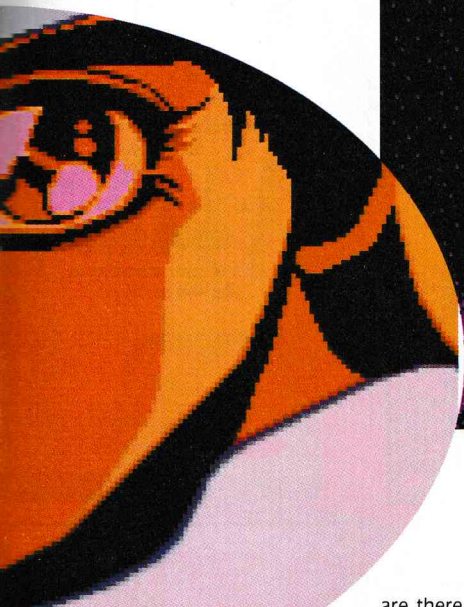

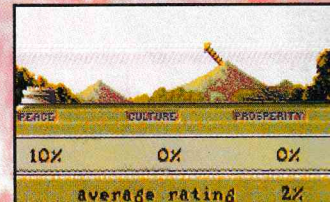

Everything follows a very logical course: build your houses close to the forum which



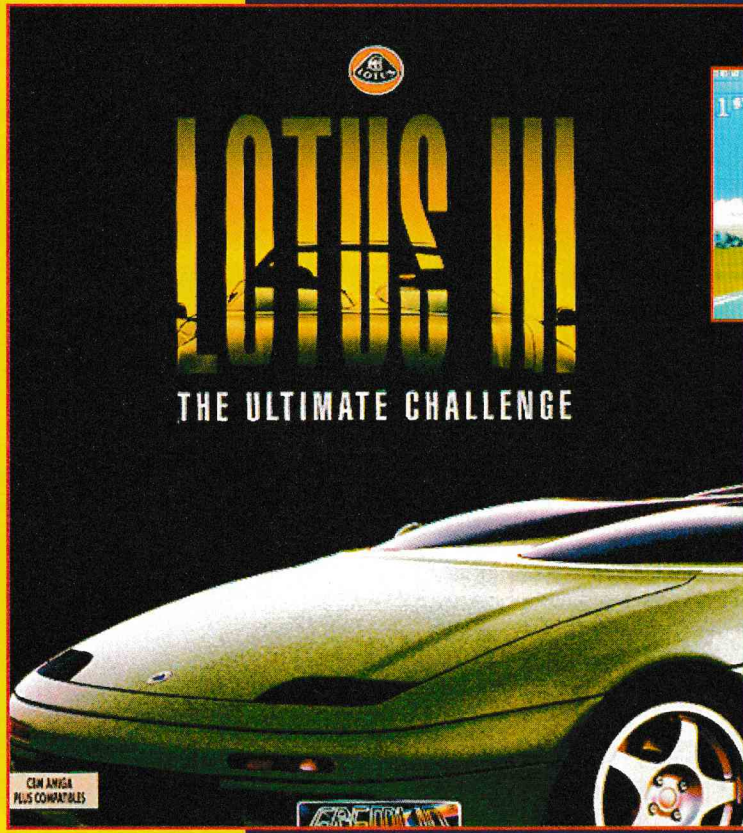

# A blast from the past

In this new section we're going to take you down memory lane to the great monoliths of gameplay which we've looked at in years gone by.

We're bound to be biased because these are games which we really believe are

strokes of genius by the programmers, but we will cover all types from strategy to platform.

If there are any games you especially want to look at we will check out your selection and pick those which we deem fit for review.

## Elite

When Elite eventually graduated from the BBC to the Spectrum and the other 8-bit machines of the time, the magazines practically had an orgasm over it, with Your Sinclair dedicating almost a whole issue to it.

And rightly so – it remains one of the outstanding and unbeatable games of all time. The amount of depth in Elite is quite astounding.

Basically, it's a space trading game with lots of frills. You begin with a bog standard ship with bog standard weapons and bugged all money.

To work your way around the various planets you hyperspace between them and dock at the space stations. But don't think that you are going to be able to cover all the planets in a hurry.

There are 2,000 planets spread across eight



galaxies, each with its own inhabitants, government, population, industrial structure – you get my drift, it's slightly immense.

You can work your way up by trading the various commodities or you can go out bounty hunting by flying without trading and killing the ships that attack you without provocation, but that's not advised until you have some better weapons.

The trading posts are situated in space stations a few miles above the planet surfaces, and you have to enter them through a door on one of the sides.

The ultimate goal is to reach the status of Elite which you do by killing things. Whether you do it legally or illegally is up to you, but it depends on how many things you kill and let me tell you it takes a fair few.

Do yourself a favour – go and play it for at least two solid days.

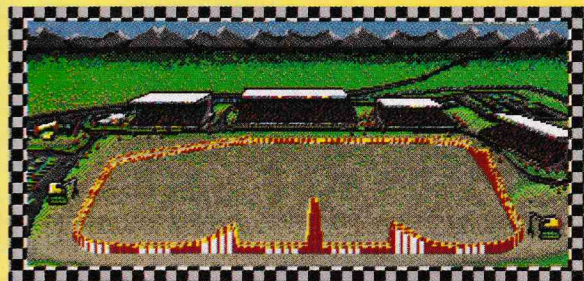


## Stunt Car Racer

Yes it's the first of the racing car games to appear in Blast from the Past. But it is no ordinary racing game – it's one of the few interesting concepts for a car game in the last few years.

You race against an opponent on a track – nothing special there, granted – but the track is in relief to its surroundings so the bumps go way up (about 400 feet in some cases) in comparison to where the spectators would be.

To get to it you have to be air lifted and dropped onto the track by helicopter, so you can imagine what happens when you fly off the edge. Incorporated into this mad scenery are huge jumps and gaps in



the track that you have to bridge using the speed.

At first stunt car racer is a very tricky game to play, but unlike other racing games that use the same controls and driving view, it has

a handling technique that finally clicks and every thing seems easy

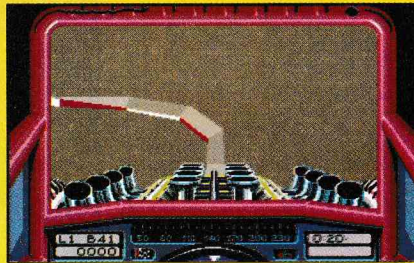
The first times I played it I loathed it because it was so tricky, but with some perseverance it came to me.

Another feature of the game which really does make it a scorcher is the lap link capability. It is possible to play the game by linking up two STs.

This enables you to race directly against your opponent but on a separate machine. If you're so unpopular you don't have a friend, you can race in a league against the computer-generated racers which, for a change, aren't all experts.

As far as I know, Stunt Car Racer is now out as a budget game. Forget Lotus – for thrills get SCR and stuff your mate off a 300 foot wall.

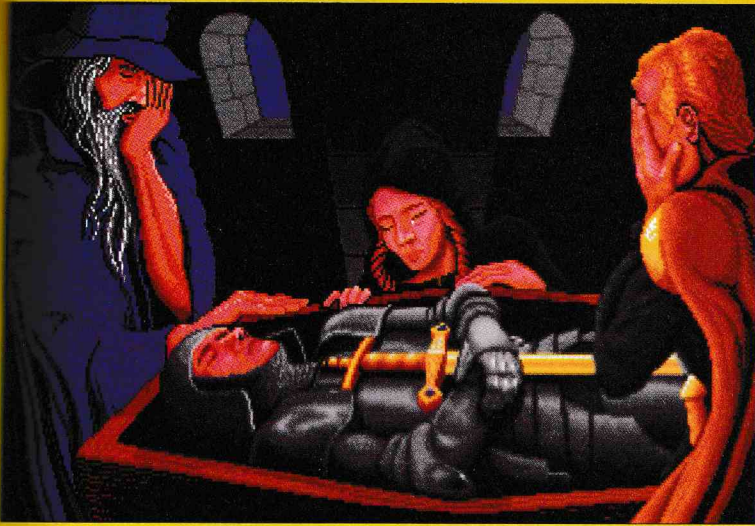

Now don't get me wrong, but I'm not particularly fond of games which involve a lot of thinking. I'd much rather strap on my army boots and run around killing dictators and their frenzied followers or shooting wave upon wave of aliens from the planet Zog than play a strategy game.

Most Impressions games have picked out the short straw in today's market and are constantly being overshadowed by those huge film and TV licences made by companies with loads and loads of loot.

So there you have Impressions, a small company trying to bring the world of strategy to the general public and also beat the recession. Strategy is a bit of a touchy subject among most games players and gets ignored rather a lot.

Most of time when someone says "strategy" they think of a little old man who wears a anorak with a fluffy hood and NHS glasses, who also dribbles a lot while listening to Max Bygraves records and huddles around his computer day and night.

But, this is not so, more and more people are getting into strategy games, especially ones that incorporate an adventure theme. Coincidence time coming right up folks.

What should happen to land on my desk this week but a copy of Paladin 2 by Impressions for moi to review, and by 'eck what a coincidence (told you) it's an adventure strategy epic.

In it you are the Paladin, a legendary hero as well as being a pretty funky knight to boot. It is your duty to seek out and

destroy evil and protect the weak and innocent.

A Paladin has a bit of a busy life, because as well as fitting in the odd bout of bingo, you have to go through many adventures and face and fight many enemies. Even though you are a bit of hero, you still need help in completing your adventures, so you have many comrades, ranging from magical mages to swishing swordsmen to help in your quest.

The object is to advance your Paladin from a wet-nosed novice to a hardened veteran, achieving this by completing quests, of which there are 20 - plus a builder program which allows you to create more of your own.

The objectives of each quest are different. You might have to rescue some captives, obtain all the white scrolls or kill a certain number of enemies. And all within a specified time limit.

In each quest you control the Paladin and up to nine allies. Most of the latter are pretty much expendable, but if the Paladin is killed then it's time to start over again. As with most such games, Paladin 2 can be controlled entirely via the mouse by pointing and clicking on the appropriate icons.

This is quite a good little game - it certainly impressed me more than Impressions'

previous efforts. For starters, the graphics are very good indeed especially the screens. But the best thing it has going for is that it is so easy to play.

This sort of thing is becoming more and more popular, yet will probably not appeal to a lot of people simply because they go for big licensed games that get hyped up beyond belief. Which is a bit of shame, because Paladin 2 is fun to play even if it's not exactly going to set the games world alight.

One last thought: Whatever happened to Paladin I?

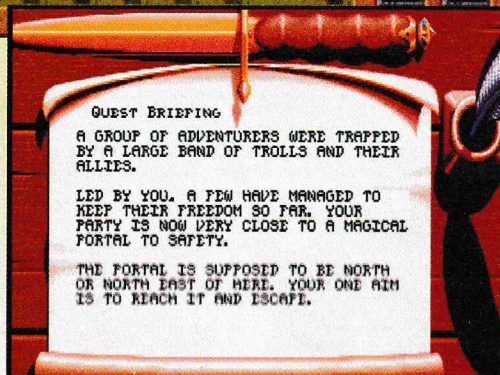

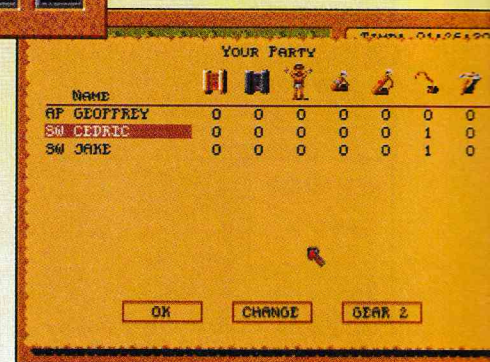

## Frontier - Elite II

Any ST owners who have never heard of Elite must inhabit a desert island. It was, when it came out in the early eighties, the most revolutionary game of its kind. It made everything else look silly and inadequate - we haven't had such an explosion since.

Not a bad bit of work really from two programmers who were a bit bored and needed something to amuse themselves with while they were reading at university. A touch of the "those pesky kids" syndrome, I think.

Now eight years after its release the sequel is on the verge of release, and is set to make its predecessor look as paltry as the original Elite made other games appear.

The first Elite was in all honesty relatively basic, but because it was so well designed it was something you could really lose yourself in. It allowed you to be virtually anything you wished - hundreds of games in one. You could be a trader, a pirate, an outlaw, and people treated you according to how you acted. Basic it was, but how well it worked.

Frontier - Elite II is not going to be basic, far from it. On Elite you always looked at space stations, never on the planet - if you ventured near the planet you were toast, simple as that.

But Frontier allows you to fly down to the surface, where you can visit cities and fly through the scenery between them. Once in the cities you can communicate with the people who live there. This is the sort of depth of programming that gives me a headache.

There are reputed to be about 100,000,000 planets in Elite II, and if that isn't mind bending then nothing is.

The two superpowers in the game - the Federation, which is based on Earth, and the Empire - are not on the best of terms, and you may occasionally have to switch your politics to save your skin!

The programmers promise that Frontier will let you do everything that the original novel (The Dark Wheel) said you could. With more

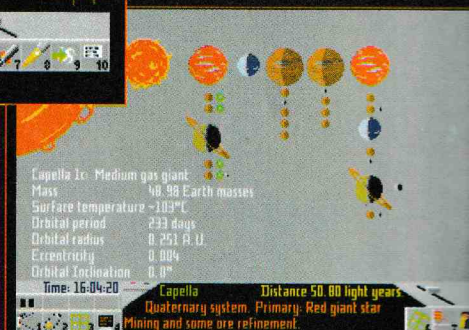
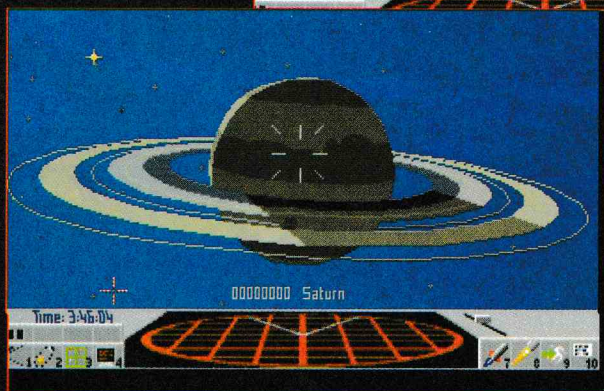
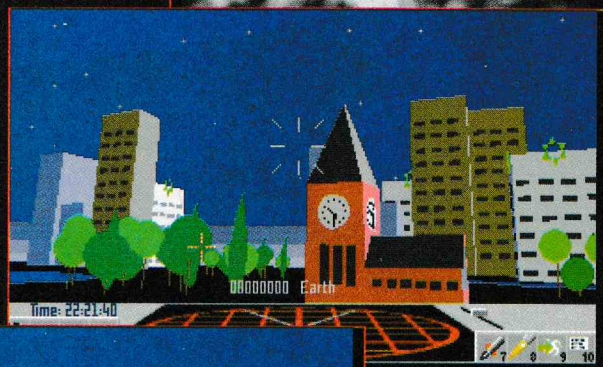
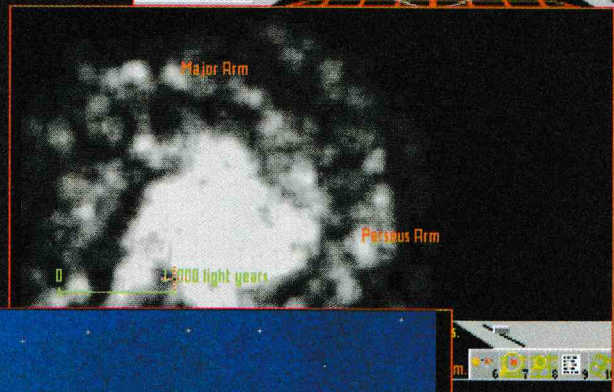
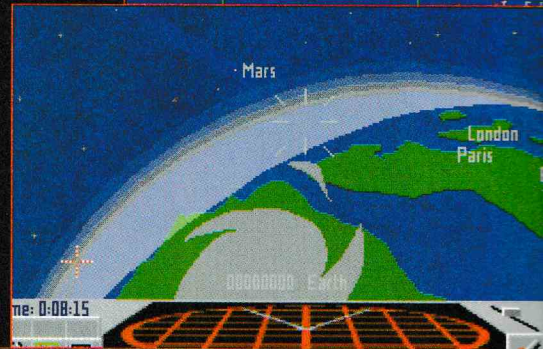
than 100 astronomically-correct star systems including Earth and the solar system, coupled with the massive 20 mile long space dreadnoughts I think that's a fair assumption.

The trading aspect has taken a back seat in the new version. It is still there, so you can buy and sell things to boost your ship's equipment, but this time the action is concentrated on the mission - few and far between in the original version.

A sort of bulletin board offers various jobs varying from taking passengers across the galaxy to escorting granny across the road. And if like me you traded in drugs in the original because you made loads of money dead quick, you can still haul contraband - but be prepared to take the consequences. You can also join the army as a mercenary and bump off anybody committing offences.

The old hyperspace drive is still in operation but there is a new relative time feature. The time scale works in a similar way to the game Dark Seed on the PC - if your character remains relatively inactive and isn't interacting with any of the other characters time will run very fast. If you are engaged in whatever you'll be in real time.

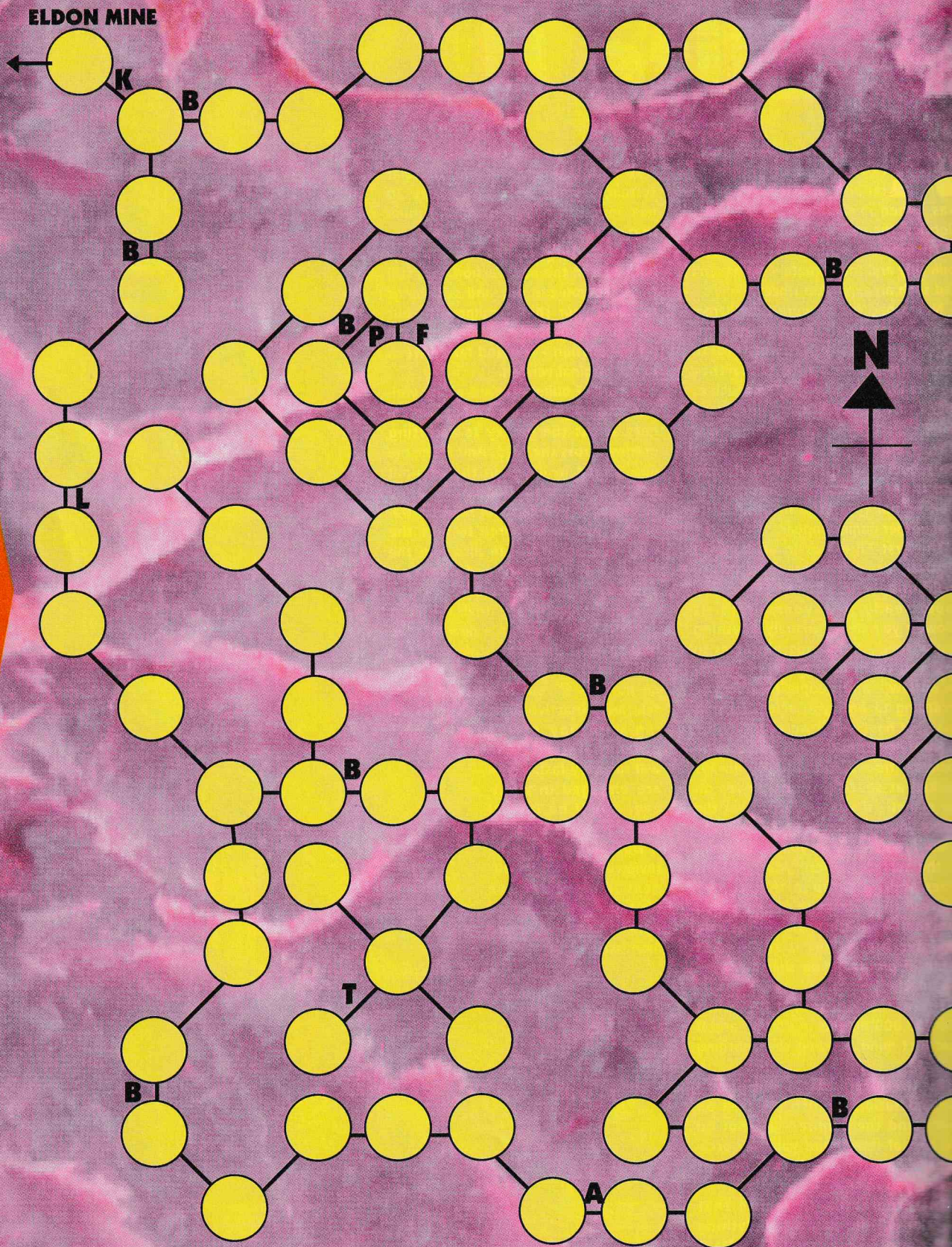
Hopefully we will be reviewing Elite II in our next issue. But we've waited eight years, so what's a few more months?



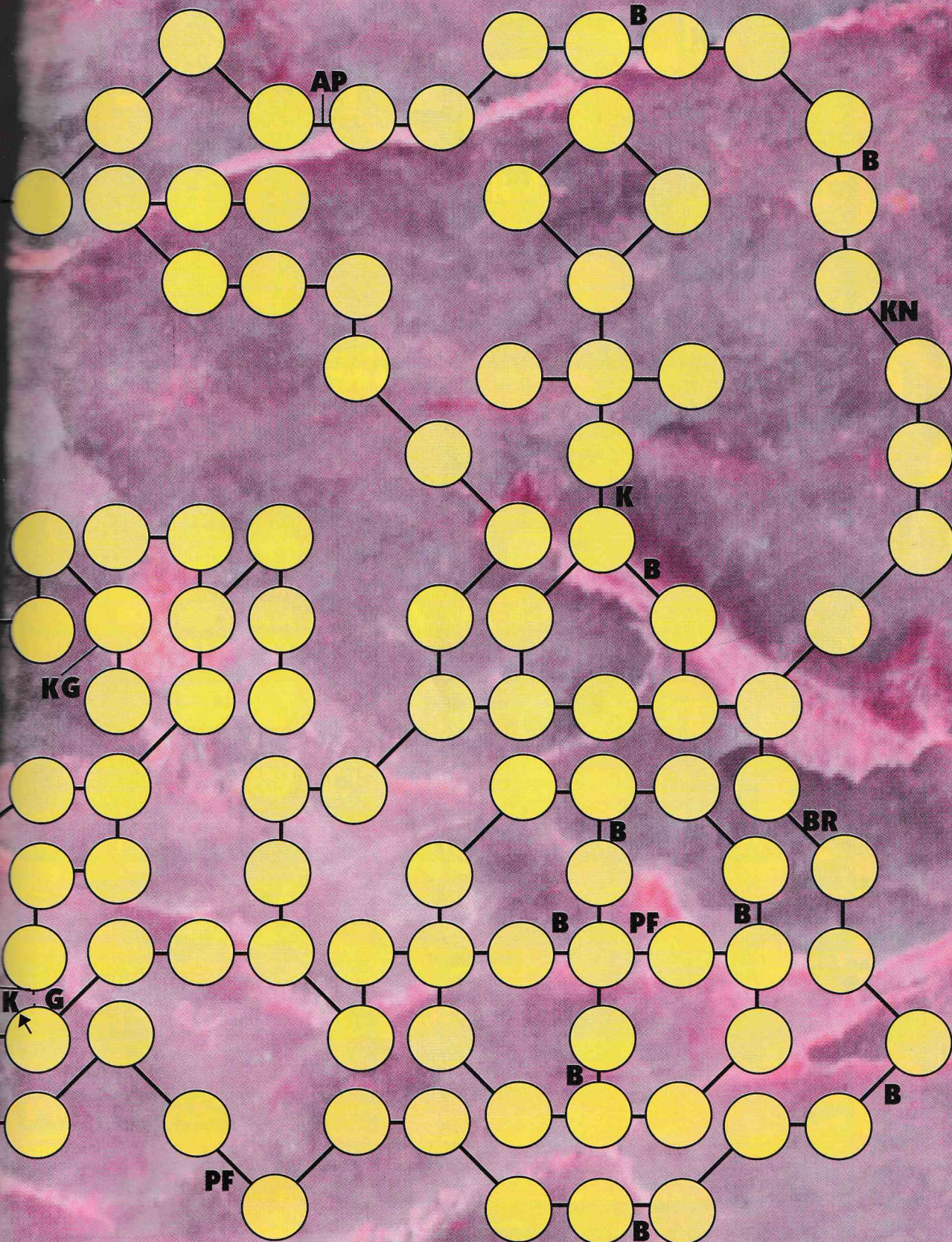

# Aspects of the ST

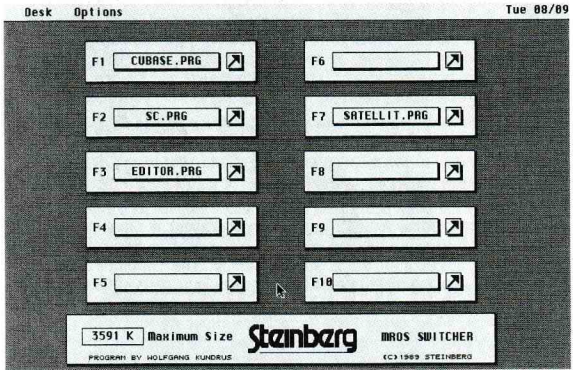
**S**ymbolic Composer is one of the most interesting music concepts I've seen for a long time.

Regular readers will be aware of my interest in music composition programs. Symbolic Composer is a music composition language.

It could be described as an expert system for music production and it's based on the granddaddy of all AI (Artificial Intelligence) languages, Lisp.

It differs dramatically from other music composition programs such as M, Ludwig, Realtime, Tango and so on as it is infinitely more flexible.

You compose with symbols

rather than notes and there is a library of functions you can apply to these symbols including generators, processors, converters, mappers, neural experts and librarians.

You then use definers to build instruments which are scored on a timesheet and compiled to standard Midi file.

## Midi-compatible

The music is written as text and must be compiled and loaded into a Midi file-compatible sequencer. It will run quite happily within Dr T's MPE in KCS and with Steinberg's Switcher program.

The text format means it is easy to edit and programs can be transferred to other symbolic composers running on other computers (it's already on the Mac and is currently being ported to the PC).

Symbolic Composer costs £250 and requires an ST with 4Mb of RAM. As well as the dosh and the

memory, you need some patience, too, as it is a fully-fledged language.

However, the basic rules of syntax are about as easy to learn as the rules of chess (it says here).

Academics will love Symbolic Composer but it can be used to

create more mainstream output, too. There are two files on the CoverDisk this month which show just two of the types of music the program is capable of generating.

They are in Midi file format 0 (one homogeneous track) and should load into

any sequencer which supports standard Midi files (although Roland's Tentrax sequencer, will only load type 1 files).

If your sequencer has a de-mix

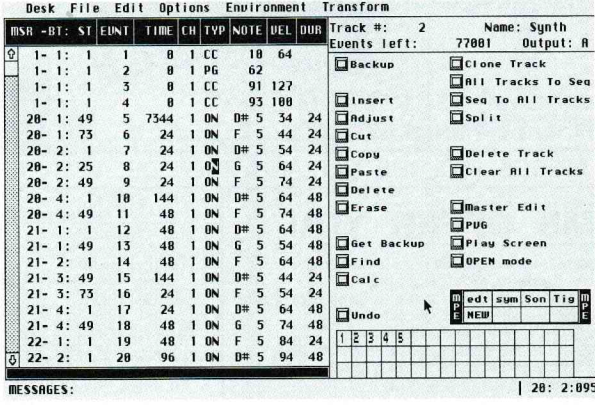
function you can split the track into their respective Midi channels. The files are configured for use with a GM (General Midi) instrument. Fiberock.Mid produces a surprisingly band-like funk/fusion performance.

If you don't have a GM instrument, set Midi channel 1 to a synth sound, 2 to a bass, three to a guitar and 10 to drums. It uses the GS/Roland drum map.

## Channels

FRACTAL.MID was produced by one of the program's Fractal Generators. The music is on channels 2 and 3 - select sounds to suit!

## Improving Improviser

Improviser was reviewed in this column in May and has since undergone a couple of updates. The program is one of the few which can produce seemingly human-like music output in, as its name suggests, an improvisational vein.

The current version is stable and modifications have been made based on feedback from users.

The program now recognises 240 different chord shapes and the next update promises extended chord recognition. The Save Improvisation function now also saves chord symbols as text in an extra track which you can see in your sequencer's editor.

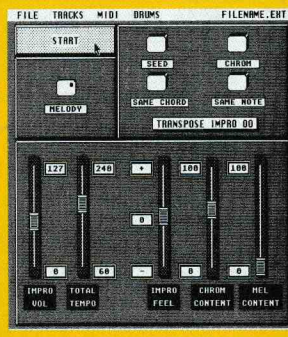
## Progression

This is very useful for following the harmonic progression should you want to do extra work on the file.

Sometimes the program does not analyse a sequence of notes exactly in which case it will now do a best guess and put a "?" after the chord name.

Finally, the program produces an alert box before exiting a program so you can't quit accidentally!

If experimentation's your game and improvisation's your goal it's well worth looking at. Improviser is £99.50. More info: Creative Sounds, PO Box 10, Bristol BS99 5AU. Tel: 01274 244395.

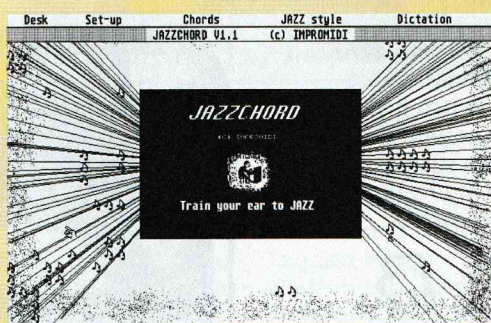
## Jazzin' about

There's nothing more boring than learning the rudiments of music – scales, chords and that sort of thing. It's difficult to make the subject interesting although a degree of computer interaction can help.

Enter JazzChord (review v1.1) which aims to teach you to play and recognise chords. In spite of its name it includes basic chords as well as m/M9+5 and other chords to make your hair and fingers curl.

The program will copy to a hard disk but you must insert the floppy when booting. It runs in mono or colour.

Chords play over Midi when selected. There are 51 types which can be shown in notation form and on a keyboard. Guitar fingering is

also shown for the simpler chords.

There are several options for explaining, playing and testing your knowledge of chords and their construction.

The Phrase window, for example, shows that in jazz, notes written as straight quavers are played with a triplet feel. Another window shows four sets of chord progressions used in the blues.

Scale Display plays a chord and the notes in the scale. The Construction window shows how simple triads and seventh chords and inversions are constructed.

There are a couple of games/tests, too. In one you play against a timer to select the notes which make up a chord. In another, the

program plays a series of notes and you have to pick them out on a staff or play them on a Midi keyboard.

There's a similar test for chords and both tests let you select a difficulty level. Unless you have a very good ear you'll find this difficult. But in that case, this is the area in which you need practice!

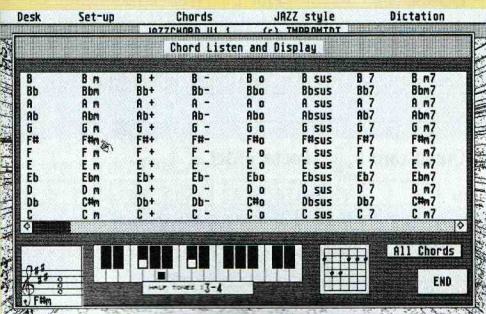
The manual shows signs of having been translated from the French by a Frenchman (who hasn't quite mastered our idiosyncratic language) but the program is easy to use and you should have no problems.

The only minor gripe is that in the chord notation display, the key signature shows the number of accidentals in the chord rather than the key signature of the chord.

C minor, for example, shows two flats (the key of C minor has three flats) and the chord of C augmented shows three sharps (although there is no C augmented key, it is most likely to appear in the key of C which has no accidentals).

But in spite of that, JazzChord sure beats learning by rote and if you're struggling with chord formations it's worth checking out.

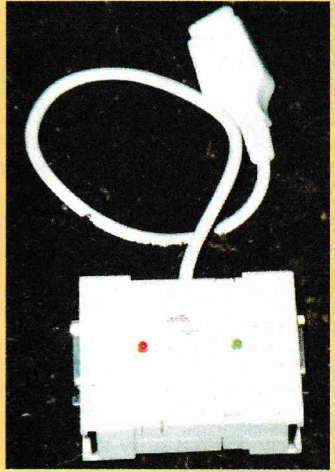

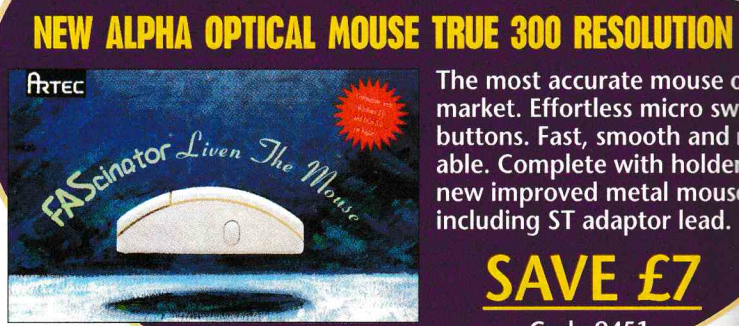

# Something for nothing

**A**t £300 plus, including the required Apple ROMs, the Spectre GCR Mac emulator is not exactly a usual buy. Few ST owners will be able to fork out further hundreds of pounds on top of that for much of the notoriously pricey Mac software – after all, if funds really were plentiful, why not buy a real Mac in the first place?

Fortunately, there are loads of public domain and shareware programs from PD libraries or, if you own a modem, from bulletin boards and conference systems such as CiX.

So many, in fact, that it is quite possible to perform most common computing tasks with low-cost or free software and restrict the purchase of expensive commercial packages to the few specialist jobs that really cannot be tackled without.

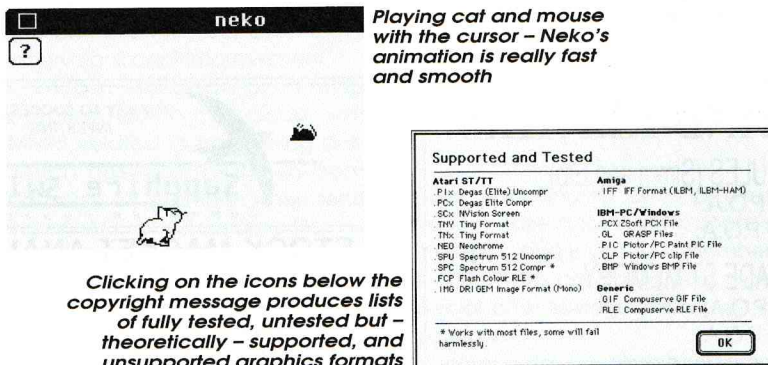
## Frivolities

The public domain can also be a source of fun. Let's face it, we are not all incurable workaholics and there's nothing better than some enjoyable on-screen frivolities to take the strain out of hours of spreadsheeting or wordprocessing.

One such frivolity which I have recently downloaded from CiX is supposed to be for children, but I must admit that it has given me quite a lot of happily innocent entertainment in between more serious pursuits.

Neko, as this little desk accessory – and therefore always available from within other applications – is called, does little but open a window containing an animated kitten.

The fun starts when you move the cursor into the window – it turns into a mouse and is instantly chased around by the little feline. If it manages to catch it, it scratches its head, gets visibly bored and eventually falls to sleep until the cursor is moved again and the chase resumed. The speed of the



game can be user-defined, and the cursor turned into a little fish or bird rather than a mouse – good, harmless fun indeed.

A common, more serious requirement for ST owners using Mac emulators is to transfer Atari artwork into Apple software. The Transverter utility supplied with Spectre may make it relatively easy to move the files from one environment to the other, but Mac applications can make little sense of the common ST graphics formats, and few ST programs can write Mac-compatible files.

Enter Imagery, a nifty utility written by a Canadian defector from the Atari to the Apple camp.

Extremely fast and simple, with a primitive – by Mac standards – but effective user interface, Imagery converts Degas, IMG and a host of other ST and PC pictures into the Tagged Image (TIFF) file format which has become the graphics standard for all major Apple software.

I found that it is important to tell Transverter to keep the linefeeds when copying the ST files to an Apple disk or partition, or Imagery will hang up when reading the data.

The file type is identified by the commonly used filename extenders (.IMG, .PI3 and so on), and all you really need to do is to use the

## Mac's trick

Following my recent series of tips on how to use foreign language characters under MS-DOS and the Mac operating system, some readers have asked me how they could access accented letters in Windows.

This can depend on the application, of course, but in general terms the problem is that Windows 3 does not use the standard PC character set but an alternative, 8-bit set known as the ANSI character set.

This offers a large variety of foreign letters and, using the Symbols font, special characters, but they are obtained from the keyboard by a rather cumbersome method.

## Involved

To obtain the German a-umlaut, for example, you need to hold down the Alternate key while simultaneously pressing the 0 on the numeric keypad, and then, without releasing the Alternate key, type in the character value 228, also from the numeric keypad (this is important!) before releasing Alternate.

Try out any other character value between 161 and 255, in the Write accessory for example, for an impression of the full range of characters available.

This should work with all standard Windows fonts, at least as far as the appearance of foreign-language text on screen is concerned.

Whether or not you can print all these characters, of course, depends entirely on the printer driver and the capabilities of your printer hardware. Have fun with all the umlauts, cedillas and circumflexes!

file selectors to choose your input and output files – everything else is automatic.

# Supersonic modems

**T**he modem market is in a state of turmoil at the moment. A few years ago, anyone with £300 burning a hole in their pocket could go out and buy the latest, state of the art V22 modem, offering a speed of 1,200 bits, or about 120 characters, per second.

I know, because I was one of those people, upgrading from my slow old 300 baud modem. Now, as technology continues to march inexorably forward, that same sum will pay for a V32bis modem, capable of a basic transfer speed of 14,400 bps – and which will very likely handle faxed documents as well!

Add this to the fact that the CCITT have authorised a new data compression system, V42bis – similar to but more efficient than the older MNP5 system – which can supposedly transfer data at up to four times the basic rate of the modem.

Such claims do rely heavily on

optimised conditions, so in practice a three-fold increase is about all you can expect – but even that is a very significant improvement.

V42bis also clears up a minor problem which can occur with MNP5, related to transferring data which has already been compressed – for example, when sending an .ARC or .LZH archive file.

When using MNP5, the overhead of the system itself can result in the data transfer actually being slower than if you had sent the file with no compression at all. V42bis recognises this possibility, and will turn off its compression routines when there is no advantage to using them.

## Variety

All of this means that for less than £300 you can now get a modem which can transfer any data at around 1,500 bytes per second, and text at well over 3,000 cps. There are a wide variety of V32bis/V42bis modems around at very good prices.

If you're not too worried about using a BABT approved modem – would we suggest such a thing? – you could try Supra's new high speed fax modem, or maybe the TKR 1496 from System Solutions, both of which retail for under £300.

If you're looking for an approved modem, take a look at Miracom's offerings – and if you're a member of CIX, there are some very nice special offer savings available on these units.

Unfortunately, these kinds of high speeds require your ST to be set to a baud rate over 30,000 in order to keep up – and the highest figure thoughtfully provided by Atari is just 19,200.

There are a number of options open to you. First, if you happen to be using either a Mega STE or a TT, the second RS232 port can be configured to run at very much higher baud rates.

Several packages now support this feature, including the German PD program ConNect, and the latest version of the commercial US comms package Stalker from Gribnif Software.

If you are using a standard ST, your options are somewhat more limited. In order to achieve higher

speeds, you must fool the RS232 driver chip into operating at a faster rate. There are two ways to do this – software and hardware – but neither are guaranteed to work as well as the current 19,200 rate.

If you opt for the software method, a small program sits in your AUTO folder, or as a desk accessory, and forces the RS232 chip to run 16 times faster than normal. Thus if you select a baud rate of 2,400, your ST would actually function at 16 times that rate – or 38,400 baud.

## Kludge

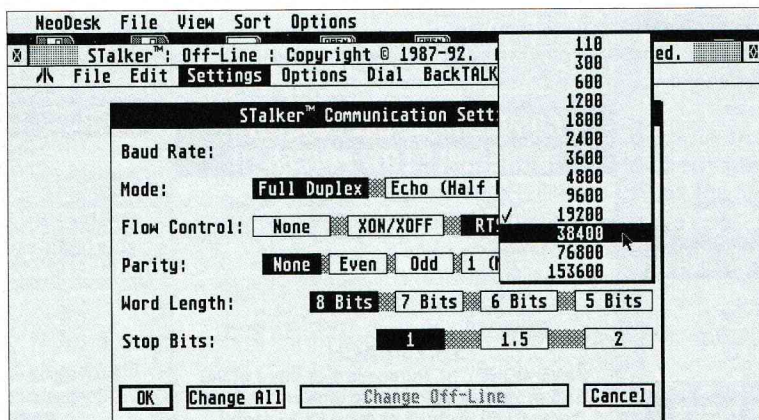
However this patch is something of a kludge, as the RS232 chip has only one machine cycle to check for each incoming data bit rather than the normal 16.

This means it can very easily get out of sync, and corrupt odd bytes of data. If you want to try it out for yourself, one program which will set up this mode for you is the German HSPD\_232.ACC, available for downloading from most bulletin boards.

The alternative method is to change the internal RS232 hardware clock frequency, deep inside your ST. This is a bit like upgrading from an 8MHz to a 16MHz processor, but the speed increase is localised to the RS232 chip.

This sort of modification requires some soldering, and maybe the addition of a small switch to turn the enhanced mode on and off, so it's probably best left to an engineer to avoid frying your ST's circuit board!

If you want to have a go, these modifications are detailed in a text file which again is available for downloading from places like CIX and other bulletin boards.

# PageStream perfected?

**W**ell, it's finally here. The PageStream 2.2 upgrade can now be downloaded from CompuServe or obtained from the US for \$25 if you are a registered user.

There are a number of improvements and plenty of bug fixes, including one to remove the problem with Compugraphic fonts which appears to have worked.

Soft-Logik also claim compatibility with the forthcoming MultiTOS which will first hit the streets in the Falcon and become available later as an upgrade for ST owners. Several years later if present form is anything to go by...

A new magnification tool can be used to zoom in or out, doubling or reducing the magnification each time. The minimum and maximum levels are now 15 to 1,500 per cent and the current level is displayed in the toolbox.

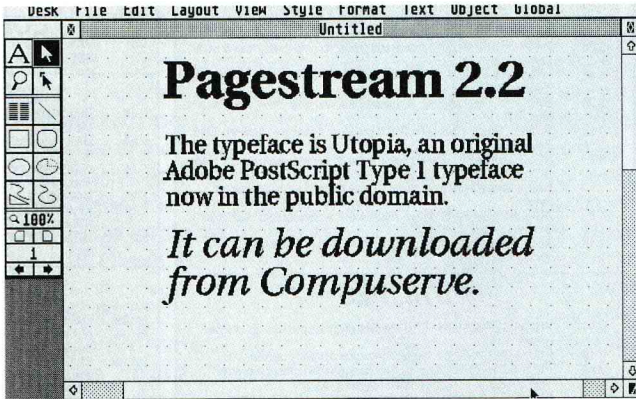
The reshape and column tools have new icons but their functions have not changed. The two line tools have been merged into one, as have some of the other graphics tools, using the Shift key to differentiate when drawing.

## Toolbox

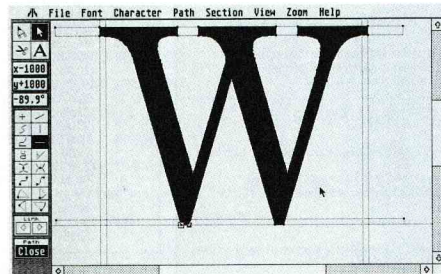
Page handling is also improved with several changes to the relevant parts of the toolbox.

PageStream 2.2's text display speed is slightly faster than its predecessor although I couldn't see any direct improvement when using PostScript fonts.

Compugraphic and proprietary fonts were around 25 per cent

improved with slur gauges and offset colour strips being printed on separations.

There are a number of significant new import modules for the new version, including CVG (Calamus Vector Graphic), Calamus/PKS Write text, That's Write, and Calligrapher.

Encapsulated PostScript import options have been enhanced to display built-in preview images (PICT or TIFF) on-screen and Soft-Logik claim PageStream 2.2 is now compatible with Adobe Illustrator files.

## Importing

My attempt at importing a file supplied with the latest PC version of Illustrator didn't back this claim up at all, however.

The GEM import module has been improved to accept files stored in the GEM/3 format. This format includes Bezier curves and is used by several graphics programs such as Avant Vector and Silhouette.

The new release of PageStream also contains changes to improve program stability. Soft-Logik claim that PageStream is now stable on

faster to redraw. It does have a draft mode, however, which means that all text is shown as bitmaps rather than outlines.

If none are available, Soft-Logik say a generic sans serif font will be used.

PageStream 2.2 also has some new keyboard shortcuts. Using the Shift key with many menu selection procedures will avoid opening dialogue boxes and will carry out the command directly using the existing settings.

For instance, Shift-New opens a new document using the defaults and Shift-Print prints the current document using whatever driver and settings have already been chosen.

There is a new printer driver for PostScript printers which has many more options including colour support. Crop marks are also much

1Mb machines and will let the user recover from low memory situations.

Placing the cursor before the first character in a column now picks up the attributes of the first character, a useful time-saving feature. The em and en dashes should now work correctly with Compugraphic fonts.

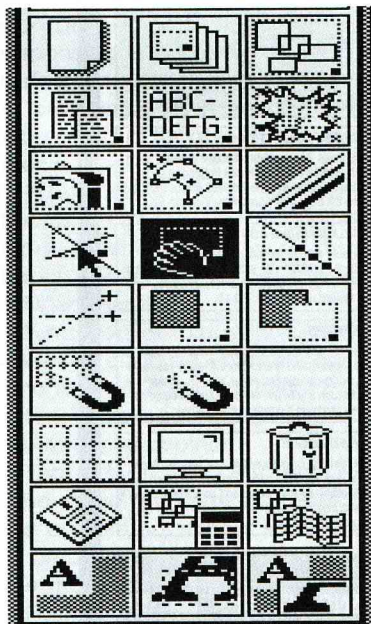
## Keep it simple

Since writing last month's column, I've tried to organise my typeface library into some semblance of order, a job that was long overdue. This included printing out samples and storing the hardly used ones away on floppy disks.

It also made me follow the advice a respected typographer friend once gave me. His method was simple - divide all your typefaces into the appropriate classifications and then choose two or three contrasting ones from each. Then forget the rest.

Obviously that advice isn't entirely practical. Occasionally you'll need to match a typeface with that in existing material or in a logo, but the sentiment is a good one.

Designers are all too often awash with obscure typefaces gathered from bulletin boards here and PD libraries there, most of which they would never dream of using!

# Safe as houses?

**H**aving decided you need a program written to help you run your business, how do you go about finding someone to do this work for you?

Before anything else, decide how much you can afford to pay for it – if anything. Where your needs are simple – the writing of some spreadsheet macros or the setting up of a database program such as Superbase – you may not need a “proper” programmer at all.

Lots of people who use these sort of generic programs are competent enough to do what you want, in return for a few beer tokens or similar favours.

Ask your friends, use our letters pages and bulletin boards. It's very likely you'll find someone – if not to do the work for you then show you how to do it for yourself.

## Bespoking

Where the software is important enough, either in potential extra business or the amount of time it will save you, that you can afford to spend hundreds or even thousands of pounds on its creation (or “bespoking”), then it's much like engaging any other form of professional help – caveat emptor, or buyer beware!

The majority of software houses and one-man-band programmers are legitimate businesses who will deal with you with impeccable integrity. But there are some cowboys out there.

Try not to take on the first programmer or software house who happens along. However you have contacted them, via a friend, responding to an advert or from a bulletin board, always ask what sort of programs they have written in the past, and for at least two “reference sites”.

Programmers and software houses are generally proud of their work, so should be more than happy to refer you to their already satisfied clients.

What sort of things should you take into account when choosing who is to write your software? An often neglected fact is that you should like each other.

That way if any problems do arise – and few software projects are completed without some sort of problem along the way – they are more likely to be sorted out quickly and amicably if you get

along with them as people.

The more important the software is to your business, the more important that you do get friendly with whoever wrote it. Very likely you will need support or changes at some time in the future.

The better your relationship with the author, the more likely that they will be available to you when you need them. For the same reason, it's an advantage if they live close to you.

A programmer's or software house's technical competence is best judged by what they have done before. Visit the reference sites they've given you rather than just ring them up for a chat. Of course you will only be referred to already satisfied clients, but

would you be happy with the sort of software which they are using? Only a visit and some hands-on experience can tell you this.

Price is obviously a factor. As a general rule, a one-man-band programmer will be cheaper than engaging a software house. On the other hand, a software house is more likely to be able to support you and make changes promptly in the future. The old adage applies – you generally get what you pay for.

No software house or programmer worth their salt will give you a quotation without finding out in

some detail what it is you want from them.

This is where all too many software projects fall down. You know how your business runs, they know how to program. It's all too easy for you to assume they know something about your business which they don't, or for them to misinterpret what you do tell them.

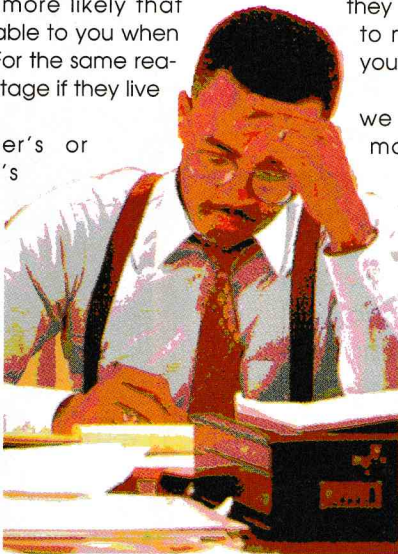
Which was why we emphasised last month how important it is to approach the programmer(s) pre-armed with an accurate if brief software specification – a statement of what you want the software to achieve – plus a description of how you perform this work now, and

where you are expecting the new software to fit in.

Give a copy of these documents to each of the programmers you are thinking of employing, and the quotes you get back will at least be based on the same information.

Very likely you will end up in discussion with the programmer over what you want. Maybe they can see what they think are better ways to apply your ST to your business, or maybe what you want the software to do is too ambitious for your budget.

Take note of everything they say. Where you think their suggestions



sound sensible, update your software specification and business description accordingly, then give it to them afresh for a quote. Needless to say, if you are spending a substantial sum of money you should insist on quotations in writing.

As was mentioned last month, the maintenance and support of a substantial piece of specialist software can cost more than it takes to write. You will have to budget for these ongoing costs as best you can.

As you are paying to have this software written, the copyright in it should belong to you. Make sure this is stated explicitly in the quotation. Also ensure that you are given a copy of the source code, just in case you need to engage another programmer to change it at a later date. Again you should insist that this be stated explicitly in the quotation.

Having chosen which quotation to accept, it's unlikely you'll be able to just sit back and wait for the finished and perfect software to arrive – though it does sometimes happen that way, especially if your needs are not too complex.

Generally you will be shown at least one prototype. Sometimes the programmer will have to come back to you several times before every aspect of the software is to your satisfaction. Remember what we said earlier about making friends with them!

## Relationship

It's at times like these you'll need that relationship. That said, the better the software specification and business description you gave them to work from, the less likely is this or a similar problem to crop up.

When the working software arrives, don't be tempted to immediately trust the health of your business to it. Run your manual system in parallel with it for at least a month, ideally for three months.

Onerous as the extra work may seem, it will be worth it if you find a bug in the code which costs you money – and a bug-free piece of software has yet to be written!

If all has gone well, you'll have a piece of software to be proud of – and who knows, someone else in your line of business may be in touch with a view to buying it in the future.
