#### DEADLINE review

DEADLINE is one of the series of classic text adventures from INFOCOM, one of the best software houses that ever got into Atari programming. As is generally the case with their games, INFOCOM does a great job of packaging, probably spending more time and money on the package than most programs spend on code. Contained in the package, which is a brown "evidence" folder, are; an inspector's casebook, a coroner's report, a letter from the attorney requesting your aid, a lab report on the contents and fingerprints in/on a teacup, a photo of the crime scene, physical evidence, and copies of the interviews of each of the suspects. Pretty impressive !

Playing the game is straightforward text adventure, with some additions. There is a countdown clock which limits the time you can spend wandering around the house looking for clues and questioning suspects. Also, some of the suspects can get really testy, esp. if you are not polite ( they are apt to shoot you, thus ending the game prematurely ). If you are into text adventures at all, this one is not to be missed. You can play it over again and again, as the actual murderer is changed at random, along with the clues/ responses.


#### DALACE,INC DALLAS ATARI COMPUTER ENTHUSIASTS
